The story-and-a-half log dwelling known as the Mezick house is a particularly unusual structure for a nineteenth and twentieth century village in Wicomico County. While the exact design inspiration for this house has not been recalled by area residents, its actual construction around 1934 is well remembered. The logs were cut by Allan Mezick himself, who financed construction of the house. Pealed of their bark, the round logs were laid in saddle notches with the ends extending beyond the wall surfaces. The four log walls were covered by a steeply pitched gable roof pierced by gabled dormers in front and a large shed dormer to the rear.

The round log house was probably inspired by the rustic architecture of the Adirondack camps or similar mountain lodges scattered across the United States. Allan W. and Esther R. Mezick acquired this lot in the mid 1930s and financed construction of the log house at that time. The building has remained essentially unchanged since the mid 1930s and it contrasts distinctly with the other dwellings in Tyaskin.

The Mezick house stands on the east side of Tyaskin Road in the creek-side village of Tyaskin, Wicomico County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half log house faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1934, the story-and-a-half round log house is supported by an excavated cellar which has a brick veneer. The round logs are joined at the corners with saddle notches, and the logs extend approximately a foot-and-a-half beyond the side walls of the building. The log house is covered by a steeply pitched asphalt shingle roof. Joining the house on the lot is a single-story frame garage, and the yard is landscaped with mature trees and boxwood.

The west (main) facade is a three-bay elevation with the individual bays filled with single six-over-six sash windows. The foundation is pierced by small cellar windows. The steeply pitched gable roof features a pair of gable-roofed dormers filled with six-over-six sash windows. The edge of the roof is finished with exposed and undecorated rafter ends.

The north gable end of the log house is pierced by side entrance in the east (right) bay and a six-over-six sash window in the west (left) bay. A smaller six-over-six sash window is fixed in between the door and window, and an exterior brick stove chimney rises against the gable end. A six-over-six sash window also pierces the gable end.

The south gable end features an exterior brick chimney, and a shed roof porch shelters the first floor.

The east (rear) wall is pierced by paired six-over-six sash windows to each side of a center entrance. A large shed roofed dormer marks the roof slope.

The interior was not seen.
