On December 24, 1838 John M. Joy purchased a 250 acre tract called "Rich Neck" and "Little Venture" for \$800 from Ignatius, Elizabeth, and Ann Joy. Sometime in the 1850s, John M. Joy erected a one-and-a-half story, hall-parlor plan braced frame house with a one story kitchen wing. The house was decorated with beaded cornerboards, two plain Greek Revival mantles, and beaded window and door architraves while the kitchen was not adorned. The kitchen's framing was left exposed and whitewashed and its large fireplace did not feature a mantle. The dwelling, therefore, is significant as an excellent example of a modest, mid-nineteenth century dwelling that exhibited a deliberate decorative hierarchy.

— In 1910 John M. Joy died "seized and possessed" of a sizeable estate. A circuit court case ensued and the 248 1/2 acre tract was sold at auction to John M. Joy's son Joseph Joy in 1911. Joseph Joy, however, fell delinquent on his taxes and the property was purchased by the First National Bank of St. Mary's in 1934. In 1942, Margaret and Walter Gebhart purchased the tract and eventually sold the property to J. Testa and Grace E. Johnson in 1949. The property presently remains in the Johnson family ownership. In March of 1997, the c. 1850 dwelling was burned to make way for a modern house.

The Joy/Johnson house is located 0.2 miles west of the intersection of Jones and McIntosh Roads in the vicinity of Hollywood, Maryland. Situated just south of Jones Road down a dirt driveway, the house is oriented on a east/west axis. The dwelling, constructed on a small knoll, is surrounded by rolling agricultural fields dotted with a few large and medium sized cedar trees. An earthfast tobacco barn, oriented on a north/south axis is located on the slope to the southwest of the dwelling.

The Johnson house, constructed c. 1850, is a one-and-a-half story, four bay, two room, single pile, braced frame dwelling with a stone foundation, gable roof, two brick chimneys, and a one room, gable end kitchen ell. The entire house is sheathed with faux brick asbestos siding that covers the original clapboard and beaded cornerboards. The main block's roof is covered with raised-seam metal while the one story addition's roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The primary or east elevation of the main block is dominated by a full length open porch with a concrete pier foundation and with a shed roof supported by five square posts. Evidence, namely the presence of the beaded cornerboard now covered by the porch, suggests that the porch may have been added after the dwelling was initially constructed. This porch shades four roughly symmetrical bays that consist of a six-over-six, double-hung sash window, two, five panel doors distinguished by three horizontal panels with two vertical panels above, and a six-over-six window. The one story ell features features a wood door comprised of vertical planks fastened in place with fully formed cut nails to two horizontal battens with planed edges. The door is hung on wrought stap hinges and pintels.

The south elevation of the one story addition exhibits an unglazed window covered by a board-and-batten shutter with modern iron hinges pierces the gable end. A square shaped chimney, shared by the main block and ell, extends from the roof of the ell and is setback from the wall of the main section. Located on either side of the chimney on the attic story of the main block is a pair of four pane casement windows that once had board and batten shutters.

The main block's west elevation features three bays--two, six-over-six windows and a five panel door. Further investigation is needed to ascertain whether a second door may have been covered over. These three bays are roughly aligned with those found on the east elevation. The one story ell features a single door aligned with the door on the east elevation. At the intersection of the wall and roof is a wide box cornice.

The north elevation features an exterior end brick chimney with a projecting stone base and one set of stepped shoulders. On either side of the chimney on the attic story is a four pane casement window.

The interior trim, mantles and overall plan survive although the walls have been enclosed with faux wood paneling--concealing the plaster covered walls and higher ceilings. Each of the two rooms of the single pile plan house feature their own independent entry on the primary elevation. Both rooms also have similar Greek Revival mantles that feature a pair of plinth blocks that support square engaged columns and a plain frieze and mantle shelf. Both fireboxes have been covered over and stove flues installed. The northernmost room contains an open winder stair--that

was only recently enclosed. The half story consists of a center stair passage with two rooms on either side. Both rooms were plastered using circular sawn lathe. Gaps in the ceiling reveal that the hewn and pit sawn rafter pairs are joined at the peak with open mortises fastened with cut nails. The rafter pairs are also joined with a series of ties that are half lapped and fastened with three to four cut nails onto the rafters. The interior of the one story, one room kitchen ell has been unfinished. The overhead hewn and pit sawn ceiling joists and wall studs are blackened by smoke from a large brick cooking fireplace with a large hewn lintel.

The earthfast barn consists of a cross axial plan center main section and a shed addition. The barn is sheathed with vertical, circular sawn planks fastened to horizontal rails with wire nails. The barn's hewn and circular sawn frame has been extensively altered as the building's north side is earthfast while the south side features a sill. The building is further strengthened by circular sawn diagonal braces. The barn is divided into four-foot rooms. The shed appears to have been added later as there is not evidence for shingle lathe on the skinned rafters.

Wathen wife of John H. Wathen, George W. Joy, Oscar M. Joy, Martha A. Kane wife of ___ Kane, Joseph Joy, and Lucretia Wathen wife of Frank Wathen the children of John M. Joy wanted the proceeds from the property to be divided amongst themselves. The Circuit Court then issued in favor of the plaintiffs and the property sold (Decree Record, Liber EBA 4, Folio 410.) This deed also notes that one-and-a-half acres of the original 250 acres was sold to Joseph S. Johnson on March 12, 1867. This property was located on the east side of the McIntosh Road.
