Wye Plantation was, until its demolition in 1971, one of the finest mid-18th century dwellings on the Eastern Shore. According to tradition, the house was constructed in the late 1740's for Colonel Edward Tilghman. Forman notes that the date 1747 was inscribed in brick on the building, reinforcing this tradition. In contrast, there is no substance to the widely held belief that the house was the summer home of William Paca. The property was not acquired by the Paca family until 1811, twelve years after the death of the Signer and former Governor of Maryland.

The house was unusually large and handsomely finished for the period, and was a clear reflection of the wealth and status of its builder. The 1-1/2 story, double pile form of the house is relatively unusual in this region, as are the jerkin head gambrel roof and hipped roof dormers. The interior of the main house consisted of a variation of the Georgian plan in which the rooms on the south or water facade were larger than the north rooms. A fully developed service wing with covered passage extended from the east gable end.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The early brick house known as Wye Plantation was demolished in 1971 and a modern house was constructed on the site. The following description of Wye Plantation was prepared by Michael O. Bourne in 1968. This description, one photograph by Francis Benjamin Johnston, and the measured plan published by H.C. Forman in 1934 in Early Manor and Plantation Houses of Maryland comprise the only known professional documentation of the building. The house has been the subject of newspaper articles over the years and has been photographed on several occasions. Among the most useful photographs uncovered thus far are Dr. Forman's work in the early 1930's, a photograph from the mid-1930's taken by Francis Benjamin Johnston (Library of Congress files), and a series of photographs in the possession of Arthur Houghton.

Description

Wye Plantation is a 1-1/2 story brick building overlooking the Wye River. It has a gambrel roof with jerkin head. It is five bays long and two bays deep and has an eight bay "A" roof 1-1/2 story

service wing to the east. There is a molded water table on three sides and the brick is laid in Flemish bond. Above the windows are flat arches of gauged brick. On the second floor of the west gable are segmental arches. There are also segmental arches above the doors and windows of the service wing. The sash is six-over-six for the most part, some are two-over-two. The dormers have hipped roofs. The chimneys are nearly square, located in each gable end of the main section. There are two other chimneys in the service wing. The brickwork of the wing is badly in need of repair.


