The Welcome Firetower is a riveted steel lattice tower standing on the west side of Firetower Road. Erected in 1934, the Welcome Firetower is one of two remaining firetowers in Southern Maryland that is believed to have been constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Active between 1933 and 1942 the Civilian Conservation Corp was created by Franklin Delano Roosevelt in an effort to relieve widespread unemployment during the Great Depression and to counter soil erosion and declining timber resources. Two such camps existed in Charles County, Cedarville State Park and Doncaster State Forest. At least six towers once stood in Southern Maryland including Brandywine, Great Mills (St. Mary's County) and Pasadena. The land for the tower was given in 1934 by Charles Timothy Ford of nearby Rosemary Lawn (CH-105NR) for the administration of forestry.

The Welcome Firetower is a riveted steel lattice tower standing on the west side of Firetower Road. Providing a sweeping view of much of Charles County, the tower which has recently been painted silver, includes two main and approximately six secondary observation platforms. The site, enclosed with a barbed wire fence, includes a ruinous outhouse at the far corner and a small concrete block shed inside the existing 8 foot wire mesh fence. The tower is ascended by a series of wooden stairs. The shed, used as a communication room, has an asphalt shingle roof and includes wood plank sheathing on the gable ends. The outhouse was a two door frame structure on a poured concrete foundation. The walls were covered with wood shingle siding which show evidence of original blue paint. The site is currently maintained by the Maryland State Police and was most recently used in preparation of any Y2K complications in 2000.

Erected in 1934, the Welcome Firetower is one of two remaining firetowers in Southern Maryland that is believed to have been constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Active between 1933 and 1942 the Civilian Conservation Corp was created by Franklin Delano Roosevelt in an effort to relieve widespread unemployment during the Great Depression and to counter soil erosion and declining timber resources. Eventually there was at least one CCC camp in every State. Two such camps existed in Charles County, Cedarville State Park and Doncaster State Forest.

The Welcome Firetower was part of a grid system throughout Southern Maryland. The information was relayed to a control center in Brandywine (Prince Georges County) where spotters from various towers in the region could pinpoint the approximate location of a fire and send runners in the field. At least six towers once stood in Southern Maryland including Brandywine, Great Mills (St. Mary's County) and Pasadena. (1) In 1934, Charles Timothy Ford of nearby Rosemary Lawn (CH-105NR) granted 3/4 acre to the State of Maryland with the condition that it be used by for the administration of forestry or the property shall revert back to Ford. (2)




