Description

Dr. Gibbons House is a two-story frame, gable roof dwelling with an ell-shaped main block and a rear kitchen wing. It stands on a five acre lot, overlooking Croom Road immediately to the east. The house is covered with German siding and roofed with brown, textured synthetic shingle. The brick foundation is parged with cement. The three bay east (front) gable end has entrance in the first bay through a decorative carved door. The first story is sheltered by a four bay, hipped roof entrance porch with a balustrade of plain rectangular balusters. The turned and chamfered porch posts have jig-sawn fan brackets. The 2/2 double-hung-sash windows are recent replacements. The original sash were also 2/2 sash. The gable surmounting the facade has a pentagonal window centered at loft level. The crown molded cornice is returned and there is a small wooden pendant in the gable peak. The interior of the Dr. Gibbons house has a south entry hall with a north parlor. Two rooms at the center of the house are a south parlor and north dining room. At the west or rear is the kitchen. Except for the immediate yard surrounding the house, the five-acre property is completely fenced with 3-board wooden fencing for horse pasturage. Close to the southwest kitchen entrance are a frame milkhouse, a meat house and a cement capped well.

Significance

The Dr. Gibbons House is significant for its large size and well-designed Victorian vernacular architecture. It is a landmark in the Village of Croom for its architecture, for its prominent location at the intersection of Croom and St. Thomas Church Roads, and due to the importance in the community of its builder and long time resident Dr. William H. Gibbons. The house was built in 1893 by Dr. Gibbons, and served from that time until his death in 1940 as his home and office. Gibbons was born in TB, Prince George's County in 1863, and graduated from Western Maryland College and the Medical School of the old Maryland Agricultural College, now University of Maryland. The Gibbons house is restrained in decorative detail, but has such well-placed features as the pentagonal windows in the east, north and south gable ends which reflect the outline of the gable in which they are located. The turned porch posts have elaborate jig-sawn fan brackets. The house stands in the Village of Croom, an historically important cluster of buildings which centers around St. Thomas' Episcopal Church.

Dr. Gibbons House is a two-story frame, gable roof dwelling with an ell-shaped main block and a rear kitchen wing. It stands on a five acre lot, overlooking Croom Road immediately to the east.

The Dr. Gibbons House is covered with German siding and roofed with brown, textured synthetic shingle. The brick foundation is parged with cement. The three bay east (front) gable end has entrance in the first bay through a decorative door having two horizontal wooden panels carved with a sunburst design alternating with two rows of three small square panels. The upper one third of the door is glazed with a large square glass pane. The door is surmounted by a rectangular transom. The quarter-round transom bar has a pattern of incised lines running in sets of three, first vertically and then horizontally. The wide flat door surround has a central grooved band. This surround is repeated on the windows throughout the main block.

The first story is sheltered by a four bay, hipped roof entrance porch with a balustrade of plain rectangular balusters. The turned and chamfered porch posts have jig-sawn fan brackets. The wooden porch floor resting on brick piers was completely replaced in 1981. The 2/2 double-hung-sash windows are also recent replacements. The original sash were also 2/2 sash. There are three windows at second story level. The gable surmounting the facade has a pentagonal window centered at loft level. The crown molded cornice is returned and there is a small wooden pendant in the gable peak.

The entrance porch wraps around the south side of the dwelling and shelters the entry to the office, a small one-room infill addition in the ell of the main block. The office entry is a four-panel door. The office addition is one story, with a hipped roof and overhanging eaves, sided and finished like the rest of the main block.

The south elevation of the main block is one bay in the projecting gable end of the ell. There is a window at first and second story levels. The gable end is finished much the same as that on the east (front), however, there is no pendant at the gable peak. A brick chimney with a corbelled cap rises from the east slope of the roof. On the east side of this gable is the office, with a double 2/2 sash window. On the west side of the ell is the kitchen wing.

The two bay north side of the main block is surmounted by a gable in the second bay. The gable has the same crown molded returned cornice, crown molded rake board and pentagonal window as the east and south facing gables. The parged foundation is visible on this elevation.

The west or rear facade has a window at the north and south bays. The center of the facade is dominated by the gable roof two-by-one-bay two-story kitchen wing. The wing is unfenestrated at the west (rear) gable end. An interior brick chimney rises at the gable ridge. A door at the north corner enters a small enclosed porch. A bulkhead cellar entrance is at the south corner.

The north facade of the kitchen wing has two windows at second story level. The south facade has a shed roof entrance porch across the first story, supported by chamfered posts. The porch shelters a central entrance to the kitchen. The kitchen wing is German sided and rests on a parged cement foundation. The window and door surrounds are of plain board.

The interior of the Dr. Gibbons house has a south entry hall with a north parlor. Two rooms at the center of the house are a south parlor and north dining room. At the west or rear is the kitchen.

The narrow entry hall measures 5 feet 11 inches by 15 feet 7 inches. The open-string stair rises along the south wall in a single flight to the second floor. The heavy newel post is turned and chamfered, surmounted by a spherical knob. The turned balusters are attached at the lower end to a strip of molding running diagonally up the stairs, and not to the individual steps. The flooring in the hall has been covered with wall-to-wall carpeting. The door and window surrounds are composed of wide wood moldings with a central half-round flanked by an inner and outer raised rectangular band, and bulls-eye corner blocks.

The north parlor is reached through a wide rectangular opening from the hall. This entryway appears to have been widened from its original size. The room has a replacement parquet floor. The hearth centered on the west wall was designed for use with a stove. The wooden mantel has slender banded columns on base blocks supporting brackets which support the mantel shelf. The frieze has a wide carved band of a curving stylized leaf design. A circular plaster medallion centered on the ceiling has a design of radiating flower petals.

The west end of the stair hall enters the rear (west) parlor. The door surround has banded baseblocks. The baseboard throughout the house is approximately 8-1/2 inches in height with a projecting curving cap and quarter-round molding along the floor. The west parlor has a narrow chimney on the east wall to which a stove is attached. A circular vent in the ceiling above the stove, original to the house, allowed the warm air to rise to a south bedroom on the second story. The vent has a wide, decorative rim. A plaster medallion at the center of the ceiling has a design of diamond and semi-circular shapes in a geometric pattern. A door in the southeast corner of the west parlor enters the office, which is a small room dominated by doorways. There is an exterior door on the east wall and two interior doors, one on the west and one on the north walls. The moldings are the same as those throughout the first floor.

The dining room, reached from a door in the north wall of the west parlor, retains its moldings but has no hearth or ceiling medallion. The flooring is original, of narrow evenly matched boards.

The second story of the main block contains a central hall running from east to west. A plaster arch marks the point where the stair enters the hall, at approximately the middle of its length. Two bedrooms open on the north side of the hall and one on the south. The baseboards and molding are the same as those on the first story. Doors are four-panel, with original butt hinges having a decorative geometric design.

The northeast (front) bedroom has a plain wooden mantel with two brackets supporting the mantel shelf. The hearth was designed to accommodate a stove. A new closet has been constructed by walling off the east three feet of the stairhall and opening a doorway in the east corner of the south wall of the bedroom. The new closet is lighted by the window which formerly lit the stairhall.

An enclosed stair to the attic is at the southwest end of the hall. The northwest bedroom, which opens opposite the attic stair, has a curving convex wall. A doorway at the west end of the hall enters the second story level of the kitchen wing.

The first story of the kitchen wing is entered via a wide opening in the northwest end of the west parlor. A hall leads past a bath and the cellar entry to the kitchen at the west end of the wing. A stair along the east wall of the kitchen leads to the bath and a west bedroom on the second story.

Except for the immediate yard surrounding the house, the five-acre property is completely fenced with 3-board wooden fencing for horse pasturage. Close to the southwest kitchen entrance are two frame outbuildings and a cement capped well. The smaller builder is a milk house of 1 x 1 bay, standing on a brick foundation. It is covered with German siding and has a gable roof covered with patterned metal shingles. The entry is on the north. The south side has a square window opening covered by a wooden shutter. The brick floor is below ground level.

The meat house, slightly larger and higher, is also 1 x 1 bay. It is German sided, with a standing seam metal gable roof and a brick foundation. The interior has a poured cement floor. There are no window openings.

South of the house is a new stable. A raised gable ridge in the broad hipped roof is the original roofline of a small one-stall stable that was enlarged to create the present building. To the west (rear) of the stable is a frame chicken-coop of 2 x 1 bay with vertical board siding and a standing seam metal gable roof. It stands on poured cement footers. There is evidence of a ruined outbuilding located far southwest of the house, in a pasture, shaded by a large osage orange tree.

The Dr. Gibbons House is significant for its large size and well-designed Victorian vernacular architecture. It is a landmark in the Village of Croom for its architecture, for its prominent location at the intersection of Croom and St. Thomas Church Roads, and due to the importance in the community of its builder and long time resident Dr. William H. Gibbons.

The house was built in 1893 by Dr. Gibbons, and served from that time until his death in 1940 as his home and office. The land on which it stands was earlier part of an 18-acre parcel which included the John W. Coffren House and store. Dr. Gibbons bought the parcel in 1893<sup>1</sup>, selling a three acre parcel containing the Coffren House and store shortly thereafter. He constructed his house the same year he purchased the property. In 1910 a rear kitchen addition was built, probably replacing an earlier one-story kitchen.<sup>2</sup>

Dr. Gibbons was born in TB, Prince George's County in 1863. He graduated from Western Maryland College and the Medical School of the old Maryland Agricultural College, now University of Maryland. He married Mary Duley, a resident of Croom, in 1891, and served as a country doctor to the surrounding vicinity, based from his home and office in Croom.

The Gibbons house is imposing in its size and placement close to an important intersection in rural southeastern Prince George's County. It is restrained in decorative detail, but has such well-placed features as the pentagonal windows in the east, north and south gable ends which reflect the outline of the gable in which they are located. The turned porch posts have elaborate jig-sawn fan brackets. A small one-story infill bay at the southeast corner of the house has a separate entrance sheltered by the main entrance porch, and served as Dr. Gibbon's office.

The Gibbons House stands in the Village of Croom, an historically important cluster of buildings which centers around St. Thomas' Episcopal

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Church. Besides this important early (1740) church and its cemetery, several 19th century dwelling houses still stand along the Croom Road, as well as the Coffren store and post office, the Croom schoolhouse and old St. Thomas rectory building. The Gibbons house stands prominently near the center of this historic grouping.





Floor plan not to scale











This is a two-and-one-half-story cross-gable frame house with a one-story bracketed porch across its main (east) facade. Entrance is in the first bay of this three-bay east gable end; there is a small pentagonal peaked window in this gable end at loft level. A second one-bay gable end faces to the south. The cornices are returned.

A small one-story room has been built into the corner of the ell formed by the east and south gables; this room once served as a doctor's office.

Asbestos shingle presently covers the original German siding.

This house was built in 1893 by Dr. William H. Gibbons, and served from that time until his death in 1940 as his home and doctor's office. The land on which it stands was earlier part of an 18-acre parcel which included the John W. Coffren house and store. Dr. Gibbons bought the parcel in 1893, and built the house at that time. In 1910 a rear kitchen addition was built, probably replacing an earlier one-story kitchen.

The Gibbons house stands in the village of Croom, an historically important cluster of buildings which centers around St. Thomas' Episcopal Church. Besides this important early (1740) church and its cemetery, several 19th century dwelling houses still stand along the Croom road, as well as the store and post office, schoolhouse and old rectory building. The Gibbons house stands prominently near the center of this historic grouping.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This is a two-and-one-half-story cross-gable frame house with a one-story bracketed porch across its main (east) facade. Entrance is in the first bay of this three-bay east gable end; there is a small pentagonal peaked window in this gable end at loft level. A second one-bay gable end faces to the south. The cornices are returned.

A small one-story room has been built into the corner of the ell formed by the east and south gables; this room once served as the doctor's office.

Asbestos shingle presently covers the original German siding.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house was built in 1893 by Dr. William H. Gibbons, and served from that time until his death in 1940 as his home and doctor's office. The land on which it stands was earlier part of an 18-acre parcel which included the John W. Coffren house and store. Dr. Gibbons bought the parcel in 1893, and built the house at that time. In 1910 a rear kitchen addition was built, probably replacing an earlier one-story kitchen.<sup>1</sup>

The Gibbons house stands in the village of Croom, an historically important cluster of buildings which centers around St. Thomas' Episcopal Church. Besides this important early (1740) church and its cemetery, several 19th century dwelling houses still stand along the Croom road, as well as the store and post office, schoolhouse and rectory building. The Gibbons house stands prominently near the center of this historic grouping.


