ca. 1830

This two story frame Federal house is five bays in length at the principle facade with two external chimneys at each end. Directly over the main entrance door is what appears to be the central part of a palladian window. It is not known whether this is an alteration of an original three part window ^{or not}. At one end is a later two story frame wing.

HAMPTON

Built by David Carcand this large two part frame house began as a two story, three bay Federal house that was altered in 1844 by the addition of a two story extension at one end. At one end is a two and one half story frame wing. Alterations made in 1946 include a two story columned porch at the principle facade and a paladian window at the garden elevation (rear facade). The whole of the interior is Greek Revival.

NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC NO <p>The house is frame, 2 1/2 stories high, and 5 bays wide, with a smaller 2 1/2 storey addition. Originally when built in 1830 the house was 3 bays wide with a door on the right, in 1844 2 more bays were added to the right of this to make a symmetrical 5 bay house. The projecting pediment with 2 storey columns is new and along with the Palladian window on the garden facade, added in 1946. There are double chimneys at both ends of the main house. The wing on the left has a chimney on its left end also. All the chimneys are new replacements of the original ones. The timber used in the construction of the house (poplar framing with oak sills) was all hewn and pit-sawn on the property. The staircase, very simple late federal, is of apple wood.</p> <p>The interior woodwork of the house is Greek revival, door and window frames, and the chair rail. All of the interior doors of the house opened from right to left, instead of the conventional left to right so that the occupant of a room would have a slight warning before being seen when a slave opened the door.</p> <p>The house is haunted. There is a wailing voice in the orchard and the slaves once claimed that the whipping post in the basement constantly had blood bubbling up around it.</p> <p>During the Civil War Southern troops raided the oxen from the farm. The original owner Mr. David Carcaud died in 1831. His wife married a Mr. Cracklin who has had his head split open in 1850 by a farm slave. She then married a Mr. Sunderland. The wife and all three of her husbands are buried on the property.</p> <p>The house is on a high hill and is the second highest point in the county.</p>


