Circa 1835

Willow Glen is a well-preserved brick house dating to around 1835. Contemporary with Dela Brooke Manor on the Patuxent River, Willow Glen shares many of its same architectural features. Both dwellings have bridged chimney stacks, a stucco exterior, and a side hall/double pile plan. Willow Glen is significant because of its high level of architectural integrity and because of the interesting detached kitchen which survives on site. This kitchen outbuilding retains many of its original interior finishes as well as a large chimney fitted with an exterior cooking hearth.

The history of the Willow Glen property dates to the very earliest period of settlement in St. Mary's County. Originally part of Bashford, also known as "Basford," Manor this parcel is referred to as "Willow Glen" in the land records by 1866. Under Turner ownership until 1889, the property was possessed by Hayden family heirs until the 1970s.

Willow Glen is located south of Maddox at the end of a dirt road on the west side of the Chaptico-Maddox Road (Rte. 238). The Willow Glen manor house stands on a flat plain which slopes gently west towards the Wicomico River. The property is bounded on the south by Manahowic Creek, and by a small creek referred to in the land records as "The Stream" on the north. The original approach to the house, a cedar-lined lane, is still visible on the landscape.

In addition to the main dwelling, this property is occupied by a variety of outbuildings and a tenant house. Only one outbuilding is contemporary with the main house. The main house faces east, with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Dating to the second quarter of the nineteenth century, Willow Glen is a two-story brick structure consisting of a main block with a side hall/double pile plan. A slightly shorter, two-story, two bay wing with a single pile plan extends to the south. This wing is stepped back to the west, creating a an ell which has been infilled by a two-story frame addition sheathed with German siding. Both brick wings are covered with stucco which has been scored to imitate stone. The roof, once covered with tin shingles, has a medium overhang and is sheathed with asphalt shingles.

The east (main) elevation of the main block is sheltered by a one-story porch across its first floor. A later addition, this porch retains its original wood floor and wainscoted ceiling. Doric columns support the roof's heavily molded entablature. The first floor of the house is pierced by a partially glazed entrance door with three-light sidelights and a four-light transom as its northern most bay. The entry's original features include its paneled soffit and jambs. Two two-over-two sash windows with louvered shutters light the first floor. These windows have wood sills and decorative crown moldings consisting of an entablature with a simple stepped freize. The second floor is lit by three windows like those on the first floor. The cornice of the main block is corbeled with two rows of projecting brick headers. The first floor of the southern wing is obscured by a two-story frame addition sheathed with German siding. This wing is pierced by a partially glazed entrance door flanked on either side by two fifteen-over-fifteen sash windows with wide, plain surrounds. A portico, supported by slender Doric columns, shelters the entrance door. The second floor of this addition consists of a porch which has been partially enclosed. The porch, used as a sleeping porch in the early twentieth century, has a square baluster railing and square post supports. The porch's northern enclosed section is lit by one six-over-six sash window with wide, plain surrounds on the east elevation and by a multi-pane door on the south elevation. The brick wing behind this frame addition is pierced by one two-over-two sash window

Willow Glen is a well-preserved brick house dating to around 1835. Contemporary with Dela Brooke Manor on the Patuxent River, Willow Glen shares many of its same architectural features. Both dwellings have bridged chimney stacks, a stucco exterior, and a side hall/double pile plan. Willow Glen is significant because of its high level of architectural integrity and because of the interesting detached kitchen which survives on site.

The one-room outbuilding located to the south of the house served Willow Glen as a detached kitchen with servants' sleeping quarters in the upper half story. The interior of this building is little changed, retaining a portion of its plastered interior and the beaded board door frame to its interior winder stair. The exterior hearth located on the south side of the kitchen's large chimney was probably used for messy tasks such as laundry, soap-making, and hog-butchering.

The history of the Willow Glen property dates to the very earliest period of settlement in St. Mary's County. Originally part of Bashford, also known as "Basford Manor," this parcel is referred to as "Willow Glen" in the land records by 1866. Under Turner ownership until 1889, the property was possessed by Hayden family heirs until the 1970s.

finished with the same decorative crown molding which caps the windows on the dwelling's main block. A one-story, one-room gable roof addition extends to the south of this wing, and is lit by one eight-over-eight sash window.

The south elevation of the main block's gable end is marked by a pair of chimneys with a two-story pent. Here, the eave is lit by one two-over-two sash, shuttered window crowned by a flat lintel. The first and second floor of the main block is obscured by the southern two-story wing. The first floor of this wing consists of a one-story, gable roof addition sheathed with German siding and pierced with an entrance door. The second floor of the wing is lit by a pair of narrow four-over-four sash windows set into an original window frame and crowned by a flat lintel. An interior brick chimney projects from the roofline of this wing.

The west elevation of the main block is pierced by a northern entrance door sheltered by a gable roof portico. This portico is supported by turned posts and finished with a square post baluster. The entrance door and two windows which light the first floor of this elevation are identical to those on the east elevation. Notably, the door is finished with the same paneled soffit and jambs. The second floor is lit by three windows like those on the east elevation. The southern wing is lit on the first and second floors by two two-over-two sash windows with louvered shutters smaller than those windows which light the main block. The one-story, gable roof addition attached to the south end of the house is screened on this west side.

The north elevation is lit by two two-over-two sash, shuttered windows on both the first and second floors. One smaller two-over-two sash, shuttered window lights the eave. The crown moldings above these windows vary, including the style of stepped entablature visible above the east elevation windows, the plain lintels visible on the south elevation, and a type of lintel characterized by two rows of brick corbeling.

The interior of the main block consists of a side hall with a paneled open stringer stair finished with turned balusters, a turned newell post, and a molded hand rail. The stair treads are elaborated with a cyma curve molding which curves from the top of the riser to the base of the tread's nosing. A four-panel door opens to a closet underneath the stair. Here, the unfinished wood is scarred with up and down saw marks and joined with mature machine cut nails. Four-panel doors open onto the two parlors located south of the stair. The pair of floor to ceiling doors which originally provided access between these two rooms has been removed. The windows in these rooms are framed by a round molding surround and wide, plain jambs which form cornerblocks at their junction with the lintel. Below the slightly projecting lintel is a rectangular panel set into the wall. A fireplace is located on the south wall of each room. To the west of the hearth in the east parlor is a narrow doorway which provides access to the southern frame addition. This door probably originally opened to a small

closet like that located to the east of the hearth in the west parlor. This small closet opens into the bricked area between the house's bridged chimneys, serving the same purpose as those closets which open into chimney pents. The built-in woodwork in these rooms was designed by the current owners.

The second floor of the main block consists of a side hall and two bedrooms accessible beyond four-panel doors. The mantels in these rooms remain intact. Here, the firebox is flanked by plain pilasters crowned by a Doric cap. Below the mantel shelf is a wide, undecorated frieze band. In the east bedroom, a narrow doorway, like that on the first floor, pierces the wall west of the fireplace. Here, a four-panel door opens onto the enclosed section of the south wing's second story porch.

The upper half story of the house is accessible by the side hall stair. This area consists of a single room which was finished by the current owners. Both rafters and collar beams are visible in this room. The collars are half lapped into the rafters, many of which have been hewn on at least one side. Crawlspace on both the east and west sides of the room reveal the floor joists, top plate, and rafter feet. All the exposed timber here appears to bear up and down saw marks. Only mature machine cut nails were in evidence.

The first floor of the dwelling's southern wing consists of one large room which now serves as a modern kitchen and dining area. An open stringer stair with a molded hand rail, turned newell post and square balusters rises against the north wall of the room. The first four steps of this stair wind sharply with the banister beginning on the fifth stair. The second floor of this wing was not seen.

Eight outbuildings stand on the property. The most interesting of these is a one-story structure referred to as a "slave cabin" and located on the south side of Willow Glen. This building probably served as a detached kitchen for the main house. The structure faces east and has a gable roof oriented on a north/south axis. It stands on cinderblock piers and is sheathed with a layer of German siding. The roof is metal. The east elevation is pierced by one two-over-two sash window and a one-over-one panel door and is finished with a boxed cornice. The north side is a flush gable end, lit by a window at the attic level. The west elevation is finished with a boxed cornice and lit by one two-over-two sash window. The south elevation is mostly obscured by a very large brick chimney which now stands on a cement pad. The masonry consists of no distinct course pattern and a large hearth is located on both the exterior south side of the chimney and on the interior north side. The interior of this outbuilding consists of one room which was originally finished with plaster. While some of this surface survives in the northwest corner of the room, the remainder has been sheathed with wainscoting. A hearth is located at the south end of the room. This fireplace is about

five feet in height and extends almost the entire width of the south wall. Its plain mantle shelf is circular sawn. A winder stair is located in the northeast corner of the room. The door to this stair is no longer in place, but the opening is surrounded by a beaded door frame and the western jamb is marked by a latch recess. The loft area reveals rafters which are pinioned together with wooden pegs. Here, the lumber appears to bear up and down saw marks. A small makeshift stair rail consisting of square balusters and a beaded handrail which runs diagonally from a rafter to the floor boards of the loft stands next to the stair. This baluster is held together with mature machine cut nails.

The remaining outbuildings south of the main house consist of a modern garage sheathed with German siding which is located next to the building described above. A shed sheathed with circular sawn, vertical board siding and capped with a corrugated metal roof also stands nearby. North of the house is a twentieth century guest cottage sheathed with weatherboard siding. Three twentieth century tobacco barns, a tractor shed, and a gable roof outbuilding sheathed with vertical board siding and roofed with metal comprise the agricultural outbuildings.

The Willow Glen tenant house is located at the northern edge of the property, situated on a slight rise overlooking a cove of "The Stream" which acts as Willow Glen's northern boundary. Fields extend to the east of the house. Now unoccupied, this frame structure faces south with a gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around the turn of the century, the main block of the tenant house is a two-story, two-bay structure which has been enlarged with the addition of a one-story, one-bay wing on its west side and a two-story, one-bay addition on the east side. It is sheathed with weatherboard siding and supported by cinderblock piers. The roof is covered with metal.

The south (main) elevation has a shed roof porch across the first floor of the main block. This porch is supported by square posts and roofed with metal. A partially glazed entrance door and one six-over-six sash window with plank shutters pierce the first floor. The second floor is lit by one such window. The two-story addition on the east side is lit by one six-over-six sash window with plank shutters on both the first and second floors. The one-story addition on the west side is lit by one six-over-six sash window with plank shutters.

The west elevation of the main block is blind. An exterior brick chimney is centered on this gable end elevation. The one-story addition which extends to the west is lit by one six-over-six sash window with plank shutters. A former door opening on this addition has been converted to a six-over-six sash window sheltered by a gable roof portico.

The north elevation of the main block is covered by a screened porch across the first floor. The first floor is pierced by a partially glazed entrance door and the second floor is lit by one six-over-six sash window with plank shutters. The two-story wing on the east end is lit by one six-over-six sash window on both the first and second floors. The one-story wing on the west end is lit by one shuttered six-over-six sash window.

The east elevation of the main block is blind and marked by a centrally placed exterior brick chimney.

Two outbuildings stand on the site. One is a modern pump house constructed of cinderblocks. The second outbuilding, located on the northeast corner of the property, is a shed roof structure supported by cinderblock piers and sheathed with vertical board siding. The exterior siding of the east end is widely spaced, allowing air to circulate on the interior. The roof is metal. A pair of double doors held in place by metal butterfly hinges pierce the south (main) elevation. Although there are no partition walls on the interior, this structure appears to have served two purposes: a storage or work room on the west end and a corn crib on the east end.




