Description:

Green Hill is a two-story rectangular frame dwelling with a gable roof one-story north wing. The dwelling, which probably dates to the 1830's, was altered extensively ca. 1943, and retains little of the appearance it had when photographed by the Historic American Buildings Survey in 1936. It is situated on a knoll overlooking Aquasco Road to its west and Croom Road to its northeast.

Green Hill is covered with horizontal vinyl siding. The windows are modern replacements. The cornice line has overhanging eaves and returns in the north and south gable ends. The building rests on a cement foundation. The house originally was covered with horizontal lapped wood siding and had a wood shingled roof.

Significance:

Green Hill is significant as an early 19th century dwelling that has been greatly altered in the 20th century, so that it now possesses few visible historic architectural features. Hidden features such as the structural timbers of the main two story block are probably original material. Green Hill is a landmark because it stands on a knoll overlooking the crossroads of Croom (Rte 382) and Aquasco (Rte 381) Roads, both roads dating from the 18th century.

Green Hill stands on the tract called "Poplar Hill", patented in 1666. When George Marriott acquired the acreage at the crossroads in 1830, it was called Colebrook. The Marriott family held the property through 1864, and George Marriott probably built the structure that appears in the 1936 Historic American Buildings Survey Photograph, entitled "Poplar Hill".

Green Hill is a two-story rectangular frame dwelling with a gable roof one-story north wing. The dwelling, which probably dates to the 1830's, was altered extensively ca. 1943, and retains little of the appearance it had when photographed by the Historic American Buildings Survey in 1936. It is situated on a knoll overlooking Aquasco Road to its west and Croom Road to its northeast.

The three bay west facade of the main block has a centered one-story semi-octagonal projecting bay with a hipped roof and a large 16-light window. The second story was three six-over-six double-hung sash windows with wide vinyl surrounds and fixed vinyl shutters. The overhanging eaves are boxed and have no cornice. The HABS photograph shows this elevation having three nine-over-six sash windows on the first story and three six-over-six sash on the second story. The facade was surmounted by a centered gable dormer, which has been removed.

Green Hill is covered with horizontal vinyl siding. The windows are modern replacements. The cornice line has overhanging eaves and returns in the north and south gable ends. The building rests on a cement foundation. The house originally was covered with horizontal lapped wood siding and had a wood shingled roof.

Greenhill's gable roof has a "salt box" roofline, with a short west roof slope and a long east slope. This roofline is visible from the three-bay south gable end. Centered at the gable ridge is a wide exterior brick chimney, rebuilt in 1943. Narrow four-over-four windows flank the chimney at second and third floors. A shed roof, one-story screened porch shelters the second and third bays, an entry to the paved cement cellar and an entry to the kitchen. There is a cement-capped well in the south yard, close to the kitchen door.

In the 1936 HABS photograph of the south elevation, there were no windows on the main block. The long east roof slope was steeper and shorter. A one-story, gable roof frame wing was attached to the south gable end of the main block and enclosed the chimney. It was in poor condition, with a wood-shingle roof and extremely rough, irregular lapped wood siding.

The east (rear) elevation of the main block is two bays, the second bay a projecting semi-octagonal bay identical to that on the west facade. The north gable end of the main block has a narrow four-over-four window at loft level. The elevation is dominated by the two-by-one bay, one-and-one half story north wing, which was built in 1943, replacing a original one-story north wing. The north addition is very plain, having a gable

roof and the same siding and roofing as the main block. The north gable end has a centered six-over-six sash window on the first story and at loft level. The two bay west (front) facade is set flush with the main block and contains the dwelling's main entrance in the second bay. Entry is through a modern door with two vertical wood panels surmounted by a narrow window. The entrance is sheltered by a one bay hipped roof entrance porch, supported by two fluted white-painted metal pillars. The porch has a wooden floor set on a low brick base. The east (rear) side of the wing has a low shed roof one-by-one bay addition at the juncture where the wing attaches to the main block. This small addition contains one room at the end of the main entry hall and is also a ca. 1943 addition.

The interior of the house has a central hall with two flanking parlors. The hall and north parlor are in the north one-story wing. The original open-string stair remains, having scrolled, jigsaw brackets. The rectangular balusters and balustrade are probably ca. 1940's replacements. The flooring, wall plaster, doors and entry arches all date to the 1940's. Other visible original fabric surviving in the house is a beaded board-and-batten door in the unfinished attic. The attic of the main block has a combination of hewn and sawn rafters, and square-cut nails are visible.

The house stands on 55 acre farm. There is a 19th century barn to the northeast, overlooking the intersection of Croom and Aquasco Roads. The barn is two to three stories at the gable peak but the roof slopes down to one story level on the north and south sides. It is covered with a standing seam metal covering. The siding is of vertical board of irregular widths. The upper gables are sided with rough unlapped horizontal siding. The barn doors have old iron strap-hinges set on hinge pins. The sill is a large, hewn beam set on cement blocks. There is a shed roof one story addition on the barn's east side.

A line of cedars runs from Croom Road, behind the barn up to the house, following an old, unused entry from Croom Road to the house. Green Hill stands on a knoll above Aquasco Road. The gravel drive circles behind the house and intersects Aquasco Road in two locations, north and south of the house. There are three large boxwood bushes in the front (west) yard.

Green Hill is significant as an early 19th century dwelling that has been greatly altered in the 20th century, so that it now possesses few visible historic architectural features. Hidden features such as the structural timbers of the main two story block are probably original material. Green Hill is a landmark because it stands on a knoll overlooking the crossroads of Croom (Rte 382) and Aquasco (Rte 381) Roads, both roads dating from the 18th century.

Green Hill stands on the tract called "Poplar Hill", patented in 1666. ^{1/} When George Marriott acquired the acreage at the crossroads in 1830, it was called Colebrook. The Marriott family held the property through 1864, ^{2/} and George Marriott probably built the structure that appears in the 1936 Historic American Buildings Survey Photograph, entitled "Poplar Hill".

The building in the photograph is a three-part structure, the central block of which is now all that remains in the present structure. In the photograph the central block was a high narrow two story structure with a wide exterior south chimney, a centered gable dormer and 9/6 double-hung-sash windows on the west, side gable elevation. Its appearance suggests that it may have pre-dated Marriott's ownership. The one story north wing in the photograph had a hipped roof with Italianate cornice bracketing and contained the entry door and stair hall for the dwelling. This wing was totally reconstructed in 1943. ^{3/} The 1936 photograph also shows a roughly constructed south frame kitchen wing which was totally removed in 1943.

George Marriott's heirs sold 366 acres to Joseph Davis in 1864. ^{4/} The Davis family, who also owned Horsehead Tavern, and operated the Horsehead general store and post office, held the property through 1941. It was during their ownership that the property came to be called Green Hill. ^{5/}

The barn northeast of the house probably dates either to Marriott or Davis ownership of the property and is also a significant structure.

Greenhill is a two story, three bay, frame house with a large exterior chimney on the south gable at the ridge. The windows are six-over-six lights, and have exterior shutters. At the first floor level there is a centered, projecting, three-sided bay window. A gable roofed one-story wing, two bays wide, extends from the north end. The main entrance is in the second bay of the wing, sheltered by a small, nearly square porch with a hipped roof. The house is a two story, frame structure that was extensively rebuilt in the 1940's. The 1-1/2 story chimney with free standing stack and stepped weatherings is original but the rest of the structure is rebuilt on old framing. The facade is three bays with a bay window on the ground floor; to the north is a two bay wing. The wing is 1-1/2 stories and A-roofed; the main block is two stories with an extended roof-line to the rear.

North of the house is a tobacco barn. It has a belled A-roof. On each facade are double doors and several louvers for admitting air. The framing is mortised, tenoned and pegged. The sheathing is vertical boarding with horizontal weatherboarding in the gable ends.






NAME #87A-11 POPLAR HILL - TOBACCO BARN
