Standing on a lot distinguished by large shade trees, the Dashiell-Malone house is a story-and-a-half frame dwelling that dates to the second quarter of the nineteenth century. The one-room plan house features an exterior brick chimney on its southeast gable end, and the interior is fitted with late Federal/Greek Revival woodwork. An enclosed winder stair provides access to the second floor bedroom. The story-and-a-half, one-room plan main block is extended to the rear by a story-and-a-half hyphen and single-story kitchen. Reworked and raised during the 1940s, the hyphen was only a single-story structure without a second floor room. The kitchen has a separate enclosed staircase that provides access to the bedroom above.

The second quarter of the nineteenth century date of this date makes it one of the oldest surviving buildings in the village of Allen. At the same time it is the only extant example of a nineteenth century stepped or “telescope” house form in the village. The other structure of similar form, the “Virginia Cottage,” was assembled during the late 1970s using early to mid nineteenth century outbuildings.

The mid nineteenth century chain of ownership for this house is unclear. A house is located at this site on the 1877 Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas under the name of H. H. Dashiell, who resided in Princess Anne and probably rented the house. The chain of title research indicates the property as the “Dashiell-Kemper Lot.” In 1888,

Robert F. Brattan, a Princess Anne attorney serving as trustee, sold the "Dashiell and Kemper Lot" to Levi A. Malone. Fifty-nine year old Levi A. Malone and his wife, Letitia, surface in the 1880 U. S. Census in the household of sixty-one year old Simeon Malone, Levi's brother. The two brothers were listed as farmers. The property passed into various Malone family hands, and during the second quarter of the twentieth century it was known as the "Homeplace of Ashland F. Malone." Malone and related Pollitt family ownership of the property was maintained until the mid 1960s. It was purchased back by a Malone family descendant, Agnes Kolb Culp and her husband John in April 1978.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Dashiell-Malone house is located on the north side of Pollitt Road on the northern edge of the village of Allen, Wicomico County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half frame house faces southwest with the gable roof oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

Estimated to date to the second quarter of the nineteenth century, the story-and-a-half, one-room plan frame dwelling rests on minimal brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with asbestos shingles. The medium pitched gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the house is a story-and-a-half hyphen that joins a story-and-a-half kitchen to the main block. The hyphen section was raised from a single story height to a story-and-a-half elevation during the 1940s.

The southwest (main) elevation is a three-bay facade with the front door sheltered by a gable roofed stoop. The entrance is flanked by six-over-six sash windows flanked by vinyl shutters. The half story above is blind, and the base to the roof is finished with a boxed cornice.

The southeast gable end is dominated by an exterior, common bond brick chimney distinguished by corbelled shoulders. A single flue stack rises above the shoulders base. A single six-over-six sash window pierces the wall to the left of the stack, and small two-over-two sash windows light the upper story. The gable end is flush and finished with a plain bargeboard.

The northwest gable end is marked by a single six-over-six sash window on the first floor, and a smaller window on the second floor that is actually a door opening. The larger second floor door opening allows for access to the second floor without having to negotiate the interior corner staircase. The gable end is flush and finished with a plain bargeboard.

The back wall of the main block is fully covered by the story-and-a-half hyphen, which has gabled dormers that interrupt the roofline. A shed roof porch stretches across the southeast side to shelter the side entrance. The one-room plan kitchen extends northward from the hyphen.

The interiors have been remodeled, but several late Federal mantels remain in place. Fixed in the southeast corner of the main room is a corner winder stair enclosed behind a board-and-batten door. A late Federal mantel frames the firebox. A second mantel remains in the middle section, and surviving in the kitchen is a second boxed stair that leads to the bedroom over the kitchen.

(IDT 160/576) Malone and related Pollitt family ownership of the property was maintained until the mid 1960s. (Wicomico County Land Record, JWTS 596/401) It was purchased back by a Malone family descendant, Agnes Kolb Culp and her husband John in April 1978. (Wicomico County Land Record, 896/331)

This house qualifies for listing in *Category A*, due to its age and good integrity as one of the oldest structures remaining in the village of Allen.




