DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house is located about one-half mile south of Keiffer-Funk Road and about one-half mile east of White Hall Road in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated on an area of level ground and faces east.

The structure is a two-story, three-bay brick cased dwelling with white trim. A two-story, two-bay el extends to the rear or west.

The walls are set on low fieldstone foundations and are apparently stretcher bond and show no decorative arrangement except for flat brick arches over most openings.

Windows are placed at random and show narrow framing with mitered corners. They contain six-over-six pane double-hung sashes.

The main entrance is located in the center bay of the front elevation. The doorway is very simple in appearance and is framed similarly to the windows. Other entrances are located in the west and south elevations of the el.

A one-story, three-bay shed roof porch extends along the front elevation. A second one-story porch is present at the south wall of the el.

The roof is covered with sheet metal and extends for several inches beyond the end walls of the house. The eaves boxing is embellished with a simple band of molding. Brick chimneys rise from inside each gable end and a small open hipped roof belfry is set on a ridge of the el.

The interior of the house is divided into three rooms at the first story. The main room which includes the north half of the house has an enclosed stair in its northeast corner that leads to the second story. The el consists of one room at the first story and has a large fireplace at the north wall.

Near the house is a metal windmill. Some distance to the southeast is a large stone end bank barn.

The house is in fair to good condition and stands on a tract containing 103.25 acres.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The area of significance of this house is its architecture. Constructed of log it represents one of the major early building traditions of Washington County and the Cumberland Valley. Many log structures remain in use today but are sheathed with various types of siding or bricks.

The present appearance of the house is also worthy of note as a Victorian adaptation and alteration of an earlier structure.
