The Frank Simpson House, built in 1898, is located on the north side of Williams Lane, in the Village of Chevy Chase, Section 5. The house is a 2-1/2-story, L-shaped, vernacular Queen Anne house characterized by its projecting front gable and its wrap-around porch. The frame structure has weatherboard walls and is covered with a cross gable roof clad with decoratively shaped asphalt shingles.

The south and principal elevation of the house faces Williams Lane and consists of the two-bay end wall of the main wing of the ell. The first story consists of a side entry door and a single four-light, double-hung window, while the second story has two 1/1 windows. Corner boards frame the corners of the wall and support a plain frieze board which separates the second story from the projecting gable and attic level. The gable is steeply pitched and clad with wood shingles and articulated by a projecting raking cornice and cornice returns. The gable presents a central tri-partite window which features a single 1/1 sash flanked by lower undivided and fixed sidelights. A one-story porch with a hipped roof supported by wood columns with scroll-sawn knee brackets wraps around from the front to the east side of the house. The front porch is three bays wide and raised above ground level. It is reached by a set of stairs leading to the front entry door which is located to the side. The ceiling has narrow beaded boards.

On the east side of the front wing, the porch, which historically extended three bays to meet the cross wing of the house, has been enclosed with glass at its two end bays. A second-story sleeping porch sits atop the enclosed first-story section.

There is a one-story enclosed addition on the west side of the house at the intersection of the projecting main wing and the rear wing. It has weatherboard walls and a half-hipped roof clad with asphalt shingles.

The rear wing of the house projects one bay to the west side of the main wing. This bay is defined by the one-story addition on the first story and by a single 1/1 window on the second story.

The north (rear) elevation of the house was not accessible.

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The Frank Simpson House represents the beginning of the Williams Station community that grew along Williams Lane, providing newcomers with access to the Chevy Chase Land Company streetcar stop located on Connecticut Avenue. It also represents the earliest Williams Lane house built by a person outside the Williams family on land that was once part of the Williams Farm. The house was built in 1898 by Frank Simpson, a prominent local builder whose extended family lived and worked in Chevy Chase in various branches of the construction business.

In January 1898, John M. C. "Clayton" Williams sold a 1/5 acre lot to Frank Simpson for \$500. This low price indicates that no house was yet constructed on this site. Simpson built a house within the next few months as it was assessed the same year with improvements of \$1,200.¹

Frank Simpson was a carpenter-builder whose family had previously settled on Jones Mill Road, near Small's Nursery. He lived here with his wife, Grace, and family. Frank and Grace Simpson were founding members and leaders of the Chevy Chase United Methodist Church which they helped organize in 1912, and Frank was elected to the first Board of Trustees. They were active members of the Section 5 Citizens Association, and Frank Simpson served as building inspector for many years. In 1920, other family members living at their residence included their 7-year-old daughter, Grace's mother, Flora, and three nieces.²

Williams Lane was originally a private access road. Clayton Williams had established a farm in the vicinity in 1883, with no house at 3807 Williams Lane.³ By 1905, seven years after Simpson had built his house, the road was 20 feet wide. In 1911, the Simpson address was listed as "Williams Station." The road is first shown on a 1910 map by which time five residences had

been built.⁴

Frank and Grace Simpson bought and sold property on both sides of Williams Lane during their residency. They purchased the Laura Williams House from her estate in 1910 and later sold it to realtor Edward H. Jones. The Simpsons also acquired from the Williams heirs the 1.2 acre parcel immediately east of their house.⁵

By 1923, Frank Simpson moved to 7315 Brookville Road where his brother had built a house. In 1925 the house on Williams Lane was advertised for sale for \$15,000:

This fine property within half a square of Connecticut Avenue, facing south on a paved street, probably represents the maximum it is possible to secure in a real home in this desirable community. The house is splendidly built and has just been thoroughly renovated. There are eight rooms...large screened sleeping porch; bath and extra toilet and lavatory; oak floors throughout...There are several outbuildings which provide ample housing facilities for ponies or horses, as well as space for several automobiles. Many shade trees."⁶

Throughout much of the remaining 20th century, the house has been preserved under the stewardship of Francis X. and Ilene Emmet.

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
