The house at 18848 Sandy Hook Road contributes to the National Register eligible Sandy Hook district in terms of location, design, setting and materials. The mid-19th century house is located on Sandy Hook Road, the main road of the linear village, and contributes to the streetscape. Like the majority of the houses in the community, the house is built into the hill (Maryland Heights) which rises above the town and is oriented to Sandy Hook Road, the RR tracks and River. Constructed of log, the house is similar in appearance to its frame and stone neighbors. Most of the houses in the village are one-and-one-half or two stories, three or five bays with gable roofs paralleling the road and single story front porches, varying only in construction material and minor details. As with many of the houses in the district, this house has had new windows and artificial siding installed. However, it still retains the original form and has sufficient integrity to contribute to the district.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The log house is a one and three-quarters story structure covered in aluminum siding. The one and three-quarters height as well as the centrally located brick chimney make this structure different from many in Sandy Hook. It has a four bay main facade with entrances located in the outer bays. Fenestration of the three-quarters story includes two closely arranged windows on each side of the facade. Window sash is modern. The structure has a gable roof. The date of construction is mid-19th century.

The property is located on the north side of Sandy Hook Road, approximately .05 mile west of Clark Road, in Sandy Hook. The house sits on a slight rise from the road level. The main facade faces south.

The one and three-quarters story structure is constructed of log covered in a modern aluminum siding on a fieldstone foundation. The main facade is asymmetrically arranged. It has an entrance in the easternmost bay. Two-over-two sash windows are in the other bays of the first story. The second story has modern aluminum sash windows grouped two to a side. The structure has a full-length, one-story front porch on square posts with a slat railing. The gable ends have a single window on each story and a small window to light the gable. The roof has a boxed cornice and is covered in sheet metal. The brick chimney rises from a central location at the peak of the roof.






