Erected around 1905, the Wathan Farmhouse is a typical example of a 2-story frame I-house with a decorative cross gable. Like many similar examples, a 2-story service wing is attached to the rear elevation creating an overall L-plan. Originally associated with a 100 acre farm, The Wathan Farmhouse is representative of the simple vernacular farmhouses constructed throughout Charles County from the close of the Civil War until the early 20th century. The property, known at various times as "Part of Assington" and "Calf Stick", was owned by members of the Wathan family since the late 19th century. In 1897-98 Thomas A. Wathan acquired the land from John R. Wathan and Frances Edelen and likely constructed the current dwelling soon after. The land descended to John A. Edelen in 1924 before passing out of the family in the 1980's.

Erected around 1905, the Wathan Farmhouse is a typical example of a 2-story frame I-house with a decorative cross gable. Like many similar examples, a 2-story service wing is attached to the rear elevation creating an overall L-plan. The dwelling faces west and stands slightly back from Penns Hill Road on an open lot which includes a number of scattered mature trees. The farm associated with this dwelling once consisted of over 100 acres has been subdivided into three acres lots largely located to the rear of the dwelling. While the interior finishes have been slightly altered siding, the floorplan and windows remain intact and the original novelty siding remains under the contemporary treatment. A chicken house and garage also share the site.

The foundation was not visible at the time of the survey but according to the owners, the frame rests on wooden piers. A skimmed concrete curtain obscures the foundation material. Aluminum siding covers the original beveled siding. Octagonal asphalt shingles now protect the roof which is pierced by two asymmetrically placed interior brick chimney flues. The cornice is boxed. A one story, full width hipped roof porch is found on the façade. Later additions include an enclosed hipped roof porch on the gable end of the service wing and a bathroom/utility room in the interior of the L. All windows include the original 2/2 wood sash with the exception of the kitchen window in the first floor service wing. The front door has also been replaced.

The front elevation is three bays in length and includes paired 2/2 windows on either side of the centered entrance. The second story includes three symmetrical windows below a single centered square 4/light window in the cross gable. The porch shelters the ground floor and is supported by four simple square wooden posts on a reworked concrete and brick curtain pad. The south elevation simply includes a single first floor and single second story window. Two second story rear elevation of the main block has two 2/2 windows while the first floor has a single 2/2 window. In addition, a single window stands in the addition. Opposite this, the eave wall of the service wing includes a pair of 2/2 windows above a single first floor window. The rear gable end has a single centered second story 2/2 above an enclosed porch. This porch includes a grouping of four narrow 2/2 windows next to a rear doorway near the driveway. These windows extend to the other elevations of the addition. The north elevation includes two second story 2/2 windows above a two first floor windows. The original 2/2 window found in the kitchen has been replaced with a modern 6/6 plate glass window.

The interior is largely typical of other examples in the area and includes a center hall with stairway adorned with a newel. Rooms flank either side. The kitchen includes several nice historic features such as a tin ceiling, original exterior door with transom and an enclosed corner stair.

Originally associated with a 100 acre farm, The Wathan Farmhouse is representative of the simple vernacular farmhouses constructed throughout Charles County from the close of the Civil War until the early 20th century. The property known at various times as "Part of Assington" and "Calf Stick" was owned by members of the Wathan family since the late 19th century. In 1897-98 Thomas A. Wathan acquired the land from John R. Wathan and Frances Edelen and likely constructed the current dwelling soon after. The land descended to John A. Edelen in 1924 before passing out of the family in the 1980's. After this time the farm was subdivided and the dwelling sold to the current owners.

Following the Civil War, Charles County suffered the same fate as most of the southern states. The basis of the economy, slave labor, was gone. While planters continued to rely heavily on tobacco cultivation, slave labor was replaced with various systems of tenancy or wage labor. Due to dwindling profits, credit collapsed and many planters fell deep into debt. In addition, Federal taxes levied by the "carpet-bag" government threatened landowners with the loss of their land. This lack of capital made it difficult for farmers to branch out into other agricultural and commercial pursuits.

Adding to the economic stagnation following the war, was the unpredictability of tobacco prices. Through the latter part of the 19th century, tobacco values remained depressed, insuring that the small tenant farmers and share-croppers struggled. Tobacco production fell precipitously following the Civil War. In 1870, Charles County's crop fell in volume to less than half of what it was ten years earlier, and in price from 8 cents per pound in 1869 to just five cents per pound in 1889. By 1909 prices had still not recovered, rising only to 7 cents.

The post-war period also marked the end of large farms. In 1870 there were 545 farms in Charles County. By 1900 that number had more than tripled at 1900 farms. Farm size continually decreased as large farms, containing over 500 acres, were divided. The most dramatic increase was seen in the number of farms under fifty acres, which more than doubled between 361 farms in 1880 and 728 farms in 1920.

The turmoil of the Reconstruction era continued in Charles County well into the 20th century. Because of these economic difficulties, population growth in the county stagnated between 1860 and 1920. The general economic decline, and later, stagnation that followed the Civil War is evident in the census figures between 1860 and 1890. By 1890, the number of county residents was nearly 1,400 less than in 1860. With little industry or profitable agriculture drawing new residents to the county during the post-Civil War era, many young Charles County residents moved away as they reached maturity.


