The Old Marylander and Herald Office stands on the east side of North Somerset Avenue in the center business district of Princess Anne, Somerset County, Maryland. The single-story brick commercial building faces west with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around the turn of the twentieth century, the single-story, stretcher and common bond brick store building is two bays across by six bays deep. The medium pitched hip roof is covered in slate.

The west (main) elevation is two bays across with a side entrance and flanking plate glass display window. The partially glazed double door entrance is topped by a two-pane transom and wooden lintel. The entire door is slightly recessed within the brick wall, and plain, narrow pilasters flank the doorway. Likewise, the display window is recessed and topped by a wooden lintel.

The south side of the building is enclosed behind a bricked up alley that passes between the office building and the Old Brick Hotel (S-). The north side of the rectangular structure is defined by an irregular series of arched window and door openings. The seven-course common bond brick wall is pierced by five windows and doors. Single-pane sash windows and a rear double-door opening in the northeast corner are topped by segmental arches with incised decoration in the window headers. A narrow brick stove stack rises through the north roof slope.

The commercial space inside is finished in a straightforward manner with a small storefront display area and a large workroom in back. Until recently the building was fitted with printing equipment for the publication of the town newspaper.


