

What was once obviously a large and wealthy Roman Catholic church is now vacant and falling into disrepair. Built in 1902, this church is a modified basilica plan whereby the side aisles and upper triforium are in the same vertical plane. Built on a rusticated stone base, the church is the perennial Baltimore brick, but with white stone facing. The west (main) front has a typical European layout with two towers, three entrance doorways with arcade of windows above, and with a rose window. The arches of the doorways and the windows above are Romanesque in shape and there are 3/4 columns with Romanesque capitals on the reveals of the doorway arches and on the bell tower ventilator (louvred) windows. In the rear, on the West Lombard Street side, there is a 1931 stucco additon that appears to be the entrance to a grotto or shrine of some kind. Adjoining the church on the South Mount Street side is rather nice, ~~probably~~ probably earlier, brick parish house. This church is one of the tallest buildings in the Union Square area and is visible from some distance (it can be seen from the Baltimore-Washington Expressway, for example) and it should be preserved as an area landmark and some compatible use should be found for it.


