In the early-twentieth century, changes in the modes and materials of house building, allowed property owners to erect architecturally similar dwellings quickly and effeciently. The Staughton Lyon house, located near Maddox, Maryland, demonstrates how two brothers could build two identical houses using the same materials and plan. In 1902, William A. and Staughton Lyon inherited a 143 acre tract called Notley Hall from their father William A. Lyon. Soon after the acquisition, both brothers built two frame houses a short distance from one another. Both houses featured a north/south orientation overlooking Brambley Creek, three bay fenestration, two room plan, clapboard exterior siding, and decorative pressed-metal roof shingles.

In 1911 Staughton Lyon died leaving the property to a number of heirs including his wife Alice R. Lyon. In 1922 Staughton's heirs sold their interests in the property to his brother William A. Lyon. The dwelling strikes a sharp contrast to the William A. Lyon house (SM-630), which received two additions -- nearly doubling its size. While the William A. Lyon house is currently occupied, the Staughton Lyon house is vacant and deteriorating.

The Staughton Lyon House is located just south of Notley Manor Road near Maddox, Maryland. Situated at the head of a stream overlooking Brambley Creek, the dwelling is oriented on a north/south axis and is surrounded by cultivated fields. Two storage outbuildings lie just south of the house and a twentieth century tobacco is situated to the northeast. The building is currently vacant and slowly deteriorating.

Built c. 1902, the Stoughton Lyon House is a two story, three bay frame house with a one story wing. The main block rests on a brick pier foundation, while the wing is supported by a number of cedar stubs. The exterior walls are covered with clapboard fastened to the circular sawn frame with wire nails. The cornice is enclosed and the roof is covered with decorative pressed metal shingles. The roof is pierced by an interior end, brick chimney flue that features a corbelled top. A second, presumably identical chimney, was once situated on the west side of the house, but it has deteriorated to the roofline.

The symmetrical fenestration on the primary or south elevation is composed of a centrally located entry flanked on either side by a two-over-two, double-hung sash window. A porch shades all of these openings, supported by a number of cedar posts, features a roof of decorative pressed-metal shingles. The second floor is pierced by three windows. The central opening consists of a six-over-six window, while the flanking windows feature two-over-two sash. The wing features a single door. The east elevation consists of the main block's gable end, but it does not feature any openings or decoration. The extant interior end chimney flue lies behind this elevation's clapboard.

The rear or north elevation of the main block's first floor is exhibits two, two-over-two windows. The second floor is pierced by three, two-over-two windows. The wing features a six-over-six window. The west gable end consists of the main block and wing's gable ends. Only the wing is pierced by a six-over-six window.

The unembellished exterior is mirrored by the interior. While all of the rooms were originally plastered, the trim around the windows and doors is not decoratively finished. Interestingly, the east room features an angled entry situated immediately beside the main south entry. This space was heated by a stove flue located on the east wall. The west room features a stair to the second floor. The second floor features two bedrooms. The wing only features one room.

Chain-of-Title

(All deeds are located at the Land Records Office, St. Mary's County Courthouse, Leonardtown, Maryland unless otherwise noted.)

Date: June 4, 1982

Notes: In September 12, 1986, John Michael Wolfe (Estate No. 4846) died leaving his estate to Luther Howerton Wolfe. The deed notes that William A. Lyon, along with his brother Staughton Lyon, received the property in 1902. The two then presumably constructed houses on the 143 acre property. Today, both houses remain on the 53.738 acre farm.

Date: March 22, 1962

Notes: The will notes that the property called "Part Notley Hall" was passed on to John Michael Wolfe. It also notes that William had obtained his brother Staughton's interest to the property after Staughton's death in the 1920s (see Land Records Liber JMM 1, Folio 118).




Date: March 21, 1879

Notes: As a result of a circuit court case between Neale, Harris & Co. v. William A. Lyon, et al, the property is sold at public auction. William A. Lyon, however, retains ownership as he purchases the property. Unfortunately, a bean clause was not contained in the deed so the chain-of-title could not be traced further. The property that the Lyon House is on once belonged to members of the Thomas family see St. Mary's County Decree Records, Liber JAC 2, Folio 510.
