Overview

Genealogy is the study of family histories.1

This beginning-level lecture is meant to help you learn the first steps to start discovering your ancestors and recording your family history. An overview of national, regional and local resources will be provided as well as a discussion of useful Internet sites

Basic Steps:

- 1. Start with what you know.
- 2. Identify a research objective.
- 3. Develop a research plan.
- 4. Execute the plan.
- 5. Analyze, evaluate and correlate the information.

Step 1: Start with What You Know

- Start with your immediate family and then work back in time.
- Seek family traditions and oral history.
- Contact family members.
- You can use genealogy software or forms.

Step 2: Identify a Research Objective

- Identify a single, clearly-defined objective, including name, time period, location, and what information you hope to find.
- Learn about the locality to determine what sources are available for the time period.
- Conduct a literature search.

Step 3: Develop a Research Plan A good research plan includes:

- Background information and evaluation of the problem.
- Identification of any constraints or limitations.
- Identification of records and repositories.

- A summary of findings.
- Full research notes and analysis of information.
- Identification of next steps.

Step 4: Execute the Plan

- List the repositories you visited.
- List the resources you used.
- Cite your sources!
- Identify records that could not be searched or provided negative results.
- Discuss any problems encountered.
- Take full research notes by abstracting, extracting or transcribing the relevant records recording all relevant details.
- Clearly separate your comments from the information in the record.
- Make copies as necessary.

Step 5: Analyze, Evaluate & Correlate

- Analyze and evaluate the new information and negative results.
- Organize it in a systematic way, such as chronologically using a timeline.
- Does it correlate with what you already know?
- Evidence has different confidence levels.
- What future research needs to be conducted?
