Description

The Brickley-Cole house is a three-bay, two-story gable roof structure with one-story gable roof wings on the east and west. It is on a hill north of Woodyard Road and is not visible from the road. The cement wall covering is painted white and scored to look like stone blocks. There are east and west gable end interior parged chimneys, a boxed cornice, and standing seam metal roof covering. The three-bay south (entrance) facade has a central, six-panel door with fan light transom. The door is sheltered by a one-bay, one-story canopy porch with tapering slender wood columns. Two double 6/6 windows with stone sills flank the entrance on the first and second stories. There are two pedimented dormers with 6/6 windows on both the north and south roof slopes. The four-bay north (rear) facade faces a cement patio.

Significance

The Brickley-Cole house was built in 1933 by John A. Brickley, real estate developer and broker. Brickley acquired the 322-acre farm called Bellefonte, originally a part of the His Lordship's Kindness estate. The Daingerfield family, who owned the His Lordship's Kindness estate beginning in 1860, owned the adjoining Bellefonte farm until heirs sold it to Brickley in 1931. Brickley built the nine room brick dwelling and subdivided and sold the 322 acre property. The present owner, Elsie Cole, has owned the house since 1948. The house was Georgian Revival stylistic elements including a fanlight transom, slender classical porch columns, pedimented porch roof and dormers, and a cement-over-brick wall treatment, scored to look like stone blocks.

The Brickley-Cole House is a three-bay, two-story, gable roof brick structure with one-story gable roof wings on the east and west. The house is situated on a hill north of Woodyard Road, and faces south. It is not visible from the road.

The wall covering is cement, painted white and scored to look like stone blocks. There are interior chimneys at the east and west gable ends, breaking the cornice line, with the same wall treatment. There is a wide boxed cornice with crown molding throughout the building. The roof is covered with standing seam metal, painted black. The foundation is not visible because the wall treatment continues down to the ground surface. There are basement windows in wells on the north and south facades.

Entrance is in the central bay of the three-bay main south facade, through a six panel door with fanlight. Two double 6/6 windows flank the entrance. There are two double 6/6 windows with louvered shutters on the second story. The windows throughout the structure have wide stone sills, painted white. There are two pedimented dormers, with a 6/6 window in each, above the first and third bay. A one-story canopy porch shelters the central entrance. The porch roof has a wide, plain frieze on the east and west sides and a plain raking cornice with cornice returns but no pediment, in the gable. The gable is left open to create a pointed-arch roof over the entrance door, and this roof is supported on two tapering wood columns surmounted by plain capitals.

The west facade of the main block is dominated by the one-story gable roof west wing, which appears to be contemporary with the main structure. The south (main) facade of this west wing has a pedimented dormer with a 6/6 sash window and two 6/6 windows on the body of the building. Its west gable end is one bay, with one 6/6 window, and a returned cornice. The north side of this wing is filled by a two-car wooden garage door that appears to be a later addition. The wall surface treatment is the same as that of the main block.

The north (rear) facade of the main block has two pedimented dormers with 1/1 windows. There are four bays on the main structure, with a 15-light glazed entrance door in the second bay and double 6/6 windows in the fourth bay. There is a one-story, gable roofed projecting bay at the northwest corner of the main structure, with an entrance and a four-light window on its north gable end. The north facade faces a concrete patio and the back yard.

The east facade has two second story 6/6 windows. The first story is covered by a one-story gable-roofed wing that appears to be a later

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addition to the building. This wing is the same size as the one-story west wing and balances the facade. It is constructed of grey brick and has the same roof covering as the main block. It has a plain cornice with cornice returns in the east gable end. Below the cornice is a decorative course of white vertical wood siding with scalloped ends. This addition has a large modern 24-light window on its south (front) facade.

Tall telephone poles spaced at regular intervals encircle the house. They are topped by antenna-like structures. According to the owner, the FBI used the site and constructed the pole system during World War II.

There is a large brick, two-story, three-bay garage to the north of the house. It has a gable roof covered with standing-seam metal. There appears to be an apartment or living quarters over the garage.

The Brickley-Cole House was built in 1933 by John A. Brickley, a real estate developer and broker.<sup>1</sup> The property was part of the 322-acre farm called Bellefonte, originally a part of the His Lordship's Kindness estate. A large acreage had been owned by the Dangerfield family including parts of His Lordship's Kindness and Bellefonte Farm since 1860. Bellefonte was sold by Dangerfield heirs to Brickley in 1931.<sup>2</sup> Brickley built the nine room brick house and lived there during 1933 and 1934 while he was in the process of subdividing the Bellefonte Farm and selling lots. The Brickley-Cole House was left on a 32.76 acre lot which Brickley sold in 1939. The present owner, Elsie Cole, purchased the property in 1948.

The house is quite substantial in size, constructed in the Georgian Revival style. Stylistic elements include a symmetrical facade, fanlight transom, slender classical porch columns, pedimented dormers, and a cement-over-brick wall treatment scored to look like stone blocks. The east wing, enclosed since 1948 using inappropriate brick and frame materials, originally was a sun porch.

The knoll on which the dwelling stands is surrounded by 6 high telephone poles surmounted antenna. According to the owner, the FBI leased the property during World War II and installed the poles and antennas for use as a communications center. The formation of poles is called a CDAA, a circularly deployed antenna array.<sup>3</sup>

The west facade of the main block is dominated by the one-story gable-roof west wing, which appears to be contemporary with the main structure. The south facade of this west wing has a pedimented dormer with a 6/6 window above its cornice line, and two 6/6 windows facing south. Its west gable end is one bay, with one 6/6 window. The cornice is returned at the gable end. The north side of this wing is filled by a two-car wooden garage door that appears to be a later addition. The wall surface treatment is the same as that of the main block.

The north (rear) facade of the main block has two pedimented dormers with 1/1 windows. There are four bays on the main structure, with a 15-light entrance door on the second bay and double 6/6 windows on the fourth bay. There is a one-story, gable-roofed projecting bay at the northwest corner of the main structure, with an entrance and a four-light window on its north gable end. The north facade faces a cement patio and the back yard.
