Description

The Edith Mason House is a two-and-one-half story frame dwelling of I-House form with central flush crossgable. The original wood siding is now covered with white aluminum siding. The large 6/6 windows have plain board surrounds painted green. There is a diamond-shaped window high in the front crossgable. The central door in the main west facade has been replaced by a modern door; this facade is sheltered by a one-story shed-roof porch with metal trellis posts.

Significance

The Mason House is an important element in the black community of North Brentwood; it is a good example of the I-House dwellings which were built in developing subdivisions before the turn of the twentieth century; this traditional form was typical of modest rural farmhouses of the 1890s, and in this case was translated onto a small lot in a suburban setting. The subject house was built circa 1895 for Henry Randall on lot 12 of Block 20 which backed up to Randall's family home; it later became the home of Randall's daughter, Edith Randall Mason. It is significant as one of four surviving I-House dwellings, all built before 1896 for members of the Randalls' extended family.


