CEDAR HILL

As the only 18th. century example of cruciform domestic architecture now standing in Southern Maryland, Cedar Hill is of great architectural significance. Of brick construction and one and one half storys in height it is three bays in length and has an exterior chimney at each end excepting the two story porch tower at the facade. The center hall still retains an early stair though it has not been determined whether or not it is original. The north, ground floor room, is completely sheathed with fielded panels, this treatment believed to be original to the house. Other interior woodwork dates from the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries.

Like its neighbor "Willow Glen", Cedar Hill is a National Register property. Although its name is Nineteenth Century in origin, Cedar Hill, in fact, 1750's structure dates from the second quarter of the Eighteenth Century and has been cited for its significance as one of the few remaining examples of the cruciform plan.

7. DESCRIPTION continued

Northeast off the hall is the parlor with one raised panel wall, paneled window seats and wainscot, and glazed corner cabinet with an arch like that in the hall. The cabinet is decorated with a carved shell and fluted columns. A late mantel has been applied over the paneling, reducing the opening of the fireplace. Late Federal trim with corner blocks has been applied around the door and windows.

On the opposite side of the hall is a smaller room that has original window trim and a Federal mantel with an opening smaller than that of the original fireplace. Beyond the hall (southwest) is a cross-hall, or corridor, with exterior doors on both ends, and the present dining room. As in the two front rooms the size of the diningroom fireplace was reduced and trimmed with a Federal mantel, this one with gouge carving. Flanking the fireplace is an enclosed stair and a passage leading to the present kitchen which was enlarged from a closet with a small window. A large string of frame additions is built on the southeast side of the house.

On the second story, the rooms correspond with those below. The porch chamber has a very low ceiling and three windows with a superb view of the Patuxent River. Each room has very simple trim and two panel doors. Above the diningroom there has been some alteration to accomodate a modern bath.

Most of the construction details are exposed in the attic which extends above the whole house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Cedar Hill is significant as an example of a cruciform house built in the eighteenth century that is typical of seventeenth century architecture. Bond Castle in Calvert County, which burned in the twentieth century, was a better known example of the same type of architecture.¹

The exterior and the floor plan of Cedar Hill correspond to documents describing the house of John Bigger, which was built before 1714.² However, the interior details, the support system in the basement, and the roof construction indicate a date in the second quarter of the eighteenth century. The absence of Calvert County records before the 1880's compounds the difficulty of documenting the date of Cedar Hill.

The name Cedar Hill dates from the nineteenth century. The house and its surrounding lands were originally called Bigger, after its first owner, John Bigger. A Calvert County tobacco planter, Bigger supplemented his income through mercantile activities. He bought goods in England and sold them to his neighbors in return for their tobacco. As Aubry Land of the University of Georgia has indicated, most colonial Maryland fortunes were founded by merchant planters.³ In addition to his business life, Bigger served in the Calvert County militia, in the colonial assembly, and as a treasurer of King William School in Annapolis.

8. SIGNIFICANCE continued

After John Bigger's death, his considerable estate and cruciform house became the property of his widow, Anne Bigger, who subsequently married Patrick Andrew. Andrew continued living in Bigger's house after his wife died, even though John Bigger's will had stipulated that the property was to go to his nephew, Kendal Head. Head conveyed the title to James Carroll of Annapolis who brought suit against Andrew and won an ejectment.

In the 1730's, the house was rented to, and then bought by, Thomas Crompton. Architectural details in Cedar Hill indicate that the house was built during the Crompton period. Documentary evidence indicates that he did live in a cruciform house similar to Cedar Hill.⁴

Crompton died in 1743. His widow married James Weems, a wealthy Calvert County planter who held Bigger in trust for Thomas Crompton's son Thomas Crompton until 1767. The house and land remained in the Crompton family passing to Thomas Crompton's (d. 1773) daughter, Mary Crompton Gantt, and then to his grandson, Dr. Thomas Gantt (d. 1829). After Dr. Gantt's death, Cedar Hill became the property of his son, Virgil Gantt, who operated a farm there until 1871.

The next owner was Mason Locke Weems, the President of Weems Steamboat Line which operated passenger boats on the Chesapeake Bay between Baltimore and southern Maryland. The house had a succession of owners in the twentieth century. In the 1940's, Charles Smith Hamilton and his wife restored Cedar Hill. The current owners, Mr. and Mrs. Eric Schneider, are continuing a restoration program for the house.





The Noises at Cedar Hill

Cedar Hill in Calvert County near Barstow is the only example of cruciform domestic architecture now standing in southern Maryland. The brick one-and-a-half-story house, center of a tobacco plantation, was built in the early 1700s on 5,000 acres of land deeded in 1666. It was the second-largest homesite in the county. Cedar Hill's imaginative builder is thought to have been John Bigger, whose name was found on an eighteenth-century deed. The builder, whoever he may have been, was apparently something of an engineer and astronomer, for he purposely constructed the house in the shape of a cross. Intriguingly, the cross is positioned so that twice a year, during the spring and fall equinoxes, the sun passes directly over the long axis of the building, from the front door to the back of the house. Consequently six months of the year the sun rises and sets on the north side of the house, and the other six months of the year on the south side. (Several additions have been made to the original structure, the most recent one in 1938.) Cedar Hill is also unusual in that it is one of the few old homes that appears to have been constantly occupied.

Twenty years ago, Eric Schneider first saw Cedar Hill and decided to buy it and rent it out until he was able to live in it himself. The first stories of strange happenings at Cedar Hill began with some of Eric's tenants. One woman used to complain that a throw

rug she used in a downstairs hallway was always being rolled up and pushed to one side of the hall no matter how many times she straightened it out.

Harry and Lenore Markard's unexplained experiences in the home in the early 1980s began the day they and their children moved in, when a door inexplicably slammed shut behind Harry's brother, who was helping with the move. The television set and several light switches would turn on by themselves and one of Lenore's sisters was once mysteriously tapped on the shoulder by an unseen hand while visiting at the house. Yet another time, Harry and his nephew were carrying wood through the kitchen when a door slammed shut by itself behind them. The same nephew thought that he saw a man dressed in a Civil War uniform standing in the den one night.

The most disturbing incident that happened to the Markards during their year-and-a-half stay at Cedar Hill involved Harry. For some time, the family had heard odd noises coming from the attic area. Harry decided to investigate; after searching the attic without having been able to locate anything, he turned to come back down the attic stairs. Suddenly, he felt something from behind push him and he fell the length of the stairway. Fortunately, he was not seriously injured, although he still carries a scar where a nail on the side of the stairway caught his arm on the way down. No one was ever able to find out the reason for the seemingly unprovoked attack.

The ghost, however, is not without some sense of humor. On one occasion, Harry was trying to pull the basement door shut but was unable to, as it kept being pulled by someone or something on the other side. After this tug-of-war scene had gone on for several minutes, Harry decided to give up. He shrugged his shoulders and said, "Okay, I don't care." Immediately, the door swung shut.

According to Harry and Lenore, the supernatural activities at Cedar Hill came to an end after they decided to clean up an area they had found near the house that contained the graves of some much earlier residents. Weeding and minor adjustments to fallen

gravestones seemed to appease Cedar Hill's unseen presence and the Markards, at least, were no longer troubled by strange events in their home.

The unexplained noises and activities at the old house were not to be stopped for long, however. Shortly after Eric and his wife Carol took up permanent residence at Cedar Hill, they began to hear the sound of a rocking chair rocking back and forth. The sound seems to come from the attic, and both day and night is highly audible in the master bedroom directly below it. Eric says that many nights the sound continues for hours—sometimes, he suspects, long after he and Carol have fallen off to sleep. Eric has not been able to find any explanation for the rocking chair noise although, like Harry, he has searched the attic thoroughly. Maybe it is time for the old graveyard to be tidied up again.
