The Prince Frederick High School is significant as the first high school in Prince Frederick. It is architecturally significant as an example of early twentieth century Georgian Revival-influenced school design. The wood-framed, two-story, hip-roofed building has a symmetrical five-bay facade featuring a central vestibule and second-story Palladian window. Fenestration consists of tall nine over nine, double-hung windows.

The old Prince Frederick High School is located on the west side of Main Street south of the County Courthouse in Prince Frederick, Maryland. It is situated on a slight rise above the road with a semicircular driveway providing access to the front of the building. The rear of the site slopes downwards to woodlands.

The school building is of wood-framed construction and stands two stories high above a basement of concrete and rock-faced concrete block. The east facade is ordered symmetrically with a central projecting vestibule. This vestibule which is reached by concrete steps and a modern handicapped ramp has double, four-light, two-panel doors surmounted by a 14-light transom. The doors are flanked by double pilasters that provide ornamental support for a deep, molded cornice. The second floor of the central bay contains a Palladian window. Its central 12 over 12 sash is topped by a semicircular six-light window, and the central window is flanked by narrow 4 over 6 sash windows. Pilasters, similar to those flanking the entrance, frame the sidelights and support a broken cornice with a keystone arch above the central window.

The two bays that flank the central bay of the facade are defined by large nine over nine, double hung sash windows in both the first and second story. The front (east portion) of the block projects a single bay from the wider, rear portion of the building. Side walls of the building are also fenestrated with nine over nine, double hung sash windows. A steel fire escape extends along the north wall of the front portion of the block and provides access to a steel fire door in the east wall of the rear portion of the block. The concrete foundation is exposed along the side and rear walls of the building with textured concrete blocks used on the south elevation. The basement was originally illuminated by windows, but most of these windows have been boarded over. The walls of the building are sheathed in cement-asbestos shingles, and the roof junction is marked by a molded, sheet metal cornice. The shallow, hipped roof is clad in standing seam metal, and a tall, square stove chimney projects from the north slope of the roof.

The former Prince Frederick High School building is significant for both its architecture and its historic association with the development of public education in Calvert County. Architecturally, the school is an example of simple, Georgian Revival-influenced school design. It is the only two-story early twentieth century school in Calvert County. This design was chosen to accommodate the primary grades on the first floor and the high school classes above.

The high school has historic significance in reflecting the growth of public education in Calvert County during the 1920s. Before the World War I, parents of Calvert County children who desired a high school education for their children had to send them out of the county, either to private schools, such as Charlotte Hall and Saint Mary's Female Seminary, or to cities such as Washington and Baltimore where children lived with relatives while attending public school.

Planning for the Prince Frederick High School began at the August 5, 1919 meeting of the Board of Education during which a committee was appointed for the purpose of erecting a high school in Prince Frederick. This committee consisted of George D. Turner, chairman; Superintendent T.G. Bennett, secretary; and members William E. Northam, Thomas Parran, John B. Gray, Perry P. Owings and Stanley Sutherland.

The contract for the building of the Prince Frederick High School was approved during the February 8, 1921 board meeting. The contract was awarded to Lyons and Gibson for the sum of \$26,000. The architect for the school was Walter M. Gieske. At the July 21, 1921 board meeting, John G. Rouse was selected as the first principal of the high school. He served for two years and was followed by Jesse P. Puillen.

The Board officially accepted the high school from the contractor on December 16, 1921. The school's first graduation ceremony was held on June 14, 1924.

Frances G. Stevens described the school in her *History of Education in Calvert County, Maryland*:

Prince Frederick School was a two story building...to house both a two- or three-teacher high school on the second floor and a two-teacher elementary school on the ground floor. It also had rooms for an office, a library, and--a great innovation--boys' and girls' bathrooms. Its distinctive feature was a fire escape, a cylindrical chute like a huge hollow caterpillar, shooting children from second floor to ground outside in a swift stream.

Another innovation in this school was its central heating system with a coal-burning furnace, and a water system supplying radiators and bathrooms from its own drilled artesian well (Stevens 1976:29-30).

Soon after its completion, residents and county officials realized that the building was too small to accommodate needs. After little more than 10 years at the original location, the high school moved to a larger building elsewhere in Prince Frederick, later used as the Prince Frederick Elementary School.

This early twentieth-century lodge building faces east onto Maryland Route 765. It is set on a molded concrete foundation. It is a two-story framed and weatherboarded structure with a low hipped roof. The five-bay facade is dominated by an advanced one-story entrance bay on which transomed double doors are flanked by paired Doric pilasters and surmounted by a classical cornice. Above this entrance is a classical three-part Palladian window. These features of the central bay are flanked on both sides by symmetrical arrangements of large-scaled nine-over-nine double-hung-sash windows. There are almost no windows or doors on the sides or rear of this building. This building is for sale.

DESCRIPTION

The ca. 1922 old Prince Frederick High School is located on the west side of Main Street in Prince Frederick, seat of Calvert County, Maryland. The building is of frame construction and stands two stories high above a low basement of concrete and rock-faced concrete block. The principal (east) facade is five bays wide and is ordered symmetrically: on the first floor, two large 9/9 sash windows are located on either side of the projecting entrance vestibule. The flat-roofed vestibule has double doors with a 14-light transom; double pilasters support a deep, molded cornice. The central bay of the second story holds a large Palladian window, with tall, narrow 4/6 windows flanking a round-headed 18/12 sash. Pilasters like those flanking the entrance frame the sidelights, and support a broken cornice, with a key-stoned arch atop the large central window. Nine-over-nine sash windows define the bays on either side of the central Palladian window, aligned with those below. A shallow, metal-clad hip roof rises above the deep, molded building cornice. The building is three bays deep; lower hip-roofed wings project a very short distance from the sides, toward the rear of the building. The side elevations are lighted by two 9/9 sash on each story; the north wing has a second-story exit and fire escape.

The building is currently clad in asbestos shingles. Its current use as a Masonic Lodge has resulted in negligible alteration. Adjacent to the school on the south is the superintendent's house, a frame "foursquare" dwelling constructed ca. 1926. The house is a two-story cube with a steep hip roof, two bays wide. A one-story porch, its ample hip roof supported on paired columns, spans the principal (east) facade, sheltering the entrance in the left bay and a triple 6/1 window in the right. The second story is lighted by a double 6/1 window in each of its two bays. A six-light hipped dormer pierces the east slope of the roof. The building is sheathed in narrow clapboards and is maintained in excellent condition.

SIGNIFICANCE

The old Prince Frederick High School is significant for its architecture, and for its historic association with the development of public education in Calvert County. Architecturally, the building represents an example of early twentieth century Georgian Revival-influenced school design. Its two-story height is unique among early 20th century schools in Calvert County, and reflects its original function to house the primary grades on the first floor and high school classes above. Its architectural detailing is particularly ambitious, and suggests the influence of grand eighteenth-century designs such as Charles Bulfinch's Harrison Gray Otis House in Boston;


the effect is to convey an impression of the building's status as the first public high school in Calvert County.

The school building and superintendent's house have historic significance in reflecting the growth of public education in Calvert County during the 1920's. Before the first World War, parents who desired a high school education for their children had to send them out of the County, either to private schools such as Charlotte Hall and Saint Mary's Female Seminary in St. Mary's County, or to the cities of Washington or Baltimore, where the children lived with relatives while attending the city public high schools. A growing interest in public education following World War I led to the establishment of high school classes, which were held in the old Public Library (now moved and incorporated into a new building) in Prince Frederick until the High School was completed. The school originally served both primary grades and high school classes.

The superintendent's house reflects the growth of the County school system. By the mid-1920's, the system of public education in Calvert County had expanded to the point at which a full-time administrator was necessary.


