The Charlie Long Farm, located on the west side of the Old Westover/
Princess Anne Road, contains a c.1860-1880 two-story side hall/ parlor
farmhouse. As typically built, the exterior decorative features are confined
to bracketed eaves and the front porch. A large brick chimney with corbelled
cap rises from the north gable end. The major outbuilding on the property
is a large weatherboard frame barn with a gable-front orientation. A slightly
projecting roof protects the hay rack apparatus.

The Charlie Long Farm is located on the west side of the Old Westover Road, just east of US Route 13, near Westover, Somerset County, Maryland. The farm complex consists of a third quarter of the 19th-century farmhouse and a bi-level frame hay barn of contemporary date. The two-story two-bay side hall/parlor house faces east with the main gable running north/south .

A brick pier foundation supports the asbestos clad weatherboard structure, while the medium sloped roof is covered with asphalt. The eaves of the main block are extended and trimmed with brackets. Extending to the rear are two, two-bay by one-room sections which serve as a dining room and kitchen.

The east (main) facade is two bays across with a shed roofed front porch covering the first floor. The paneled front door is located in the left (south) bay, while the remaining openings are filled with 6/6 sash windows.

The north gable end has two windows on each floor which flank the interior end brick chimney. A corbelled cap finishes the stack.

The rear wing is simply treated with the same sash and a flush gable end. An interior end brick chimney similar to that of the main house was replaced by a concrete block stove stack. Extending further west is the single-story kitchen which retains its period chimney stack. Shed porches cover the kitchen on two sides.

The major outbuilding on the property is a large weatherboarded frame barn with a gable-front orientation. A projecting roof protects the hay rack positioned in the peak of the roof.


