**Description:** The Thomas Carrico Property, located on the north side of Prince Frederick Road in the Hughesville vicinity, Charles County, is a circa 1870 I-house. The 2½-story, 5-bay, wood-frame structure has a stone foundation, wood clapboard siding and two, interior brick chimneys. The side-gable roof is covered with asphalt sheets and has a center gable on the front (south) elevation. The structure has a center-hall plan, with a 2-story rear ell and a 1-story, shed roof addition located at the intersection of the main block and the rear ell.

**Significance:** Thomas Carrico purchased 44 hectares (110 acres) of land in 1868 and an I-house was constructed on the property circa 1870. The parcel associated with the premises was transferred multiple times in the twentieth century, reducing its land to 3.5 hectares (8.7 acres) by the 1970s. In 1994, the current owners, Ralph and Elizabeth Ann Beach, subdivided the property. The historic residence is now located on a 1.2 hectares (3 acre) lot and a modern residence has been constructed on the adjacent lot. This 5-bay I-house is an excellent representative example of an architectural style prevalent in the nineteenth century. The structure exhibits such stylistic elements as a full-width, front porch with decorative features, a center gable, a central entry with side-lights and transom, and 2/2 wood-frame windows. In addition, the integrity of the form of the structure is intact, including the center-hall plan, and the rear ell, characteristic of this building type.

The Thomas Carrico Property, located on the north side of Prince Frederick Road in the Hughesville vicinity, Charles County, is a circa 1870 I-house. The 2½-story, 5-bay, wood-frame structure has a stone foundation, wood clapboard siding and two, interior brick chimneys. The side-gable roof is covered with asphalt sheets and has a center gable on the front (south) elevation. The structure has a center-hall plan, with a 2-story rear ell and a 1-story, shed roof addition located at the intersection of the main block and the rear ell.

The south, or front elevation has a full-width porch with a wood floor and wood posts with decorative brackets. The porch has a hipped roof with a center gable. The first floor of the elevation has a central entry with a wood-paneled door, 2-light side-lights and a 2-light transom. In addition, there are four, 2/2 double-hung, wood windows on the first story. The second story has five, 2/2 double-hung, wood windows.

The west elevation of the main block has one, 2/2 double-hung, wood window on both the first and second stories. The rear ell also has one, 2/2 double-hung, wood window on both the first and second stories.

The north, or rear elevation of the main block is partially concealed by the rear ell and the 1-story rear addition. The exposed portion of the main block has two, 2/2 double-hung, wood windows on the second story. The north elevation of the rear ell has one, 2/2 double-hung, wood window on both the first and second stories. The 1-story addition has one, 8/8 double-hung, wood window and one, wood-paneled door.

The east elevation of the main block has one, 2/2 double-hung, wood window on the first story and two, 2/2 double-hung, wood windows on the second story. The first story of the rear ell is concealed by the 1-story addition. The second story of the ell has one, 2/2 double-hung, wood window. The 1-story addition has one, 8/8 double-hung, wood window.

Interior access to the property was not available.

Four outbuildings, constructed circa 1900, are associated with the property. The first outbuilding is a 1-story, wood-frame shed with wood clapboard siding and a shed roof. It is located northeast of the house.

The second outbuilding is a 1-story, wood-frame shed with wood clapboard siding and a flat roof and is located north of the house and northwest of the first shed.

The third outbuilding is a 1½-story, wood-frame shed with vertical wood siding. It has a metal, gable roof and is located north of the house, northwest of the first shed, and southwest of the second shed.

The fourth outbuilding is a 1-story, wood-frame shed with a gable roof. It has a ½-story, shed roof extension to the south and is clad with vertical wood siding. The structure is located northwest of the house, and west of the other three sheds.

The property is set at an angle to Prince Frederick Road, and is now bordered to the west by a modern residence.

Thomas Carrico purchased 44 hectares (110 acres) of land in 1868 and an I-house was constructed on the property circa 1870. Thomas Carrico was a doctor in the Hughesville area. Thomas Carrico was born in 1827 and died in 1902. He married Mary E. Dent, who inherited one of her family's farms east of Hughesville. It is likely that Thomas Carrico, M.D. of Hughesville was related the Carrico families in both Hughesville and Bryantown. All Carricos in the area are buried in the St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in Bryantown, including Thomas Carrico, M.D. of Hughesville. Also buried at the same cemetery is Louis C. Carrico, M.D., of Evergreen Farm in Bryantown. Louis Carrico was born in 1860 and died in 1921. He purchased Evergreen Farm in 1908. It is likely that both Thomas Carrico and Louis Carrico were related since there were numerous members of the Carrico family in both Hughesville and Bryantown, and both are buried in the same cemetery.

The parcel associated with the premises was transferred multiple times in the twentieth century, reducing its land to 3.5 hectares (8.7 acres) by the 1970s. In 1994, the current owners, Ralph and Elizabeth Ann Beach, subdivided the property. The historic residence is now located on a 1.2 hectares (3 acre) lot and a modern residence has been constructed on the adjacent lot.

The Maryland Colony was granted by King Charles I to Lord Baltimore in 1632. Two years later, the first European community was established at St. Mary's City. Subsequent colonization moved north, along the Potomac and Patuxent Rivers. As settlers migrated away from St. Mary's City, the formation of a new county became necessary, and Charles County was founded in 1658. This area was originally inhabited by Algonquins of the Powhatan Confederacy. Road clearing began in the mid-eighteenth century as a result of the establishment of port towns and Maryland's rising population. Tobacco cultivation dominated the economic and social life of Charles County until the mid-nineteenth century when soil exhaustion required agricultural diversification. The introduction of rail lines in the late nineteenth century linked Charles County with the north and south, encouraging trade. While the suburbanization of Charles County was ensured by the widespread availability of the automobile in the mid-twentieth century, the County has retained its rural and agricultural character.

The area that became Hughesville was located in Lord Baltimore's grant of 6,879.9 hectares (17,000 acres) of Newport Hundred to Major William Boarman during 1650-1699. This land included the region "east of Zachiah Swamp" and became known as Boarman's Manor. Hughesville does not

appear on an 1840 Map of a Part of Maryland, and Fisher's 1852 Gazetteer of the State of Maryland did not list the community. Hughesville was located at the crossroads of two of the main routes through Charles County: Burnt Store to Patuxent City and on to Annapolis, (Burnt Store Road and Prince Frederick Road/Route 231) and Bryantown to Charlotte Hall and on to St. Mary's City (Leonardtwn Road/Route 5). Accordingly, Hughesville is shown on Martenet's 1866 Map of Maryland, Atlas Edition. The 1871 State Gazette and Merchants and Farmers Directory for Maryland and the District of Columbia called Hughesville a "post town." Bland's 1887 Maryland Directory and State Gazetteer listed both Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches in Hughesville as well as a Friends' school, four (4) general merchandise stores, two (2) saloons, two (2) undertakers, a wheelwright, a blacksmith, a tobacco buyer, and a population of fifty (50). Gannett's 1904 Gazetteer of Maryland defined Hughesville as a "post village...on the Washington, Potomac and Chesapeake Railroad" (Gannett 1904: 43). By 1906 the community was known as "a station of the Southern Maryland Railroad...and a banking town" with two (2) physicians, two (2) general stores, two (2) blacksmiths, a grist and saw mill, a flour mill, an undertaker and livery, a hotel, a hotel and saloon, a grocer and saloon, an insurance salesman, and a population of 150 (Maryland 1906: 667).

The standard I-house, like the residence on the Thomas Carrico Property, is one room deep and two stories tall with three to five openings on each story. From the front, an I-house is often indistinguishable from a Georgian house. The gable view, however, reveals the greater depth of the Georgian house. Chimneys are most often located on the interior of the gable ends, however, some I-houses can have central, interior end or exterior end chimneys. Usually, an I-house has a 1-story porch running the length or nearly the length of the long side. On the interior, a central hall separates the two rooms on the first floor; the second floor contains either two or four sleeping chambers. Due to the narrowness of the main core, many I-houses have kitchen wings to the rear. During the Victorian period, pre-cut detailing or a 2-tiered porch was commonly grafted onto the traditional I-house. The I-form was popular into the early twentieth century, with examples appearing in catalogs of mass-produced suburban houses (Gowans 1992, 55-6).

National Register Evaluation:

The Thomas Carrico Property, which includes a circa 1870 I-house, is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C. The 5-bay I-house is an excellent representative example of an architectural style prevalent in the nineteenth century. The structure exhibits such stylistic elements as a full-width, front porch with decorative features, a center gable, a central entry with side-lights and transom, and 2/2 wood-frame windows. In addition, the integrity of the form of the structure is intact, including the center-hall plan, and the rear ell, characteristic of this building type. The period of significance for the structure extends from circa 1870 to 1947. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. Finally, the structure has no known potential to yield important information, and therefore, is not eligible under Criterion D.



Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:

The National Register boundary for the Thomas Carrico Property follows the property lines of 15500 Prince Frederick Road in the Hughesville vicinity, Charles County (Tax Map 35, Parcel 152). This approximately 1.2 hectare (3 acre) parcel is bounded on the south by Prince Frederick Road and on the north, east and west by adjacent tax parcels. The boundary includes the house and four sheds, which all contribute to the significance of the property. According to deed research, the property was originally part of a 44 hectares (110 acre) parcel purchased by Thomas Carrico in 1868.


