The Naji P. Maloof House, constructed circa 1935, is representative of vernacular housing forms constructed throughout Calvert County. Architecturally, the Naji P. Maloof House reflects the I-house form, with its three-bay-wide façade, side-gable roof, and two-room plan. Overwhelmingly, dwellings built in Calvert County during the last quarter of the nineteenth century and the first decades of the twentieth century were derivatives of the I-house form. Largely two-story, wood-frame buildings, three or five bays in width, these houses have side-gabled roofs, or very often a cross-gabled roof with a central front gable. The scalloped bargeboard at the Naji P. Maloof House is an example of these late Victorian-era stylistic elements that often ornamented rural vernacular I-houses. The Naji P. Maloof House was substantially altered in the 1970s, significantly compromising the dwelling's integrity of design, workmanship, and materials. Further, the house was razed in the summer of 2004.

The two-story house is constructed of wood frame with scalloped asbestos shingles and a solid concrete-block foundation. The side-gabled roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles, has wide overhanging eaves ornamented with scalloped bargeboard. The main block of the house is three bays wide, although alterations to the fenestration included removal of the entry bay from the façade and asymmetrical placement of paired 6/6 windows with flat continuous lintels. The placement of the new paired windows and the cladding of the structure with asbestos shingles have obscured all exterior evidence of the location of the entry in either the side or central bay. The second story of the façade is pierced by three symmetrically placed standard-sized 6/6 windows with narrow molded surrounds. The two-story rear ell has a shed roof and is marked by an inboard on the southeast elevation. A parged interior brick chimney with a corbeled cap rises from the ell. A one-story wing addition was added to the southeast elevation of the main block and ell. Covered by a shed roof, the addition sits on a solid concrete-block foundation and is constructed of wood-frame with scalloped asbestos shingles. The addition is marked by an inboard to the south of the entry, suggesting it was enlarged when the two-story ell was added to the main block. The northwest elevation of the main block has the entry wing, which is sheltered by a front-gabled portico supported by square posts. The entry wing is clad in asbestos shingles and has a gable roof trimmed with scalloped bargeboard. It is pierced by a single entry opening holding a two-light paneled wood door. A one-and-a-half-story addition of wood frame was added to the southwest elevation of the two-story rear ell. The addition has a shed roof with scalloped bargeboard and a large exterior end brick chimney with a corbeled cap. A half-hipped roof addition wraps around the one-and-a-half-story addition. Ornamented with scalloped bargeboard, the addition has a single 6/6 window and a one-story shed-roof addition with a single nine-light, paneled wood door.

SETTING

The Maji P. Maloof House at 141 Main Street is located on the west side of the road in Prince Frederick. The house is setting very close to the road, with commercial and office buildings surrounding. The property consists of 26,615 square feet with a wooden fence to the front and a paved parking pad to the north of the house.

PRIMARY RESOURCE

The two-story house is constructed of wood frame with scalloped asbestos shingles and a solid concrete-block foundation. The side-gabled roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles, has wide overhanging eaves ornamented with scalloped bargeboard. The main block of the house is three bays wide, although alterations to the fenestration included removal of the entry bay from the façade and asymmetrical placement of paired 6/6 windows with flat continuous lintels. The placement of the new paired windows and the cladding of the structure with asbestos shingles have obscured all exterior evidence of the location of the entry in either the side or central bay. The second story of the façade is pierced by three symmetrically placed standard-sized 6/6 windows with narrow molded surrounds, wood sills, and louvered shutters. The southeast side elevation is pierced by a single 6/6 window at the southeastern corner and a small louvered vent with square-edged surrounds in the gable end. The two-story rear ell has a shed roof and is marked by an inboard on the southeast elevation. It is pierced by single and paired 6/6 windows. A parged interior brick chimney with a corbeled cap rises from the ell. A one-story wing addition was added to the southeast elevation of the main block and ell. Covered by a shed roof, the addition sits on a solid concrete block foundation and is constructed of wood-frame with scalloped asbestos shingles. The addition, set back from the façade by the main block, is marked by an inboard to the south of the entry, suggesting it was enlarged when the two-story ell was added to the main block. This addition is pierced by a single entry holding a multi-light and paneled wood door with a narrow surround. The entry is framed by a triple windows, each with a 6/6 sash. A single 6/6 window is located to the south of the entry. The northwest elevation of the main block has the entry wing, which is sheltered by a front-gabled portico supported by square posts. The entry wing is clad in asbestos shingles and has a gable roof trimmed with scalloped bargeboard. It is pierced by a single entry opening holding a two-light paneled wood door. The main block is not fenestrated on the northwest elevation. A one-and-a-half-story addition of wood frame was added to the southwest elevation of the two-story rear ell. The addition, pierced by 6/6 windows and louvered vents, has a shed roof with scalloped bargeboard. A large exterior end brick chimney with a corbeled cap rises from the side of the addition. A half-hipped roof addition wraps around the one-and-a-half-story addition. Ornamented with scalloped bargeboard, the addition has a single 6/6 window and a one-story shed-roof addition with a single nine-light, paneled wood door.

The Naji P. Maloof House, constructed circa 1935, is representative of vernacular housing forms constructed throughout Calvert County. Architecturally, the Naji P. Maloof House reflects the I-house form, with its three-bay-wide façade, side-gable roof, and two-room plan. Overwhelmingly, dwellings built in Calvert County during the last quarter of the nineteenth century and the first decades of the twentieth century were derivatives of the I-house form. Largely two-story, wood-frame buildings, three or five bays in width, these houses have side-gabled roofs, or very often a cross-gabled roof with a central front gable. The scalloped bargeboard at the Naji P. Maloof House is an example of these late Victorian-era stylistic elements that often ornamented rural vernacular I-houses. The Naji P. Maloof House was substantially altered in the 1970s, significantly compromising the dwelling's integrity of design, workmanship, and materials. Further, the house was razed in the summer of 2004.

This much-altered main block was constructed as a single-family dwelling on property owned by George W. and Mattie E. Dowell. By 1902, the land was conveyed to William Shemwell and, by 1935, it was owned by John B. Gray. Gray sold the property, along with improvements to Abraham and Ruth Goldstein. In 1976, Maji Maloof purchased the house and converted it into office space. The former dwelling was razed in the summer of 2004.



This house faces northeast onto Maryland Route 765. It is a heavily altered latenineteenth-century wood-framed, two-story, two-room-plan structure. The original fenestration, on the second story of the facade suggests that the structure had a side-passage-parlor plan. The original windows have six-over-six double-hung sash. On the gable ends, the smaller original windows have four-over-four windows. Probably when the dwelling was converted to an office, the first-story fenestration of the facade was altered to include only two modern windows. The entrances to the original parts of the structure are located on the gable ends. The original weatherboarding has been replaced with asbestos siding. The most distinctive decorative feature is the sawn scalloped boards applied to the eaves. Additions include a rear two-story shed, a one-story shed built onto the southeast gable end, and a one-story gable-roofed wing added to the northwest gable end.

Asphalt shingles cover the gable roof. Scalloped barge boards decorate the gable ends. Asbestos shingles sheath the walls.
