2nd quarter 19th century

This 1 1/2-story house was originally a one-room log cabin inhabited by white families until its purchase in the 1950's by James Scribber, a Negro farmer born in St. Mary's County in 1878. Scribber remembers ^{that} only the downstairs room ^{was} ~~being~~ used by the families until the 20th century when the house was enlarged. According to ^{J. M.} ~~Scribber~~, the original log house was representative of the type of house commonly occupied by poor farming families of both races in the 19th century. Since his purchase, colorful objects and family mementoes have been placed around and inside the house by his daughter, Neddie Stevens.

According to the present owner and occupant, James Scribber, who is 99 years old in 1977, this two story dwelling began its history as a small one story ^{frame} ~~log~~ house. It was an "old house" when he was a boy in the 1880's and had always been inhabited by white families until his purchase of it in the 1950's. In the 20th century the house was enlarged and during his ownership has been further improved. Near the house are the homes of his children and the outbuildings which together with his house formed the farmstead.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE*hewn frame*

This one and a half story, ~~log~~ house stands at the end of a dirt drive winding behind the Hollywood School. It faces north. Located close to the house are work sheds ~~XNA~~, a chicken house, a wood pile, and other work areas. At a further distance stand the modern bungalow style house of Scribber's son's family, and the mobile home of his son's stepson's family. In front of Scribber's house and in the side yards are several colorful ceramic animal figures and other objects placed by Scribber's daughter, Neddie Stevens, who lives with her father to enliven the grounds around the house.

According to James Scribber, who was 99 years old in March, 1977, and who was raised in this area of St. Mary's County, this house was much smaller when he knew it as a boy in the 1880's. At that time, it consisted of only one story with one room downstairs with a small shed kitchen attached to the eastern gable end. The ~~log walls~~ ^{hewn frame} were sheathed with overlapping weatherboards and the roof with wood shingles. A brick chimney ascended the exterior of the eastern gable end. The joists were exposed in the interior. At that time the families occupied the downstairs exclusively, not the upstairs, according to Scribber, because he said "people didn't want alot of room back then". In the early 20th century one of the families who lived here raised the roof of the house by a half story, and made the upstairs habitable. The small boxed staircase in the northwestern corner was added at that time, and is made of plain planks. The small kitchen was removed and the larger one presently in use built. A stove flue replaced the larger brick chimney. A bedroom was added to the southern length, and the windows and door openings were enlarged to their present size, and surrounded by their present trim boards of rounded edges. The house has always, Scribber said, had some sort of front porch, though the earlier ones were smaller and cruder than the present one.

The Scribbers have improved the house considerably over the years, and Neddie Stevens, in addition to adding personal touches to the yards, has filled the interior of the house with colorful curios and family mementos. Some of these things placed outside may be seen in the photographs of the exterior.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to Scribber, this small ^{frame} ~~log~~ house was always occupied by white families since the early 1880's when he first knew it (he was born in 1878). This house represents, he said, the type of house occupied by many poor white and black farming families at that time. 20th century improvements have completely masked the original structural materials so that a date of construction could not be determined. Based on Scribber's clear memory that this house was known as an "old house" in the 1880's, it dates from at least the second quarter of the 19th century.
