Curtis United Methodist Church, also referred to as Curtis Chapel, is a single-story Gothic Revival frame church that stands near the small crossroads community of Campbelltown. The asymmetrical plan, the pointed arch windows, and the corner entrance tower are common features for rural Methodist churches of this period. Construction of Curtis Chapel is dated by its cornerstone to September 27, 1914, when contractor L. J. Clark, whose name is also inscribed in marble, presumably set it in the foundation. However, this church is the second building located on the site. The first church building, a plain two-story structure, stands across the road. Designated at this location on the 1877 atlas map is a "Col'd Meth. Epis. Church & School No. 1." The congregation history states that a church was established around 1870 on a one-quarter acre lot donated by Colonel Curtis W. Jacobs, a large landholder who owned around 6000 acres in northern Worcester County at the time. The initial church trustees were Benjamin Tinley, Amos Brevard, Soloman Ayres, Jacob Holland, and Isma Holland.



Curtis Methodist Church stands on the east side of Campbelltown Road, a half mile south of the Campbelltown crossroads, which is located five miles northwest of Berlin, Worcester County, Maryland. The single-story tee-shaped frame church faces west with the main gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Erected in 1914, the single-story Gothic Revival church is supported by a concrete block foundation. Fixed in a corner of the foundation next to the front steps is a marble datestone inscribed, "Curtis M. E. Church, Built Sept. 27, 1914, L. J. Clark, Contractor & Builder." The church is sheathed with asbestos shingles, and it is covered with an asphalt roof.

The west (main) elevation is an asymmetrical elevation with an entrance tower rising in the front corner of the tee plan. Pointed arch openings filled with frosted clear glass sash windows mark the sides of the building. The entrance has been altered with the insertion of replacement doors.

The north and south sides of the church are defined by pointed arch sash windows. The interior of the building was not seen.

Located across the street, on the west side of Campbelltown Road, is a two-story church hall and the church cemetery.


