DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Merrick Farm, Barclay, located on the west side of Rt. 313 south of Barclay is a large brick five bay long mansard roof house with large back wing, nearly equal in size to the front. The east facade has five bays, with a porch across the entire facade. The central door with its sidelights and transom is slightly off-center and the windows above and to the north are closer than those to the south. All have 2/2 sash and originally had shutters. The porch is quite plain, with champhered posts and scrolled brackets. There are three dormers on the mansard roof, each with scrollwork at top and bottom and each having overhanging 'A' roofs. At the break in the two pitches of the roof is a crown molding. At each end of the house rises a large brick chimney, the north chimney within the gable, the south partly protruding.

The north gable has no windows and the south wall has two windows flanking the partly protruding chimney on the first and second stories each. Behind or west of the north half of the house is a 5-bay long addition, three bays of brick and two of

frame. Still farther is a frame lean-to or summer kitchen like the Dudley House in Ingleside. The north facade of the extension has a porch across the entire 5 bays and two doors opening thereon. The south porch roof extends even to include the summer kitchen, but the floor is only three bays long. The extended roof gives access to the basement below the kitchen, as well as stairs to the summer kitchen. A second basement entrance is located on the west side of the main block. From the seams in the brickwork, it is easy to determine that the main block was constructed in two stages probably in the late 18th century. The back wing was constructed in the 19th century, probably when the front was remodeled in the 1880 period.

The interior plan is similar to Dudley House in Ingleside, except the rooms appear larger. In the front part is a central stair hall with two parlors. The south parlor is of interest due to the windows flanking the fireplace and no windows on the west side. The hall opens onto the back porch beneath the stair. The north parlor has a simple white marble rococo form mantel in front of the fireplace. There is pass-thru access from the pantry to this cabinet. On the west side of the pantry is a secondary stair, with basement stair beneath. Beyond this is the regular kitchen, and finally the

summer kitchen, the latter retaining its large fireplace.

The trim throughout is standard woodwork of the 1870-80 period. One original 18th century door remains on the second story, over the north parlor.

Behind the house is a large smokehouse covered with asbestos siding. West of the smokehouse is a late 19th century barn and a lean-to chicken house, the latter with hewn frame.


