Description:

The P. A. Bowen farmstead is located at the highest point on the farm property on the outskirts of Aquasco in the southeastern tip of Prince George's County. It consists of a handsome mid-nineteenth century dwelling house and a group of functional outbuildings. The house is a two-and-one-story frame gable-roofed building, with three-bay main block, and one-bay south wing, as well as several later additions. Decorative elements include bracketed boxed cornice, and a one-story wrap-around porch which has chamfered posts with ornate brackets and pendants. The outbuildings include smoke house, milk barn, corncrib, shed and storage buildings and tobacco barns.

Significance:

The P. A. Bowen farm is located on a tract known as "Purchase", first patented by Thomas Truman in 1665. By the middle of the nineteenth century, 484 acres of "Purchase" and adjoining "Buttington" were owned and farmed by George A. M. Turner; at that time, the farm consisted of at least a dwelling house, tobacco shed, stable, meathouse (smoke house), and grist mill, and was sometimes known as "Aquasco Mill Farm". Turner died in 1861, leaving four minor orphan children. Philander A. Bowen and C. C. Magruder were the administrators of Turner's estate, and also the guardians of the Turner children. Bowen and Magruder petitioned the Prince George's County Court of Equity to order sale of Turner's real estate to pay his debts, so that his personal estate could be saved for the children; thus in 1862, 477-1/4 acres of "Purchase" and "Buttington" were sold to P. A. Bowen himself. He tore down Turner's dwelling and built the present house, moving his family in shortly after 1870. During the Bowens' residence, the farm was a self-sufficient community, including brick stable, ice house, meathouse, tobacco barns and corncrib situated near the dwelling house, as well as tenant dwellings and other functional buildings. Members of the Bowen family remained on the farm until 1927; in 1970, 17.8 acres including the house and most of the outbuildings, were sold to Stephen and Barbara Sonnett, the present owners. The farm, now known as Maplewood, is no longer a self-sufficient farm community, but the handsome dwelling house and extensive outbuildings constitute an excellent physical representation of a mid-nineteenth century farmstead, and a prominent landmark on the road west of Aquasco.

Summary Description - The P.A. Bowen farmstead is located at the highest point on the farm property on the outskirts of Aquasco in the southeastern tip of Prince George's County. It consists of a handsome mid-nineteenth century dwelling house and a group of functional outbuildings. The house is a two-and-one-half story frame gable-roofed building, with three-bay main block, and one-bay south wing, as well as several later additions. Decorative elements include a bracketed boxed cornice, and a one-story wrap-around porch which has chamfered posts with ornate brackets and pendants. The outbuildings include a smokehouse, milk barn, corn crib, shed and storage buildings, and tobacco barns.

General Description - The P.A. Bowen farmstead is located on the outskirts of Aquasco (Woodville) in the southeastern tip of Prince George's County. It is on the south side of Dr. Bowen Road, approximately one-half mile east of County Line Creek. The house is a frame gable-roofed building, with the principal facade facing east. This east facade consists of a three-bay two-and-one-half story main block with a one-bay two-story attached south wing. Entrance is in the first bay of the main block through a panelled double door with two-pane transom and four-pane sidelights. There is a one-story porch across the east facade which wraps around (and is screened on) the north gable end. The porch has chamfered posts, ornate brackets and pendants, and jig-sawn tracery, a pattern reflected in the bracketing of the boxed cornice. There are two dormers with bracketed raking cornices on the east slope of the roof of this main block. Windows on the first floor of the main block are 4/6 floor-to-ceiling double hung sashes. All windows have shutters. There are two interior chimneys with corbelled caps at the north gable end, and one interior chimney on the east slope of the south gable end of the main block.

The one-bay south wing consists of a single room, with an enclosed one-story east porch. This wing also has a bracketed boxed cornice, and its gabled roof line is masked by a parapeted false front. There is an interior chimney at the ridge of its south gable end.

There is a two-story, two-bay gable-roofed west wing attached to the rear of the house, recently extended by a one-bay gable-roofed one-and-one-half story addition. Another new one-room one-story addition fills the corner formed by the main block and the west wing.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

Significance - The P.A. Bowen farmstead is a fine example of a handsome mid-nineteenth century farmhouse with a complex of functional outbuildings. The farmstead is a prominent landmark on the road west of Aquasco, and the house, although it incorporates several twentieth century additions, retains some fine decorative detail on both the exterior and interior. Together, the whole complex serves to represent a typical prosperous mid-nineteenth farmstead.

History and Support - The P. A. Bowen farm is located on a tract known as "Purchase", first patented by Thomas Truman, in 1665, in Calvert County. After 1696, it was on the westmost edge of the southeast tip of the newly created Prince George's County. At the end of the eighteenth century a grist mill was built on County Line Creek, located on a tract called "Buttington" which adjoined "Purchase" on that tract's northwest corner. During the nineteenth century, parts of the two tracts together came to be known as "Aquasco Mill Farm."¹

By the middle of the nineteenth century, 484 acres of Buttington and Purchase were owned and farmed by George A. M. Turner. At that time, the farm consisted of at least a dwelling house, tobacco shed, stable, meat-house, and grist mill. Turner died in 1861 leaving four minor orphan children; Philander A. Bowen and Caleb Clarke Magruder were the administrators of Turner's estate and also the guardians of the four Turner children. Turner had been much in debt at the time of his death; accordingly, Bowen and Magruder petitioned the Prince George's County Court of Equity to order the sale of his real estate in order to pay his debts, so that his personal estate could be saved for the children. The Court so decreed, and thus the Turner farm (477-1/2 acres of Buttington and Purchase) was sold in 1862 to P.A. Bowen himself. Bowen's deed was not executed until 1869, and he did not move his family into the farm until after 1870; before moving onto the property, according to his grandson, Bowen tore down the Turner dwelling and built the present house.²

In plan, the main block consists of stairhall and front and back parlors. The main entrance leads into a wide stairhall; the handsome formal staircase has a heavy carved newel post with bulls-eye detail, and similarly carved balusters. Individual entrances lead (north) from the stairhall into the front parlor (living room) and rear parlor (dining room). Centered in the north wall of each parlor is a heavy stone mantel, painted white with keystone decoration. Between the two parlors are tall panelled double doors which retract into the dividing wall. There are pedestal chair-rails throughout. Ceilings are nearly 12 feet high. A door from the other side of the stairhall leads into the south wing which now serves as a library. The west wing contains a butler's pantry which has been remodeled into a kitchen. The (new) family room which fills the southwest corner is accessible from both stairhall and dining room.

Other notable features in the house are the carved wooden mantels in the three second floor bedrooms, and a large (4 foot diameter) cistern in the loft above the northwest bedroom. A metal plaque indicates that this cistern was manufactured by the Baltimore Cooperage Tank and Tower Builders, Baltimore, Maryland (no date).

The P.A. Bowen house sits atop the highest point on the property. The house faces the road and a gravel driveway ends in a circle in front of the house. North and west of the main house is a group of outbuildings, including a smokehouse, a milk barn, a corncrib, shed and storage buildings, and tobacco barns.

The smokehouse (24' x 12'10") is directly west of the main house. There is a window in the gable end that faces the house. The floor is concrete, the tiebeams are half-lapped over the plate, and the rafters sit directly on the plate. A small servants' house was built on the west end in 1939.

The milk barn has a gambrel roof and a cement floor and dates from the early twentieth century. A silo was added to the rear by Dr. W. S. Bowen. The milk barn lies west of the main house and faces east toward the house and toward the center of the open farm yard.

The corncrib is parallel to the milk barn and is of traditional posts mortised and pegged into plate and sill construction. Also, use of plank false plate supporting the rafters has been made. It is believed that the hand hewn timbers were reused from an earlier structure on the farm.

The shed and storage building lie approximately ten degrees northwest and southwest, respectively, of the main house. The shed is directly southeast of the milk barn and is a three-sided wooden structure that faces south. The storage building is northeast of the milk barn and faces north. It rests on metal cylinders and has a gambrel roof.

One of the tobacco barns, located approximately forty-five degrees northwest of the main house, has been converted into a horse barn. The other barn lies closer to the road, north of the horse barn, and is rented for hanging tobacco. This one rests on concrete blocks and has rafters that rest on a false plate. Its doors have traditional strap hinges and the barn has ventilating louvers and an enlargement on the south side, as evidenced by the asymmetrical gable roof.

There is a horse track west of the horse barn; several other outbuildings and landmarks, including a dog pen north of the house, make up the farmstead complex.

During the Bowens' residence, the farm was a self-sufficient community, including brick stable, ice house, meathouse, tobacco barns and corncrib situated near the dwelling house, as well as tenant dwellings and other functional buildings. Tobacco was the principal crop, but corn and wheat were also grown. Pigs provided the principal source of meat, as well as chicken, fish and oysters; dairy cattle provided all the milk necessary for family use.³

P. A. Bowen and his wife, Rachel Morton Bowen, had seven children. In 1913 they transferred the 477-1/4 acre farm to their second son, Dr. William Sinclair Bowen; he in 1920 deeded it to his sister Margaret and her husband, J. Frank Parran. In 1927, the Parrans sold 228 acres of the farm, including the present dwelling and farmstead. From 1927 to 1970, this farm was owned by the Craycroft and Elliott families; in 1970, 17.8 acres including the house and most of the outbuildings were sold to Stephen and Barbara Sonnett, the present owners. The following year the Sonnetts purchased an adjoining parcel which includes the remaining outbuildings and open land to the west; the farm is now known as Maplewood.⁴ The Sonnetts have constructed several additions to the house. They have re-sided and converted the old smoke house into a workshop, and converted the south tobacco barn into a horse barn. Maplewood Farm is now the full-time country residence of a professional family; it is no longer a self-sufficient farm community, but the handsome dwelling house and extensive outbuildings constitute an excellent physical representation of a mid-nineteenth century farmstead.









