


AN ACT concerning




Lift Every Voice and Sing

Thurgood Marshall - BWI Timeline Highlights

1908

THURGOOD MARSHALL IS BORN IN BALTIMORE, MARYLAND.

1925

GRADUATES FROM FREDERICK DOUGLASS HIGH SCHOOL.

1933

RECEIVES LAW DEGREE FROM HOWARD UNIVERSITY AND BEGINS LAW PRACTICE IN BALTIMORE.

1935

WINS FIRST MAJOR CIVIL RIGHTS CASE.

1936

TAKES A POSITION WITH NAACP IN NEW YORK.

1939

WINS FIRST OF SEVERAL CASES REQUIRING EQUAL PAY FOR BLACK AND WHITE PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS.

1944

SUCCESSFULLY ARGUES IN THE U.S. SUPREME COURT THE CASE AGAINST ALL WHITE PRIMARY ELECTIONS.

1951

VISITS KOREA AND JAPAN TO INVESTIGATE CHARGES OF RACISM IN THE ARMED FORCES DISCIPLINE.

1956

SUCCEEDS IN FORCING UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA TO ADMIT AUTHERINE LUCY.

1961

APPOINTED TO FEDERAL APPEALS COURT BY PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY.

1965

APPOINTED TO SOLICITOR GENERAL OF THE UNITED STATES BY PRESIDENT LYNDON JOHNSON.

1967

APPOINTED TO THE U.S. SUPREME COURT BY PRESIDENT LYNDON JOHNSON.

1970

WRITES A UNANIMOUS DECISION ORDERING SCHOOL SYSTEMS TO BUS STUDENTS TO BALANCE RACIAL ENROLLMENTS.

1991

RETIRES FROM THE U.S. SUPREME COURT AFTER 24 YEARS OF SERVICE.

1993

THURGOOD MARSHALL DIES IN JANUARY AT THE AGE OF 84.

2005

BWI AIRPORT IS RENAMED BALTIMORE/WASHINGTON INTERNATIONAL THURGOOD MARSHALL AIRPORT.

1910

FIRST AIRPLANE FLIGHT OVER AN AMERICAN CITY OCCURS DURING AN AIR RACE IN BALTIMORE.

1921

LOGAN FIELD, THE FIRST COMMERCIAL AVIATION FACILITY IN MARYLAND, OPENS IN BALTIMORE.

1930

SCHEDULED PASSENGER SERVICE BEGINS FROM LOGAN FIELD.

1947

CONSTRUCTION ON A NEW AIRPORT BEGINS. THE AIRPORT IS OFFICIALLY NAMED *FRIENDSHIP INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT*.

1950

PRESIDENT HARRY S. TRUMAN DEDICATES FRIENDSHIP INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT ON JUNE 24TH. SCHEDULED AIR SERVICE BEGINS ONE MONTH LATER. THE AIRPORT IS VIEWED AS THE MOST ADVANCED IN THE UNITED STATES.

1957

FRIENDSHIP INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT IS THE EAST COAST TERMINUS OF THE RECORD-BREAKING TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT BY FIRST BOEING 707 JETLINER.

1972

THE STATE OF MARYLAND, THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, PURCHASES FRIENDSHIP INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FROM THE CITY OF BALTIMORE FOR \$36 MILLION.

1973

THE AIRPORT IS RENAMED BALTIMORE/WASHINGTON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT (BWI) TO REFLECT ITS ROLE AS THE TRANSPORTATION CENTER OF THE REGION.

1980

BWI AMTRAK RAIL STATION OPENS, SERVING PASSENGERS THROUGHOUT THE NORTHEAST CORRIDOR. BWI BECOMES THE FIRST AIRPORT IN THE U.S. TO HAVE A RAIL STATION ON AIRPORT GROUNDS.

1989

BWI BREAKS ALL PREVIOUS PASSENGER TRAFFIC RECORDS, REACHING MORE THAN ONE MILLION PASSENGERS IN A MONTH FOR THE FIRST TIME.

1997

WILLIAM DONALD SCHAEFER INTERNATIONAL PIER E AND LIGHT RAIL OPEN TO THE PUBLIC.

2005

BWI OPENS NEW TERMINAL A/B, HOME OF SOUTHWEST AIRLINES AND THE HIGHLIGHT OF MARYLAND AVIATION ADMINISTRATION'S MULTI-YEAR IMPROVEMENT AND EXPANSION PLAN.
