The Mattingly house is a one-and-a-half story, frame dwelling with a gable roof located at the southwest corner of Church and Pope Streets. Constructed in the early 1920s by William D. and Mary Agnes Mattingly, the dwelling's architectural form and decoration draws comparisons to the prefabricated Sears and Alladin houses popular in the early-twentieth century. While no exact match to any of these corporate plans could be found, the building epitomizes the modest type of residences constructed in Leonardtown during the early-twentieth century. Today, the building lies in close proximity to a number of 1920s houses--signalling an area of Leonardtown that underwent redevelopment in the 1920s.

— Originally, the Mattingly parcel was owned by the Key family as a part of their larger farm "America Felix Secundus." In 1880 Joseph H. Key and Robert C. Combs, as trustees for Maria Key, wrote a confirmatory deed to Asa A. and Anna G. Lawrence. Lawrence, however, died intestate leaving Frank D. Lawrence as the executor of his estate. As the result of a court case involving the Eastern Shore Trust Company and Frank D. Lawrence in 1918, two tracts of the Lawrence parcel were sold separately. The two properties were re-combined when they were purchased by William D. and Mary Agnes Mattingly in 1919 from Charlotte C. and Aloysius F. King and Nora and A. Kingsley Love.

The William D. and Mary Agnes Mattingly house is located at the intersection of Church and Pope Streets on the southwest corner. Oriented on a north south axis, the dwelling is situated on a level town lot within an early-twentieth century residential neighborhood. A cut hedge shields the property on the north and east sides while a variety of trees and shrubs outline the other two sides.

The Mattingly house is a one-and-a-half story, three-bay, frame cottage constructed in the 1920s. Now covered with artificial siding, the dwelling exhibits a gable roof covered with asphalt shingles. The gable roof slopes down and changes pitch--extending over a porch on the primary (north) elevation. This porch is supported by four square columns interspersed by a solid, waist-high railing. The three bays of this elevation consist of a centrally located door flanked on either side by a group of three, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows. Most of the windows on the other elevations are six-over-six sash as well. The wide overhanging eaves on the east and west side of the Mattingly dwelling are decorated with slender brackets. The roof itself is pierced by two, brick chimney flues and a shed roof dormer that exhibits three, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows. The building also exhibits a number of one story, shed roof additions or projections on the east and south sides.






