Wheatlands was located approximately one mile south of Queenstown overlooking the headwaters of the Back Wye River. The site is located just south of U.S. Route 50 and west of Sportsman Neck Road.

This large 18th century house was demolished in the mid-20th century. The following description is based on the photograph, floor plan, and the brief notes recorded by Henry Chandlee Forman in his first book, Early Manor and Plantation Houses of Maryland (privately printed, 1934).

The main house was of frame construction, 2 ½ stories high, three bays wide and two rooms deep with a large brick interior chimney set off-center on the broad, pitched gable roof. The exterior of the house appears to have been relatively plain, based on Forman's photograph. The walls were sheathed with horizontal weatherboard siding, the cornice and rakeboards appear relatively simple.

The interior consisted of a two part hall extending the full depth of the house across the east gable, with two large rooms to the west. The stair was located in the southeast corner of the rear hall, rising four steps against the rear wall of the hall, then turning 90 degrees and continuing against the east gable wall.

The front room, to the west of the hall, was a large formal room 21 feet wide and 26 feet deep, with a large fireplace centered on the rear or south wall. The fireplace was set into a chimney shared with the smaller room to the rear. An interior photograph taken by Forman illustrates the paneled fireplace wall of the living room (the southwest room on the first floor).

Also evident in the Forman photograph and plan is a brick 1 ½ story kitchen wing to the east of the main house. A brick piazza formed a terrace to the east of the house, extending out to the east wall of the wing.

Wheatlands was a relatively unusual house in overall form and plan. While the side passage double pile plan was relatively common in the Federal period, this appears to have been a relatively early example and exhibited a number of unusual features. These included a stair that ran from back to front in a rear stair hall, and an unusual interior chimney between the two west rooms. The overall proportions of the house are also relatively unusual, particularly the size and relationship of the interior rooms. It is interesting to note that the unequal size of the front and rear rooms is a feature often found in Georgian plan houses but rarely found in Federal houses. The interior view illustrated by Forman is convincing evidence of the high level of interior decoration. The kitchen wing was also worthy of note, particularly if Forman's conjectured room use was correct.


