The frame Victorian house is a two and one-half two-bay by two-bay house. It is built on a rusticated concrete block foundation. The floor plan in L-shaped with the ell forming a gable section on the main facade. The house is covered with wood siding painted white on the first story and shingles and wood siding painted green on the second story. The date of construction is early 20th century.

The house is located on the east side of Alt. Rt. 40, .18 mile north of Benevola Church Road in Benevola. The house is located near the top of a hill heading from the main intersection of Benevola. There is large white concrete block wall in front of the house. The main facade faces west.

The main facade consists of two section formed by the ell shape of the house. The projecting gable end of the ell has a three-section window on the first story and a two-section window centered above on the second story. In the gable is a half circle window. The gable has a molded cornice that returns at the gable end. The entrance to the house is located on the projecting side of the ell. The entrance has an eight-pane door with a transom. The other section of the main facade has six-over-six windows on both the first and second story bays. The main facade has a full-length, one-story hipped roof porch on round wooden columns. The house is built on a rusticated concrete block foundation. It has a brick chimney rising from the center of the ell. The design and the multi-color pattern of this house gives it particularly Victorian flavor.

There are no significant outbuildings on the property.




