The Bayly building defines a prominent corner at the intersection of High Street and Court Lane, formerly known as Market Street during the mid nineteenth century. Court Lane has been lined historically by professional offices, typically small single-story frame structures intended for attorneys or physicians. This corner building dates largely from the early 1890s following the death of Dr. Alexander Hamilton Bayly, who inherited the property from his father, Josiah Bayly, in 1846. Prior to Bayly ownership of the corner lot, it was the location of the office of Dr. Arthur Rich.

The sequence of maps published for Cambridge between the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas in 1877 and the series of Sanborn Insurance maps from 1885 to 1930 indicate various improvements on the property over the course of fifty years. Small single-story buildings are located on the lot in 1877 and 1885, but by 1896 the extant building had been erected in its two-story form. The construction of the jerkinhead roofed office building apparently coincides with the 1892 death of Dr. Bayly, who left his "offices" to his son Alexander Hamilton Bayly, Jr. The original plan of the commercial block included a line of two or three separate offices, presumably with separate entrances opening onto Court Lane. By 1916, however, the building had been altered with a single, centrally positioned entrance and corresponding center staircase. Evidently, during the first decade of the twentieth century neighborhood discord prompted the construction of twenty foot high "spite walls" along the back of the building to shield the view to the northeast. The Bayly building remained under family

ownership until a case was filed in Dorchester County Circuit Court in December 1929 forcing the sale of the property the following year to Carlton M. Dunn, who with his wife Mary Lee, resided in the Bryan-LeCompte house next door. Carlton and Mary Lee Dunn held title to the office block until 1944.

The Bayly building, erected around 1893, is a two-story, seven-bay by one-room brick-veneered frame structure located on the northeast corner of the intersection of High Street and Court Lane next to the Dorchester County Courthouse complex in the center of Cambridge, Dorchester County, Maryland. Identified with a street address of 513 Court Lane, the building faces southwest with the jerkinhead gable roof oriented on a northwest/southeast axis. Built during the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, the building was sheathed with a brick veneer during the mid twentieth century.

The southwest (main) elevation is marked by a center entrance and three two-over-two replacement sash to each side. The center bay projects slightly from the plane of the adjacent wall surfaces, and the bay is topped by cross-gable roof. Currently under renovation, the front entrance has been modified with the installation of a temporary construction door. At the sides of the wide opening the edges of the weatherboard siding is visible. The edge of the main roof is finished with an extended eave with open soffits typical of late nineteenth century. Piercing the roofline of the asphalt shingle roof are two internal brick stove chimneys.

The northwest gable end is a single bay wide with a replacement two-over-two sash window marking the first and second stories. The end of the building is distinguished by a jerkinhead or clipped gable roof finish with an extended eave and open soffits. The end bargeboard has a modest sawn decoration. The southeast gable end is largely covered by an adjacent single-story office. The upper end of the gable end, however, is not covered and reveals the frame construction of the original building. Part of the wall retains an asphalt shingle sheathing.

The northeast (rear) wall is marked by a series of two-over-two sash windows lighting the first and second floors. The roof edge is finished in the same way as the rest of the house with an extended eave and an open soffit.

The interior has been thoroughly gutted in the process of renovation.





STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

History:

This strip of land, sixteen and a half foot wide, was originally a part of Court Lane and as such extended from High Street to the creek. (Court Lane was until about 1852 known as Market Street, as it ran by the original Market House of Cambridge which stood on High Street on the northeast corner of the courthouse lot, until the courthouse burned down in 1851.) Under an Act of Legislature, the Commissioners of Cambridge were empowered to sell or lease a part of Market Street, and in March 1811, they conveyed said strip of land sixteen and a half feet in width to William Bond Martin, a prominent lawyer in his day and later judge of the circuit court. The price paid was \$165. In December 1819, Judge Martin sold to Dr. Arthur Rich one half of this strip extending to the back gate of the adjoining property for \$300. In August 1833, Dr. Rich sold the same property to Hon. Josiah Bayly for \$420. Josiah Bayly left the property to Dr. Alexander H. Bayly, who in turn left it to Alexander H. Bayly, Jr. Clement Sullivane assumes that it was Dr. Rich who built the original office on this property. The building consisted of two rooms until Alexander H. Bayly enlarged it in 1892.

Significance:

This building is part of an attractive row of small office buildings on Court Lane, which all date to sometime in the mid 19th century. These buildings are significant as some of the earliest surviving commercial structures in Cambridge.

The original part of this structure was built between 1811 and 1837. It served as a doctor's and lawyer's office throughout the nineteenth century. In 1833, Josiah Bayly acquired this lot and present day 511 Court Lane. In 1842, he sold the latter portion to his son-in-law, Joseph E. Muse, Jr., Josiah Bayly willed the office to his son, Dr. Alexander Hamilton Bayly, who used it as his office. Dr. Bayly's son Edgar inherited the office in 1892 and added to the original. The building is significant as one of the earliest professional offices in Cambridge, but the original architecture has been altered completely.


