Standing on a small knoll overlooking West Market Street, the Naomi Moore house is located on Mason Street, also known as Agnew Alley. This section of Snow Hill, bordered by West Federal Street and Dighton Avenue was once known as "Freetown," an area where many of Snow Hill's free black residents built their houses. With its story-and-a-half, one-room plan form, the center block of the Naomi Moore house is probably one of a handful of dwellings that date to the middle years of the nineteenth century.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Standing at 102 Mason Street (also known as Agnew Alley) is the Naomi Moore house, a story-and-a-half frame dwelling that faces north with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Estimated to date to the third quarter of the nineteenth century (1850-1875), the story-and-a-half, one-room plan frame house, is clad in asbestos shingles, and it rests on a low brick foundation. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the front of the house is a shed roofed enclosed porch, and another shed roofed section extends from the east gable end. A gable roofed addition stretches to the rear.

The story-and-a-half house is served by an interior end brick chimney that rises from the east gable. Marking the north slope of the roof is a gabled dormer filled with a six-over-one sash window. The front and rear eaves to the roof are finished with boxed cornices and the sides of the roof are flush, trimmed with a plain bargeboard.

The interior was not seen.




