## BROOKS METHODIST CHURCH

The Brooks Methodist Church has been demolished since first being recorded in 1967. At that time, it was described as being "in need of repairs" and was noted for its "gingerbread and gothic decorations". Among those were fleur-de-lis patterned bargeboards.

Photographs show that the building was a wooden frame and clapboard structure, three bays wide and four bays deep. There was an entrance tower decorated with fishscale shingles and a diamond shaped window. The transom over the entrance door, as well as the other windows, are gothic-arch windows with tracery. Brinkman reported these to have contained panels of colored glass.

It is unfortunate that this building did not survive, for it documented nearly a century of the history of this congregation, which claims to be the oldest Methodist Church in the county. According to its own published history, the Brooks Methodist Church was organized in the early nineteenth century. The first building was known as "the meeting house" and public records show the church as being known by several names including "Brooks Chapel", "Brooks Methodist Church and Parsonage", "Colored Methodist Church of Calvert County", and the "Island Creek Church". It was named "Brooks Church" in 1908 in honor of John I. Brooks, a local pastor and undertaker. The "meeting house", which also served as a school, burned c. 1881 and was eventually replaced by this late Victorian building. Both this building and the white Methodist Church, which was its neighbor, stood on ground which people say was donated by the Waters family. Some believe that this donation took place as early as the 1840's. GWD 6/115 of the Land Records of Calvert County indicates that Sewell D. Waters

and his wife Elizabeth conveyed three acres to the "Trustees of the Methodist Church and School of the Colored Population" in 1867. It is not possible that a church existed on this spot prior to taking title for the land.

The Waters Memorial Church is of a different style than the old Brooks building, but is of the same vintage. Both churches shared the same graveyard and stood within one hundred yards of each other. One served the white community and the other the colored. Both owe their beginnings to the Waters family and shared a long history of serving the Methodist community in this area. Many important family names, both black and white, can be found in the cemetery, names which are connected with many of the historic names in the Island Creek and Mutual area.

It is interesting to note that both buildings were known as the "Island Creek Methodist Church" and that both assumed their present names in 1908. According to JLB 54/352 it was at this time the white church became Waters Memorial Methodist Church.
