The Butterfield property is a 1½-story bungalow located at Coltons Point, Maryland. The house faces southeast onto the Potomac River. It is set back approximately 75 feet from Beach Road on a flat lot. A narrow beach, interrupted by several piers, lies between the road and the river.

The wood frame house has a rectangular plan. The foundation consists of brick piers with concrete block infill between the piers. The exterior walls are covered with narrow, lapped wood boards which have a rounded finish at the exposed edge.

The house has a gable roof with the ridge oriented parallel to the main (southeast) elevation. The soffit under the wide eaves has tongue-and-groove siding. A cornice follows the gables and returns. The large dormers, one on the southeast elevation, and one on the northwest elevation, have a similar roof treatment. Each dormer has a tri-part window with 6/1 double-hung sash lights. A squat brick chimney is located on the roof ridge of the rear dormer near to its intersection with the main roof.

The southeast elevation is two bays wide. The southernmost bay has the main entranceway with a six-panel wood door flanked by sidelights. Each sidelight has four rectangular lights arranged in a vertical row above a single panel. Plain wood boards frame the large rectangular window opening in the easternmost bay. One mullion remains exposed (and vertically separates one-third of the opening from the other two-thirds) but, the rest of the opening is covered with boards.

A one-story porch abuts the full width of the southeast elevation. The porch roof, which is an extension of the main roof, has wide eaves, a cornice and frieze. The metal letters "ST. CLEMENT ISLAND POTOMAC MUSEUM" are nailed to the frieze. The roof is supported by narrow Tuscan columns. The columns also support the wood balustrades, which have sawn balusters.

The southwest elevation has three 6/1 windows on the first story, one 6/1 window mid-way between stories (lighting an interior stair landing), one 6/1 window on the upper story, and a rectangular vented opening on the attic story. The southwest elevation of the rear wing has the rear entrance with a 5-panel door flanked by 6/1 windows. The small wood porch and wheelchair ramp at this entrance are recent additions.

The northwest (rear) elevation is the rear wall of the wing which extends the full width of the main block. The wing has a

SIGNIFICANCE

The Butterfield property is significant for its Bungalow-style architecture and for its association with the early 20th Century development of beach resorts along the southern Maryland water front.

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

This bungalow was probably constructed shortly after Frank E. Butterfield purchased the property from Robert D. and Jennie S. Blackistone in November 1922.¹ The Blackistone's, who owned several hundred acres of additional land in Coltons Point during this decade, had owned this parcel for only a few months prior to Butterfield's purchase, having bought it from Isabella and David M. Pomphret of Queens County, New York in June 1922.²

A number of modest cottages and bungalows were built in Coltons Point which, like other beaches on the Western Shore of the Chesapeake Bay and on the Potomac River, was developed during the 1920s. The Butterfield bungalow remains as one of the most substantial and unaltered of these buildings. In 1966, Mary A. Butterfield, wife of the then-deceased Frank E. Butterfield, sold the property to the State of Maryland, Department of Forests and Parks.³ The State converted the house to a small museum associated with St. Clement's Island State Park. The island, which lies about 2500 feet off of the point, is the site of the first landing of English settlers in Maryland in 1634. In conjunction with Maryland's 350th Anniversary in 1984, a new museum is planned for construction on the Butterfield property. The bungalow is slated for demolition as part of this project.

low-pitched hipped roof which intersects the main roof. The center bay has a 6/1 sash window. The triple-width opening at the northernmost bay is covered with boards and the double-width opening at the westernmost bay is covered with boards at the top and covered by a small, wood-shingled, box-bay addition at the bottom.

On the northeast elevation, the northernmost window opening is similarly altered. Here, the added box bay covers the entire opening. Centered on this elevation is another large opening that is covered with boards. The size, shape and framing of this opening indicate that it is not original, and is probably a modern "picture window" opening. One 6/1 window occupies the easternmost bay of this elevation. A slightly wider 6/1 window is centered on the upper story, just below the rectangular attic vent.

On the first story, temporary walls for exhibits cover most of the original interior fabric. A small closet and a storage room have original tongue-and-groove wainscoting. An original multi-paned door remains at the base of the staircase. The staircase has turned balusters and square newel posts with molding. The second story has three bedrooms, currently used as office and storage space, and a bathroom. The southeast room is extensively altered with modern panelling, but the other rooms retain their integrity. These have original 5-panel doors, wide, plain window frames, and plastered walls.

The brick pumphouse, which is located near to the west corner of the house, has a steeply-pitched pyramidal roof, a wide two-panel door and three deep-set casement windows with header bond flat arches.





WITNESSETH, that in consideration of the sum of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars, and other good and valuable considerations, the receipt of all of which is hereby acknowledged, the said Mary A. Butterfield, Widow, does hereby grant and convey unto the said, the State of Maryland to the use of the Department of Forests and Parks, its successors and assigns, all those pieces, parcels, lots or tracts of land, situate, lying and being in the Seventh Election District of St. Mary's County, Maryland, and more particularly described as follows, that is to say:

PARCEL NO. 1: Lots Numbered 28, 29, 31 and 32 in Block numbered 9 in the Colton's Point tract of land as shown by a plat of said tract of land made by Fava, Maeff & Company, Consulting Engineers and Architects, recorded in Liber J.F.F. No. 12 at folio 584, one of the Land Records of said County, being all of the same property described in a deed dated November 3, 1922 and recorded in Liber J.M.M. No. 1, at folio 256, one of the said Land Records.


