Facing the Jacksonville Road is a large two-story irregular plan frame house supported by a raised stretcher bond brick foundation. The steeply pitched roof and the gabled extensions are covered with pressed tin shingles. This well preserved Queen Anne style dwelling follows the standard irregular plan with a complex roof shape, but the exterior siding is not characteristically sheathed with a variety of shingles, weatherboards, and decorative siding which were popular during the last decades of the nineteenth century. Instead, the house represents the early twentieth century trend for cleaner, less cluttered wall surfaces. A common feature for the period is the Tuscan columned front porch.

Long House Description

The Long house is located off the Old Marion-Crisfield Road near Hopewell, Somerset County, Maryland. The two-story frame house faces north.

The large c. 1900-1910 four-square style house rests on a raised stretcher bond brick foundation and is uniformly sheathed with narrow weatherboards. The steeply pitched pyramidal roof is covered with pressed tin shingles and is topped by a delicate iron finial and a lightning rod. A gable roof extends from each side of the house.

The north (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with a side entrance and a two-story three-sided bay window. The first floor is covered by a Tuscan columned wraparound porch. The side entrance is comprised of an oval, beveled glass door and an adjacent colored glass window. To the left of the front door (east) is a three-side bay window lighted by single-pane sash windows, and covered by a gable-front roof pierced by a small single-pane sash window.

The east side elevation is similarly detailed with a two-story five-sided bay window covered by a gable-front roof that extends from the main roof. A side door is located in the north side of the bay and provides access from the side porch. Extending southward from the main block is a two-story service wing distinguished on the east side by a two-story porch. Rising from the interior of the house is a brick stove stack with a simply finished cap.

The west side elevation of the main block is finished in much the same manner as the previously described facades.

The interior of this house was not seen on the initial visit.



SIGNIFICANCE


The Long house is a well-preserved early twentieth century frame house built on a simplified Queen Anne style. The irregular floor plan and complex roof shapes are typical for the style, but the house is not characteristically sheathed with a combination of fishscale shingles, or trimmed with decorative sawnwork and spindles. Rather, the house represents the early twentieth century trend for cleaner, less elaborately detailed surfaces.
