Situated prominently along Main Street in the center of Mardela Springs, is a two-story gable-front frame dwelling historically identified as the Thomas B. Taylor house. The long six-bay main block appears to have been erected in two stages with the prominent two-story, side hall/parlor section on the west dating to the mid nineteenth century, probably around 1850-60. Attached to the east side of the gable-front main block is a two-story, three-bay section that dates to the second quarter of the nineteenth century, probably around 1830-40. At the time the gable-front addition was erected, the older dwelling was restyled as well, and a turned post porch was stretched across the entire front, thereby unifying the two buildings. Corner pilasters were attached to each corner of the enlarged and the windows were trimmed with molded lintels, which added more architectural consistency to the composite house. One of the most distinctive exterior elements is the Palladian or Venetian style window that lights the attic of the gable-front dwelling.

Although it is uncertain when the individual sections of the house were erected, the house was the long-term residence of Mardela Springs merchant Thomas B. Taylor. He acquired a small portion of "Ill Neighborhood" from Charles T. and Nancy Ralph of Dorchester County. According to the transfer he paid \$1,223.04 for the property,

which suggest that it was well improved. Thomas B. Taylor is designated at this location on the 1877 Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas, although he owned the house immediately to the east as well. The size and mid-nineteenth century sophistication of this house points to his probable residency in this dwelling. At the end of the century, however, the house was rented. It is listed in the long list of properties offered for sale following Thomas B. Taylor's death in 1901. The house and lot are described

No. 2 House and lot in Mardela Springs, where A. S. Venables resides, front on Main Street on the South, Taylor Street on the West, Cooper Alley on the North and (the) Beach lot on the East, containing 133 perches of land, more or less, improved by a two story double dwelling 48 feet by 18 side porch all the way down. Back building 32 x 14 and back building 24 x 12, 7 rooms below 4 rooms above. Corn house, stables and smokehouse.

Estate trustee, Jay Williams, sold the house and lot three years later to Ida D. Langsdale who transferred it fourteen years later to Annie B. Wright. During the mid twentieth century, another long-term owner was Katie F. and Myra Evans, who held title to the house and lot during the 1950s and 1960s.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Thomas B. Taylor house is located at 203 Main Street in the center of Mardela Springs, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, six-bay frame house faces south with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Estimated to date to the second and third quarters of the nineteenth century, the two-story, six-bay structure was clearly erected in two stages. The main two-story, three-bay side hall/parlor house, estimated to date around 1860-70, has a gable-front roof and it contains the principal entrance. Attached to the east side of the main house is a two-story, three-bay wing that may date to the second quarter of the nineteenth century, c. 1830-40. The house is supported on a raised brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with asbestos shingles. The medium pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the house is a two-story late nineteenth century kitchen wing.

The south (main) facade is an asymmetrical six-bay elevation. The main entrance contains a heavily molded eight-panel door framed by a two-light transom and four-light sidelights. The two adjacent bays to the west are filled with large size six-over-six sash windows trimmed with molded lintels. To the east of the main entrance is another door flanked by six-over-six sash windows. The secondary entrance contains a partially glazed door. Sheltering the entire first floor is a turned post shed-roofed porch. The second floor is marked by a series of five unevenly spaced six-over-six sash windows trimmed with molded lintels. Fixed in the upper gable of the main block is a Palladian style window with a round arched center window filled with a six-over-six sash, and narrow two-over-two sash flanked the center sash. Defining the edge of the roof is an extended eave with returns at the bottom ends. The boxed cornice is trimmed with mid nineteenth century bed and crown moldings. The second floor of the east end wing is marked by a pair of six-over-six sash windows. The outside corners of the house are defined by wide paneled pilasters.

Marking the west side of the main block are pairs of six-over-six sash windows on each floor, and the base of the roof is enclosed with a continuation of the boxed cornice. Each of the windows have a molded lintel. The pilaster that trims the northwest corner is paneled on the west side and plain on the north (rear) wall. The pilasters terminate with a molded capital instead of rising completely to the cornice.

The rear wall is a blind wall other than a single six-over-six sash window that lights the attic. A single brick chimney pierces the roof. The edge of the roof is finished with a molded bargeboard.

Attached to the back of the house is late nineteenth century two-story kitchen wing that is surrounded by a partially enclosed shed roof porch. An interior end brick stove chimney pierces the gable end. The edge of the roof is defined by exposed rafter ends.

The interior was not fully seen, but the gable-front porch is fitted with third quarter of the nineteenth century woodwork. A second quarter of the nineteenth century mantel is located in the east end room currently used for dining.





