Distinguished by an elaborate turned post porch with sawn corner brackets and a row of spindles under the eaves, this two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame house stands in the center of the river village of Nanticoke. The tee-shaped dwelling was designed and built around 1905. The decorative front porch, the cross-gabled roof, the open soffits with exposed rafter ends, and the single flue brick chimneys finished with corbeled caps are common features for houses erected around the turn of the twentieth century.

Credit for construction of the house is awarded George W. Street, who purchased two lots of land along the county road in May 1905 from Edward S. S. Turner and his wife Alice P. Turner. He paid \$250 for the property, which indicates the lots were unimproved at the time. Construction of the tee-shaped house probably occurred that year. George and his wife Elizabeth maintained ownership of the house and lot until 1911. Following World War I the house and lot were owned by Robert E. Travers and Adda H. Travers between 1920 and 1956.

Historically identified as the George W. Street house, and also known as the Robert Travers house or the Pruitt house, this two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame house stands at 20538 Nanticoke Road in the village of Nanticoke, Wicomico County, Maryland. The center hall frame dwelling faces east with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Estimated by architectural details and land records to date around 1905, the two-and-a-half story, center hall/single-pile main block is extended to the rear by a two-story kitchen wing that has a shed roofed pantry on porch on the south side. The house is supported on a raised infilled brick pier foundation, and the exterior is clad uniformly with aluminum siding. The steeply pitched gable roofs are covered with asphalt shingles. Joining the house on the lot is a single story garage and a small outbuilding where a former owner shucked oysters.

The east (main) elevation is a symmetrical five-bay facade with a projecting center bay containing the entrance. A partially glazed front door is framed by a three-light transom and two-light sidelights. Pairs of one-over-one sash windows are located to each side and each window lintel has a slight crown molding. Sheltering the first floor is a turned post porch embellished with sawn corner brackets and a row of spindles under the eave. The decorated rafter ends are exposed. The second floor is marked by a paired set of one-over-one sash windows in the center bay and single one-over-one sash to each side. The window lintels have a small crown molding. Centered on the roof is a cross gable pierced by a pointed arch window. The eaves to the roof are extended and the decorated rafter ends are exposed.

The north and south gable ends are largely alike with interior end brick stove chimney rising through the roof. The chimney stacks are finished with corbeled caps. One-over-one sash windows flank the chimneys on the first and second floors, and small one-over-one sash light the attic. The gable end is finished with an extended eave trimmed with a decorated bargeboard.

Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-bay kitchen wing that gives the house a tee shape. The kitchen is extended on its south side by a shed roof porch supported by turned posts and partially enclosed with an end pantry. Single-pane sash windows light the first and second floors. An interior end brick stove chimney rises through the gable roof.

The interior was not seen.






Parcel 57


