Justification for decision: (Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map)
Located at 607 Morris Street, Salisbury, this school complex was constructed in the early 1950s, serving as the second high school for African Americans in the county. A campus plan was developed by Edward Wilson Booth, an architect responsible for many Wicomico County schools in this period. Salisbury High School consisted of six buildings including administration, academic and technical classrooms, cafeteria and gymnasium. Three additional buildings were constructed from 1959-1966. The school was converted to a vocational high school in 1966. Because the school is less than fifty years old it must demonstrate exceptional significance to be eligible. While the school served as an important focal point in the African American community, the school building is too recent to provide appropriate historical perspective. Because education segregation was widespread at the time of the school's construction, this factor alone does not make the school historically significant. The campus style design is a notable consideration but this theme lacks development in the submitted information. I believe the school is not eligible for the Maryland Register.






