The First National Bank of St. Mary's at Leonardtown is a two-story, brick commercial building designed in the Classical-Revival style. Constructed in 1921, the building is located at Five East Park Avenue and serves as the southern visual terminus for Washington Street that runs perpendicular to the building. Situated at a key site within the commercial center of Leonardtown, the bank represents an imposing building. Designed by Robert L. Harris and constructed by Frainie Brothers & Haigley of Baltimore, the building's classical design features epitomize a common style used by banking institutions in the early-twentieth century. The Classical Revival style bank denoted prosperity, authority, and virtue--all qualities that the bank's building committee invoked through architectural expression. As the focal point of Washington Street, the bank visually supplanted the County Courthouse (SM-55) as the most important building in town. This building, therefore, effectively characterized the economic prosperity of Leonardtown--a town increasingly seen as not only a governmental, but also a social, religious, commercial, as well as financial center of Saint Mary's County during the early-twentieth century.

Contributing Resource Count: 1

The First National Bank of St. Mary's at Leonardtown is a two-story, brick commercial building designed in the Classical-Revival style. Constructed in 1921, the building is located at Five East Park Avenue and serves as the southern visual terminus for Washington Street which runs perpendicular to the building. Situated at a key site within the commercial center of Leonardtown, the bank represents an imposing architect-designed building. While drastically enlarged in 1966, the building retains much of its historical character through the repetitive use of identical materials, details, and craftsmanship.

The original building, located at the southwestern corner of Washington and East Park Avenue, is identified through a slight change in the brick and mortar color. Other than this difference, the rest of the building's design conforms to the original section. This description, therefore, will treat the building in its entirety rather than by section or construction period.

Constructed in brick laid in the Flemish bond, the primary or north elevation of the building is divided horizontally into three-bays and vertically into two stories. A series of light tan, brick quoins form the vertical boundaries for each bay on the first floor. They extend from a terra-cotta water table to a terra-cotta stringcourse. The stringcourse is comprised of alternating frets and circular blocks. Below the stringcourse is an undecorated frieze. On the northwestern most bay, the frieze contains an inscription that reads "1901 First National Bank of St. Mary's 1921." On the northeastern most bay another inscription reads "1921 First National Bank of St. Mary's 1966."

The southeastern bay consists of a large arched window opening with the window divided into several rows of individual panes. The trim around the arch consists of individual terra-cotta sections with acanthus leaf motifs mortared together. A large, terra-cotta acanthus leaf also forms the keystone for the arch. Light tan brick quoins form the wall surface around the arch to further accentuate this detail. The arch is flanked on either side by a six-pane, fixed window sash on the first floor and a six-over-six, double-hung sash windows on the second floor. This arrangement suggests that there are actually three stories to this section of the building. All of the windows feature terra-cotta surrounds. Above the stringcourse of this bay are three, symmetrically placed, eight-over-twelve, double-hung sash windows with terra-cotta surrounds and lintels (all other second floor windows contain identical sash, surrounds, and lintels as well). This bay, as well as the others, is topped by a continuous dentilated, terra cotta cornice with a brick parapet above.

The middle bay contains a central arch with similar, window lights, and terra-cotta and brick details. This arch also contains, however, a modern metal and glass doorway to the interior of the building. The doorway is approached either through a series of steps or a handicapped access ramp. Above the stringcourse of this bay are two, closely spaced windows.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

The First National Bank of St. Mary's is a significant example of an early-twentieth century bank building constructed in the Classical Revival style. Designed by Robert L. Harris and constructed by Frainie Brothers & Haigley of Baltimore in 1921, the building's classical design features epitomize a common style invoked by banking institutions during the period. The building also represents a significant banking institution, whose presence documents the increasingly important role of commercial banking and finance and mirrors the economic prosperity of Leonardtown in the early-twentieth century. Today, the building represents the second oldest bank in the town.

Up until the beginning of the twentieth century, finance and banking in Leonardtown lacked a very formal or specialized setting. An advertisement in the October 20, 1898 issue of the Saint Mary's Beacon notes that the Bank of Southern Maryland offered services through Director F. O. Morgan in his store in Leonardtown. This changed beginning in 1903 with the construction of the First National Bank of St. Mary's at Leonardtown. This brick, one story, gable front building was soon outgrown, however.

As soon as 1917, the First National Bank of St. Mary's at Leonardtown decided to move its operations into a larger building and better location--next door. In order to do so the corner lot (at the southwestern corner of East Park Avenue and Washington Street) was purchased in 1917 from the Saint Mary's Reading Room and Debating Society. In 1918, the Debating Society's building was moved by Enoch Abell and used as the office of the Enterprise newspaper offices. With the lot then open, the First National Bank began construction. By 1921, the First National Bank building was completed under the auspices of the building committee comprised of Enoch B. Abell, George W. Joy, and Lynwood J. Sterling--three significant local investors and developers. The building committee approved a building style common to banks during the period. The Classical Revival style bank denoted prosperity, authority, and virtue--all qualities that the building committee found suitable to communicate through architectural expression. The bank's imposing location at the focal point of Washington Street visually supplanted the County Courthouse (SM-55) as the most important building in town. This building, therefore, effectively characterized the economic prosperity of Leonardtown--a town increasingly seen as the social, religious, commercial, as well as financial center of Saint Mary's County during the early twentieth century.

While enlarged in 1966, the current building retains its historical character through the use of identical materials, details, and craftsmanship on the additions.

7.1 Description

The southwestern bay of this elevation consists of third arched window. This window is flanked on either side by a six-pane, fixed sash on the first floor and terra-cotta panels with the Maryland State Seal above them. Three symmetrically placed eight-over-twelve, double-hung sash windows are located above the stringcourse of this bay.

The west elevation consists of only one bay--a central arch flanked on each side by a six pane, fixed sash on the first floor and a terra cotta panel above. The watertable, stringcourse, and cornice wraps around the building to this elevation. Above the stringcourse are three symmetrically placed eight-over-twelve, double-hung sash windows. Just to the south of this bay is a stairhall to second floor offices. On the first floor a large metal security door allows entry to this stairhall. Above this doorway is a terra-cotta panel and a twelve-over-twelve window with a twelve pane transom over it to light the stairhall. Above this window is a terra-cotta panel. Another modern, two-story, two bay brick addition is situated to the south of this stairhall.

The south and east elevations were not visible due to the presence of adjoining buildings.

The interior has been altered considerably since the initial construction date. The original section still houses most of the commercial transactions, but most of the interior details have been altered and a balcony used by accountants just above the first floor teller space has been removed.









DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First National Bank of St. Mary's at Leonardtown is a two story brick commercial structure in the Georgian revival style dating from the early 20th century and located on the south side of the town square of Leonardtown, Maryland.

The bank's main facade faces north and has three bays with large arched windows alternating with small rectangular windows on the first floor. The exterior is medium red brick with limestone base corner quoins, window surrounds, and cornice. The large arched windows have "Gibbsian" surrounds and keystones. Above the smaller rectangular windows are decorative stone panels except at the eastern bay in which the panels are replaced by windows. The second story, above the cornice has rectangular 4/4 windows in each bay except at the center bay where a pair of windows is placed. The west elevation consists of a three-bay, center dominant facade with a central arched window repeating the configuration of the north elevation. The cornice at the roof line is modillion and the flat roof is concealed behind a solid stone parapet.

A two story brick addition of later date adjoins the main section on the south.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The First National Bank of St. Mary's, Leonardtown is a good example of Georgian Revival architecture for commercial buildings in the early 20th century. This interest in Georgian style was a part of the late 19th and early to mid-20th century movement which was characterized by the use of European and American historical styles such as French and Italian Renaissance, English Tudor, and American colonial and Federal styles.




