| <p>Friendship is actually an early Victorian house built in the Federal style. The two-story frame structure, three bays long and three bays deep, and its two-bay-long, one-and-a-half story wing are built on a brick foundation. It is covered with clapboard which has lost its paint. The facade of the house faces south. It has corner pilasters and a pediment. The entrance is on the east side of the facade and has sidelights with panels beneath, and a portico of little merit. Paneled blocks are placed at both top and bottom of the window trim. The window having the entrance is lower than the others but in order to make the trim even at the top, a small lattice panel was placed between the sash and the trim. A brick chimney pierces the roof about two-thirds back from the facade.</p> <p>The wing has a porch on its facade and a single dormer in the south side of the "A" roof. Another wing of nearly equal size is built at right angles to the former wing.</p> | | | |
