Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

No. 141 S. Main Street, currently occupied by Reeders Memorial Home, was formerly known as Rose Hill and the Lilacs. The earliest part of this complex was built ca. 1814 by Dr. Ezra Slifer. Slifer built the U.S. Hotel building at 2 South Main Street in 1811. Rose Hill is now incorporated into the Reeders Memorial Home. A twin of Rose Hill was built about 70-100 years ago, and now stands north of the original building. Both buildings have been modified to suit the needs of the home for the aged, but the basic form of the buildings is evident. The original block is three-story stuccoed masonry structure with side-gabled metal roof. The original two-story porches have been enclosed into three-story shed-roofed bays. Between the two buildings is a metal fire escape. The second building is the near twin of original, but with a large, two-story gable addition at the rear parallel to the ridge line. South of the original building is a gable-roofed masonry (parged brick) outbuilding with metal roof and interior chimney. In the hill behind the house is a stone parapet which apparently fronts a bunker or root cellar built into the hillside. According to Doug Bast, town historian, The Lilacs or Rose Hill, was featured in a play by David Belasco entitled "The Heart of Maryland", written ca. 1895. Though altered, the form of the house is apparent, and the significance of the house in Boonsboro's history is well documented. This a contributing resource to the Town of Boonsboro Historic District.



141 South Main Street is an extensively remodeled residential structure that bears little resemblance to the original structure. A large, three-story stuccoed building, it now contains one-bedroom apartments that are currently vacant. The property contains several historic outbuildings, as well as a modern nursing facility on the hill above the house.

A lone building of similar configuration is indicated on the 1877 map of the town. By 1897, the stone house is shown with a smaller brick structure (extant) to its south and a frame building behind it. All the Sanborns (1897-1940) label the building as a dwelling. According to a walking tour brochure of the town, the house was constructed about 1809 for Dr. Ezra Slifer, who named it "the Lilacs." Because the hill on which it was located was full of wild roses, the property came to be known as Rose Hill with the house being called "the Lilacs on Rose Hill." The house was the setting of David R. Belasco's successful play "Heat of Maryland," which was made into a movie around 1915.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Development Period of Rural-Agrarian Intensification, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
