It stands on a stuccoed foundation and a brick chimney rises high above the "A" roof on the south end of the original portion, now nearly the center of the building. It is covered with asbestos siding and has two over two sash, both later renovations. The most important feature of the building is its fine cornice which has shaped modillions, dentils and a series of arches on its fascia. It bears strong resemblance to the cornice at Genezir. Across the east facade is a one-story porch. It is the only building at Ironshire which has any great age.</p>
