The property known as the Rinehart-Miller-Gecell House, located on the Old Westminster Road between Westminster on the northwest and Reese on the southeast, in Carroll County, MD., is not considered eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

The property consists of a mid-19th-century house and its associated kitchen dependency. The two-story, two-bay dwelling, probably of log construction, has been significantly enlarged by a two-story rear ell and altered, most notably, by replacement windows and new siding (a brick veneer on the first story facade and vinyl siding on all others). The detached kitchen is of frame construction, covered with a gable roof and featuring a large brick end chimney. Neither building survives as a distinctive example of its type. Further, the property is not known to have any associations with events or persons significant to our past; the property is not eligible for listing on the National Register under Criteria A, B, or C.

Description

This modest site is located on Old Westminster Pike between Westminster on the northwest and Reese on the southeast. It is composed of a small, possibly log, ell-shaped dwelling which has been heavily altered with new chimney, vinyl siding and replacement windows of proportions and sizes much different from the original, plus imitation brick sheathing on the north (entrance) facade. The one story, full width porch is carried around the northeast corner and one-half the depth of the east elevation on the contemporary styled wrought iron supports.

The standing seam metal roof has a gable which parallels the north facing principal elevation. The entrance is located west of center between a three-part picture window on the east and a one-over-one sash window on the west.

Just east of the structure is a small, gable roofed, frame domestic outbuilding, possibly a small summer kitchen. There is a large brick chimney on the east elevation, and an entrance sheltered by a shed roof extension on the south side. It is clad in German siding.

This property was owned in the mid-nineteenth century by John Rinehart, who acquired land along the south side of the Old Westminster Pike. He resided on a large, 138 acre farm located on the south side of the Old Westminster Pike in the southwest quadrant of its intersection with Beaver Run Road (now called Arnold Road), in the middle decades of the nineteenth century.


During his tenure he divided off five lots: two for his sons Jacob and William along Beaver Dam Road, and three along the south side of Old Westminster Pike, two of which he evidently built on. This is one of the structures that he built.

Thus this property may be that referred to as Parcel #3 in Equity Case 1027 (between Maggie A. Little and others versus Jacob Rinehart, et. al, Admrs and others, of July 15, 1869). It was described in the Democratic Advocate of January 16, 1869 as "improved with a comfortable, two-story log rough cast house with a good cellar." Prior to the sale of the house by the estate of John Rinehart it was evidently rented to tenants. By 1877 the property was owned by E. Miller, and in 1916 by August Gecell.

Significance

This very modest historic site, probably built by John Rinehart in the late 1850's, is composed of a simple, probable log house and a small domestic outbuilding thought to be a summer kitchen. The dwelling has been extensively altered with an imitation brick facade, replacement windows, vinyl siding, and other changes equally disfiguring. The only extant period outbuilding, thought to be a summer kitchen, is in better condition.
