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INTRODUCTION

By Mr. E. B. Taylor



Mr. Robert W. Coleman, in conceiving and compiling the first Colored Business Directory, performed a service of incalculable value to all the people, not only of this city and state, but of the country. As far as I have been able to ascertain, there was no such systematic collection anywhere in the United States, prior to his inauguration of it in Baltimore, although since then the idea has been extensively copied throughout the Union.

As a result of not having such a record, when we wished to address the colored business community, it was essential to go through all sorts of round about ways to secure their names. In southern communities the usual method was to plod through several thousand pages of a city directory, selecting the names preceded by a star. This was often inaccurate and unsatisfactory, as I know personally scores of colored people whose names were not as marked, due to the fact that a light skinned person would answer the queries of the solicitor, or because the house was perhaps too nice looking for a colored tenant (in the judgment of the same men) or because it seemed too busy a place, or too large a corporation for a person of color. Mr. Coleman by collecting these names into a compact little volume has saved time which cannot be estimated.

His rewards have not of course been commensurate with the good he has accomplished.

Before closing I want to pay a tribute to the wonderful disposition of the compiler of this volume. If there is any person in the world whose disposition I envy, it is "Bob" Coleman's.

A young, active man, interested in social, business and political activities, is suddenly stricken almost blind. A wife, six (6) beautiful children (and they girls) to care for, a man would almost feel justified in giving way to despair. Not so Mr. Coleman. He has never stopped to realize he is not like other men. With renewed vigor, undaunted he set out, found new avenues of profit, has gotten his girls to the point where one is about to graduate, has maintained his home, kept up his cheerful, optimistic disposition and has constantly climbed the rounds of the ladder of success. His life is an inspiration to us all, who when much more minor troubles assail us, are ready to throw up our hands in surrender. He deserves, if any one does, the general support of all.

We are living in a new epoch. The end of the great world war, and the completion of three hundred years of residence in this country, eloquently proclaims that "Old things are passed away; behold all things are become new." Our racial endeavor must be tuned to a "new song." We must not sing the "old song," but a "new song," issuing from the accumulated experiences of past endeavors, and conquests. One of the elements of the new song is a fuller realization of our relation to the one Brotherhood of man. In the past, we have been more concerned with the part, rather than with the whole. We have been too much self-centered on our racial needs. We must reverse the order. We must lose our lives in the interest of the welfare of the whole, and, in so doing, we shall find life in our particular group richer and more abundant because of the unselfish endeavor. Instead of holding ourselves aloof from the problems and concerns, of the various foreign nationalities by which we are environned, and who, in a degree, suffer from the same root of bitterness which affect us, we must steadily cultivate their friendship and good will. Knowing each other the better, our combined effort for the good of the whole will bring far better results than we can secure in selfishly working for the interests of our group alone.

Presently, We hope, we shall be through with heavy Church debts. The meaning of this release is plain. The Church will sing a new song. The clergy will then betake themselves to their real mission. It was not intended that they should be general promoters, and students of finance, but promoters of the Kingdom of God, and students of spiritual and moral concerns. In thus applying themselves they will sing a "new song," not alone for the particular racial group of which they form a part, but, chiefly, for the whole brotherhood, waiting for the distinctive contribution the African Church is to render for the good of the universal family. The materials they have; eloquence, oratory, vision, faith and love. They need to organize and rightly handle such racial endowments. Time for study they must have. The pastoral office must be made real and effective. They must be known by their goodness or likeness to God, and by their unquestioned learning. Out of the abundance of their hearts they shall speak, "Thus saith the Lord," and in their fidelity to this matter, they shall supply what the rest of the whole brotherhood need more than any other one thing. In short, the very heart of Christianity is the application in real life and conduct, the Law of Love; for the founder of Christianity declared that by this sign shall all men know that ye are my disciples. God has done marvellous things for us, and He demands of us a "New Song." Shall we sing it?

SOME NOTABLE EVENTS DURING THE YEAR 1919

The magnificent structure, costing one hundred thousand dollars, the home of the Druid Hill Branch of the Young Men's Christian Association, was formerly dedicated.

It was during the year, 1919, for the first time, that two colored men, both college graduates and lawyers, were elected members of the City Council, Mr. Warner T. McGuinn in the Fourteenth Ward and Mr. William L. Fitzgerald in the Seventeenth Ward.

"Men of Maryland," a historical account of early events pertaining to the Colored race, and sketches of a number of eminent Colored Americans, prominent in the affairs of the country, all of whom were born in Maryland, by the Rev. George F. Bragg, D. D., has been placed on the list to be used in the Public Schools of the City of Baltimore. Its use has also been adopted in the county schools of the State.

One of the most beautiful residential streets in the city, McCulloh almost from end to end, has become the dwelling place of many of our most representative citizens. Many of the houses are really handsome, commodious and imposing. Purchases in real estate by colored citizens have been gratifying in the extreme.

During the present year, commemorating the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the first introduction of people of African descent into this country, any number of churches have wiped out mortgages upon church property, increased the stipends of the clergy, and the whole race has given evidence of having entered upon a new epoch of increased intellectual and material activity. And, it is believed that a real earnest moral and spiritual awakening is also near at hand.

The wife of one of the most energetic prosperous business men in Chicago, Mrs. John H. Coleman, has for the first few months been attending the well-known Derrick Shorthand School of Philadelphia.

She has been using a system of Shorthand that did not give satisfaction for rapid work; therefore the Boyd thirty-day system has satisfactorily met these demands.

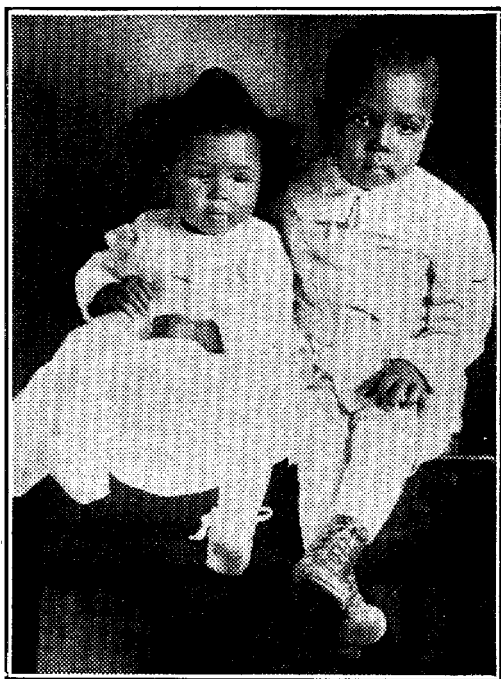
While in the East, she is making an inspection in various business houses as to the developement along commercial lines among our people.

Mrs. Coleman has full charge of the office corps of her husband's business and is an exceptionally remarkable woman of business talent.

A BIT OF RARE HISTORY

The following gentlemen, Sargent A. B. Coleman and Fred. Douglass, Jr., were two conspicuous characters during the war of the rebellion of 1863, commissioned by the State of Mass., and were awarded medals by the Legislature of Boston for the part they took in recruiting the colored American Soldiers, particularly the 54th Mass.

Sergeant Alex. B. Coleman of Boston, Mass., formerly of Louise Co., Va., is one of the two conspicuous characters in the Civil War. He was commissioned by the Governor of Massachusetts to associate with Frederick Douglas, Jr., to recruit the colored regiment, it was these two men that recruited the celebrated fighting 54th Massachusetts Regiment. Sergeant Coleman was an active Mason, and member of Prince Hall Lodge of Boston, Mass. In the early seventies, he came to the District of Columbia and became the proprietor of the largest barber shop in Washington, D. C., cor of 8th and D Sts., N. W. He became a very influential citizen, interested in all the interests to uplift our people. He married Miss Mary Catherine Jones of Detroit, Mich. He is the father of Mrs. Florence Gaskins of St. Paul, Minn.; Mrs. Daisy C. Arnold of Washington, D. C.; John H. Coleman of Chicago, Ill.; Dr. Alex. B. Coleman of Washington, D. C.; Robt. W. Coleman of Baltimore, Md., and Charles Francis Coleman and Ollie Coleman, Deceased. Sergeant Coleman died in 1881, at his home 708 D St., N. W., Washington, D. C., and was buried with Masonic honors. Judge Robt. H. Terrell of the Municipal Court of the District of Columbia, is a nephew of Sergeant Coleman.

The above cut is that of Frederick Douglass, Jr., second son of the late Frederick Douglass, born March 3, 1842, died July 26, 1892. He learned the trade of printing in his father's office at Rochester, N. Y. During the war of the rebellion, he was commissioned by the State of Massachusetts, together with Alexander B. Coleman of Boston, to proceed to the State of Mississippi, then, in secession, and obtain recruits from its colored population for the 54th and 55th Massachusetts Infantry and 5th Massachusetts Cav. (colored regiments), this duty they performed satisfactorily. Their headquarters being at Natchez, Miss.

After the war, young Douglass, together with his brother, Lewis H., came to Washington and established the New National Era, a weekly journal. The suspension of that paper from lack of race support was a sad reflection upon the race, as it was a clean, well edited paper championing the course of the race. Later on young Douglass was appointed a compositor in the Government Printing Office.

Mr. Coleman has been appointed a member of the Colored Division of the Maryland Council of Defense.

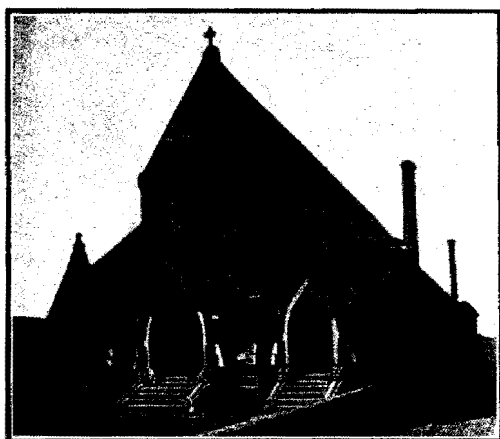

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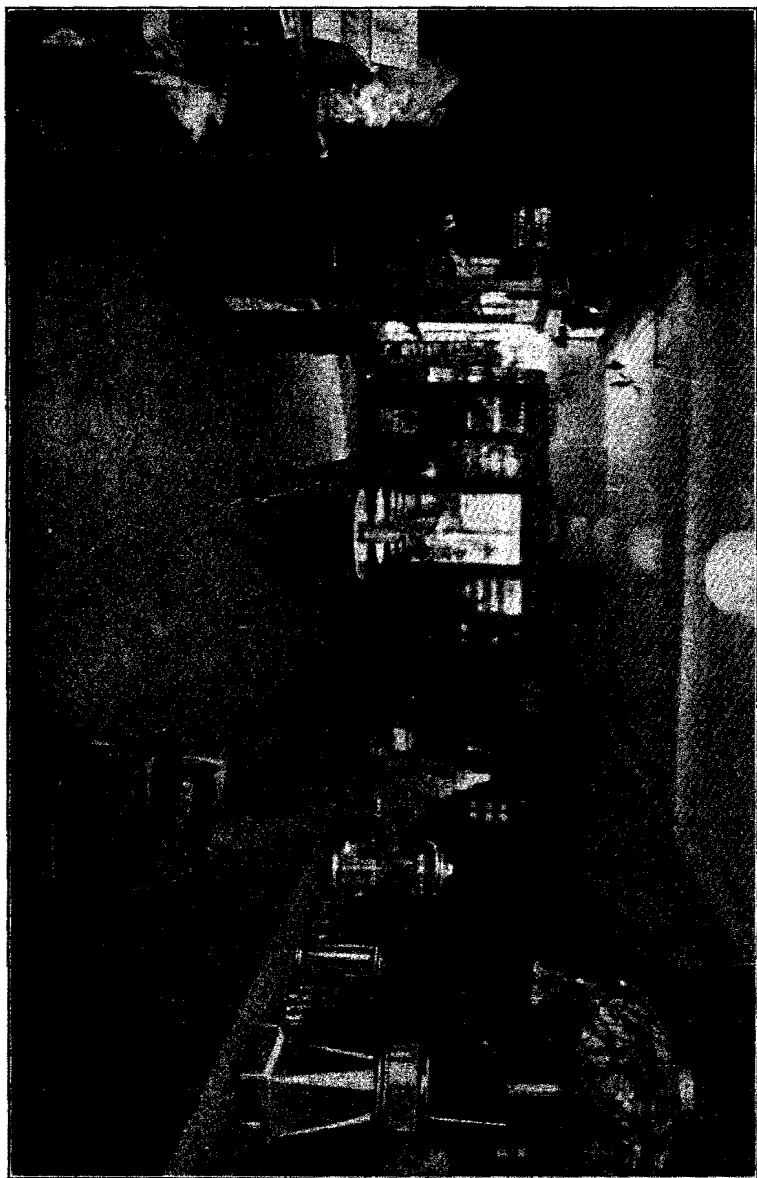
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OBJECT

The Maryland Association for Colored Blind was organized Oct. 15, 1915, for the purpose of advancing the moral, religious, social and industrial development of Colored Adult Blind and to extend to them sympathy and brotherhood.

WHAT WE ARE DOING

1. Any blind gentleman may secure membership to the Y. M. C. A. with all the privileges free upon application.
2. Any blind lady may secure membership to the Y. W. C. A. with all privileges free upon application.
3. Secure the Medical Attention of Doctors Wheatley, Brown, Hawkins, Chissell and Hall at one-half price.
4. Prescriptions filled at any Colored Drug Store at one-half price.
5. All blind persons that are unable to meet these requirements or any part thereof, the attending Physician will make a report of the same and the bill be paid by the Association.
6. An Annual Excursion during the month of August jointly with the Y. M. C. A.
7. The teaching of blind gentlemen Automobile repairing at the Colored High School, and other industry that may develop.
8. The Association encourages colored enterprises to employ blind labor wherever it may be possible. We encouraged a blind man to sell the Afro-American Paper, who is making a success.
9. We encourage blind men to do any kind of tangible stationary work, such as telephone operating, shoe shining, newspaper folding, laundry, agency, book agency, bundle wrapping, packing, broom, whist-broom, hair brush, tooth brush agency and scientific art of Chiropractic and many other arts yet to be developed.
10. We are aiming to bring the blind and seeing in close contact with one another and to instruct the general public in the methods of courtesy and to abolish that spirit of timidity that is so often displayed and encourage self reliance among the blind.

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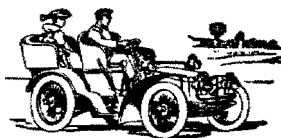
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(Extract from "Philadelphia Tribune," February 2, 1918.)

"A Splendid Example of What Courage and Energy Can Accomplish"

"Miss Minnibelle J. Derrick, the daughter of the late Bishop Derrick, and the founder of the Derrick Shorthand School, has been a resident of Philadelphia for the past few years. She graduated from Wendell Phillips High School in Chicago, and entered Oberlin College afterward, completing her work at Columbia University. The following fall term she was appointed to the Chair of French at Wilberforce University in Ohio, holding the same until the illness of her father brought her to his side. It was after his death that she decided she would not go away again to teach. In January, 1916, she decided to take a business course, but this thought was not a new one, for always she had desired work pertaining to stenography, as a business training is the door leading to almost every opportunity; but she had always been discouraged by those who wanted her to continue her classical studies and finish abroad. Therefore, she entered the 30-Day Business College with more than the average energy and determination, and applied herself to the work so that at the end of twenty-six days she was sent to her first position. At the end of sixty days she was able to repay in full her tuition.

"Colored young men and women are not welcome in the 30-Day College any more than any other business college, and this thought preyed upon Miss Derrick's mind. So it was not surprising that the President of the College was approached by her with the proposition that she be allowed to teach colored students this special system of which he held the exclusive rights. He was at first entirely out of sympathy with her, but before the call was over he had promised to think it over and asked her to call again. The next call secured the sub-contract rights to teach the system.

"The School was then started in a small room which Miss Helen Biddle loaned. It was in a building on Arch Street—American Book Company—and was the property of Miss Biddle. With a rented typewriter and desk, and no capital nor financial help from any source, Miss Derrick started her work. Later in the season she was doing so well that she removed to the Transportation Building on South Fifteenth Street. Here the large number of graduates turned out and the excellent positions secured for them brought such an overflow of applications that it was again necessary to remove, and so larger floor space was leased in the Childs Building, at Fifteenth and Chestnut Streets.

"Miss Derrick has always been proud of the fact that she had the wisdom to see the advantages of this short course. Not only time and money were saved, but a great deal of useless brain fatigue, for the methods were simple and complete.

"It is the thinking people who are endorsing the work and taking the course, through the press and from the platform everyone is strongly advised to take the course, if they are competent and in earnest, for it is not every day that such a wonderful opportunity is presented."

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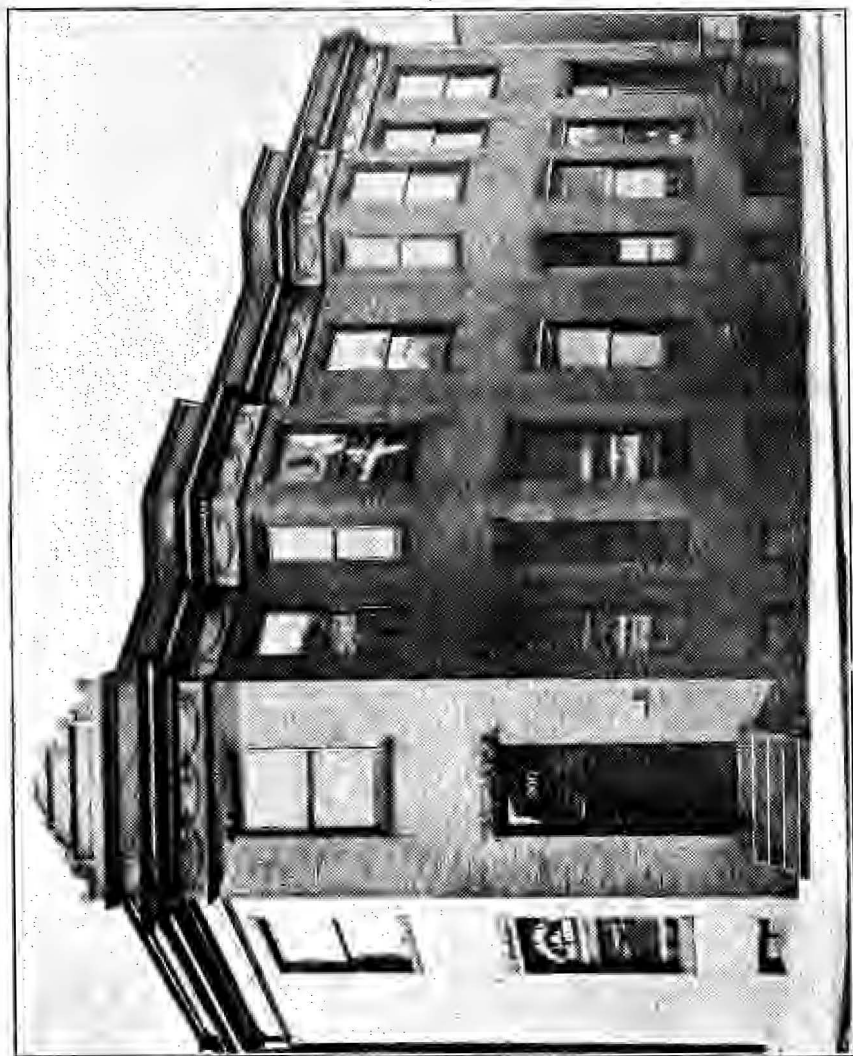
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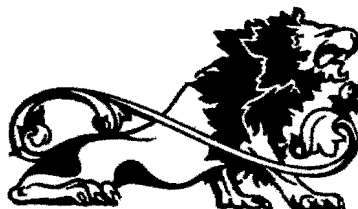
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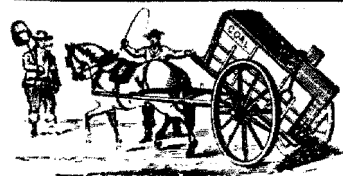
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Carrington L. Davis, Vice-Principal of the Colored High School, is a teacher of broad training and large experience. He has been a large factor in molding the character of many young men and women who have come under the influence of his personality in the course of their high school education.

Mr. Davis is also interested in a large way in all movements that have for their object the broader social development of the colored people of this community. He was Chairman of the Campaign Committee of the Victory Hospital drive that succeeded under the leadership of Dr. William H. Weaver in securing sufficient funds to purchase the Union Protestant Infirmary as a Hospital for Colored People.

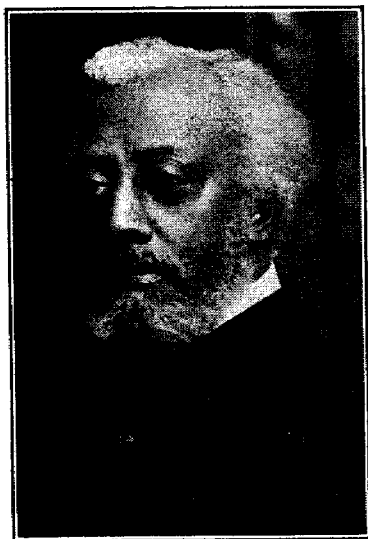
No record of educational forces, nor of character building on a large scale and along right lines, in this city, can be complete without some mention of Miss Fannie L. Barbour, Head of the Department of Mathematics at the Colored High School.

Miss Barbour was among the first group of teachers appointed to the school, having been transferred from School 109 immediately upon the organization of the High School under a Colored Faculty.

An exceptional teacher, a sympathetic but firm disciplinarian, and a woman of broad vision, she has had the unusual privilege of starting on the right road a very large number of the boys and girls who are the substantial citizens of our community today. The fruits of her work are everywhere visible among us.

Ralph W. Reckling, Head of the Department of English and History, is another member of the faculty of the Colored High School, who is doing splendid work in the development of our youth. Though quiet and assuming, Mr. Reckling is a teacher of pronounced ability and a strong force through precept and example in the development in the pupils of the school of clean thinking and an intelligent appreciation of the problems of their every-day life. Many of our boys and girls owe to him their correct evolution of culture and accuracy in expressing themselves upon any matters in which they may be interested.

Prof. J. W. Allen, is really the Pioneer Tonsorial Artist as regards Modern Environments and continues to add. He is a native of Baltimore, Md. Established Since 1891.



CHARLES REMOND DOUGLASS

Charles Remond Douglass, shown above, served in the 54th Massachusetts Infantry and 5th Massachusetts Cavalry, during the war of the rebellion, and is the youngest and only surviving son of the late Frederick Douglass. He was born in Lynn, Mass., October 21, 1844, and at the age of 16 years was apprenticed in his father's office to the art of printer. At the age of 22 he married, and was appointed to a first-class clerkship in the War Department, being the second appointment of a colored man to a clerkship in any Department of the Government in its history. His appointment dates from April 9, 1867, and he is still on the job. In 1871 he accompanied the Santo Domingo Commissioners on its mission of annexation of that Island, being detailed from the Treasury Department where he was employed as clerk to the Paymaster of the Commission.

In 1872 he was appointed a Trustee of the Seventh School District, County of Washington, D. C., and was elected by the Board as its Secretary and Treasurer. The Board was composed of seven members, five white and two colored. In 1875 he was appointed United States Consul to Santo Domingo by President Grant, and upon the serious illness of his wife and her death, he resigned that position in November 1878, returning to Washington, and to the Pension Bureau where he is now employed. December 7, 1880, he with Major Fleetwood and Captain Thomas S. Kelly, organized the famous Capital City Guards Battalion, becoming its first Captain, and subsequently Major, until it became part of the First Separate Battalion National Guard, District of Columbia. December 30, 1880, he again married, and has two sons, Joseph H. (violinist of note), by his first wife, and Haley G., a teacher in Dunbar High School, and a graduate of Harvard University, of the Class of 1905. In 1892, he established the summer resort on Chesapeake Bay known as Highland Beach, Maryland. A number of prominent Washingtonians have purchased lots from him and have erected handsome cottages there to the number of eleven. There is also a summer Post Office located there. The tract contains 26½ acres of land with a beach frontage of over 1,400 feet.

Mr. Douglass, now in his 75th year, is quite active and very much interested in all efforts in behalf of the advancement of his race. He is a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, being Commander of Post No. 21, Department of the Potomac, and assistant Patriotic Instructor of the Department, having charge of Flag Day Exercises in all of the Colored Schools of the District of Columbia. He is also a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, District of Columbia Branch.

In the spring of 1859, Douglass then but 15 years old, served old John Brown of Harpers Ferry fame, as his mail messenger. At that time Brown was living at the home of Douglass' father, in Rochester, New York. On the 2nd of December of that year, he was executed at Harpers Ferry, Virginia.



BISHOP JOHN HURST

Rt. Rev. John Hurst, Presiding Bishop of the Florida Conference, African Methodist Episcopal Church, and resident bishop of Baltimore District.

Probably no man in Baltimore has the confidence of the public in general more than has Bishop Hurst. In conjunction with his arduous duties as presiding officer of the Florida Conference of his denomination, he takes a keen interest in civic affairs and is always in the forefront of any movement that has for its object the betterment of mankind. In a recent address before one of the conferences, the Bishop took occasion to forcefully criticize the conditions affecting the negro in the South. The address was generally regarded as one of the most fearless expositions of conditions ever expressed by a colored man south of the Mason and Dixon Line.

Bishop John Hurst is one of the best known churchmen in the country. He is a member of a number of bodies, including the American Political and Social Science Association and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. In the last named body he is a member of the Executive Committee, as well as serving as a member of the Spingarn Medal Committee.

Bishop Hurst owes much of his success to his charming wife, Mrs. K. Bertha Hurst. Their only son, Benoni Price Hurst, is an interne at Howard University. Bishop and Mrs. Hurst reside at 1808 McCulloh Street.



REV. JAMES R. L. DIGGS

Rev. James R. L. Diggs, A. M., Ph. D., Pastor of Trinity Baptist Church and President of Clayton-Williams Academy, was educated at Wayland Seminary, Washington, D. C., and completed advanced courses at Bucknell College, 1898; Cornell University and the Illinois University, earning the doctor's degree in 1906. Has served six years as Professor of Latin and Instructor in French and Philosophy in Virginia University, and five years as President of State University, Ky., and Virginia Seminary, and was Dean of Selma University from 1911-1914.

Prof. Diggs married Miss Alberta M. Pack, a cultured and refined woman of rare educational attainments; a fine German student. She earned both the Master's and Bachelor's Degrees. She taught German and History in Selma University, 1914. Mrs. Diggs is a native of Hinton, W. Va.



E. B. TAYLOR

Mr. Taylor, despite the war, has just concluded the biggest year, as far as volume of business is concerned, in the history of his corporation. In August he secured what is probably the biggest contract ever given a colored man. It was to feed the entire Students Army Training Corps of Baltimore, and he simultaneously served three times a day at the Johns Hopkins University, Johns Hopkins Medical School, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Baltimore Dental College, University of Maryland, Lehmann Hall and Naval Reserves Armory. The contract was to continue for nine months, but the ending of the war cut it down to two months. He continued his war work, being prominent in nearly every branch of citizen activity. Since our last issue he has given up his bachelorhood by marrying Miss Esther A. Shackelford of Richmond, Kentucky.

He was recently elected president of the Morgan Building and Loan Association, which has begun to do an excellent business.



CHARLES F. WOODLAND

Charles F. Woodland, one of the most prominent men of our race. He has been connected with all enterprises that help to uplift our people for the last twenty-five years. He assisted to organize Provident Hospital, was appointed by Governor as a member of the Colored Division of the Maryland Council of Defense, President for seventeen succeeding years of St. Andrew's Male Beneficial Society, the most prosperous beneficial order in the State of Maryland and also President of Associated Friends of Colored Orphans, Chase Street and Brentwood Avenue, who has just completed a campaign for ten thousand dollars.



J. HOWARD PAYNE
A PROMISING YOUNG LAWYER

This clipping was taken from the Afro-American of Friday, December 6th, 1918, and has been inserted here as showing the progress made by one of our young attorneys.

The young lawyer whose advertisement appears in this paper as having opened law offices at 514 St. Paul Street is an example of what grit and determination will do.

Mr. Payne made his studies of the law at Howard University and after passing the Maryland Bar Examination, with one of the highest averages ever attained before that body, began the practice of the law and has been retained in a number of cases with entire satisfaction to his clients. Besides being a lawyer, he is, also, a government clerk and has found time to help several hours every day at the Court House, at his residence and Lafayette corner Carrollton Avenues, as a member of the Legal Advisory Board, by appointment of President Wilson, assisting registrants answer their questionnaires. Mr. Payne says that he is only too glad of the opportunity to serve his country, gratis, in her hour of trial by doing his bit "overhere" since he, among a number of others, was denied the privilege of attending the officers training camp for service in the Army. The Government says that one branch of the service cannot be crippled for another, hence, the reason why a number of civil employees placed in deferred classification, because of their work, were turned down when they made application for the officers training camp.

Mr. Hugh Mulzac, the subject of our present sketch, has had a rather unique career. He was born at Kingston, St. Vincent, B. W. I., March 26, 1886. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Richard Mulzac, the former of whom was a master ship builder and influential citizen of the B. W. I.



Mr. Hugh Mulzac was educated in the Church of England School at Kingston. In 1907 he left his home with the intention of becoming a master of ocean steamships, and therefore, joined a ship from his home as a sailor. Since that time he has touched at almost every important port on the globe. He came to the United States in 1911, and has striven hard under serious obstacles to obtain the position he now holds as second officer.

Mr. Mulzac, who is naturally of a congenial and friendly disposition, is liked very much by all his fellow-officers. He was graduated December 24, 1918, in the Recruiting Service of the U. S. Training School, Baltimore, and received his license as Second Officer from the Steamboat Inspection Service December 26. He is employed at present by the U. S. Shipping Board Service.

In addition to what has already been mentioned, Mr. Mulzac is the first colored man in this country to receive a license and diploma of this nature, which is in itself a matter of much distinction. There is therefore, no doubt that the colored people as a whole are deeply concerned in the progress of their first representative in this field. There is no doubt, judging from the reliability, intelligence and faithful attention exhibited by Mr. Mulzac, that he will meet the hopes and expectations of his many friends.



DR. ERNEST LYON

Doctor Ernest Lyon is one of the leading ministers in the city of Baltimore. He is pastor of John Wesley, an old Historic and influential church. His early life was spent in New Orleans University. He graduated in '88, classical department, New Orleans University; later A. M. by post-graduate work; to Theology, special course, Union Theological Seminary, N. Y.; received the degree of D. D. from Wiley University, Texas; L.L. D. from Liberia College, Monrovia, Liberia. Entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church from the Louisiana Annual Conference. After serving in that conference as pastor for a period of years, as Sunday School agent of the conference, and as special agent for the Freedmen's Aid Society, he was transferred to the pastorate of St. Mark's M. E. Church, New York City, then located on Forty-eight street. During his administration the church now on Fifty-third street was secured. Having completed the itinerary limit, he was transferred to John Wesley M. E. Church, Baltimore, Md. While in Baltimore, he served as Professor of Biblical Theology in Morgan College, and founded the Maryland Industrial and Agricultural Institute for the education of colored youths, at Laurel, Md. President Roosevelt appointed him Minister Resident and Consul General of the United States at Monrovia, Liberia, to succeed Dr Crossland, who resigned. He remained at this post nearly eight years; during his administration the American government was induced to send a commission to inquire into Liberian conditions, which opened up a new era for Liberia. At the end of his second term he resigned the post. His services for his own government were so satisfactory to the Liberians that he was induced to accept, from the President of Liberia, the appointment to represent the Republic of Liberia in the United States as its Consul General, which post he now fills. Doctor Lyon is also financial agent for the Caroline Donovan Industrial and Agricultural School and became the custodian, five years ago, of \$65,000 accrued balance of the treasury of the American Colonization Society. While Minister to Liberia he traveled extensively in Africa, especially into the interior of Liberia, and also in England and Europe. He is a member of the National Educational Association, President of the Baltimore M. E. Preachers' Meeting, a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, of the West African Society, London, England, a Knight of the Order of African Redemption. He is a thirty-third degree Mason, editor of the Commonwealth, a weekly journal; chairman of the Maryland Council of Defense, colored division, a body commissioned by the Governor of the State to aid in the defense of the nation. He is director of the colored branch United States Thrift and War Savings, and one of the special orators recently appointed by the War Department to serve the nation by enlightening public opinion as to the war aims of the government. Dr. Lyon enjoys the unique distinction of having been sent to his post, while Minister to Liberia, on a war vessel. He was the guest of Rear Admiral Shadwick and dined with him on his flag ship Brooklyn, and at one time entertained and looked after the physical comfort of the men of the cruisers Birmingham, Solem and Chester. Dr. Lyon is a member of the National Association for the Advancement of the Colored Race and a member of the Negro National Business League.

SHARP STREET MEMORIAL M. E. CHURCH

Incorporated in 1802 and located on Sharp near Redwood Street.

Prior to this, the colored membership of the M. E. Church, worshipped in the gallery of the Lovely Lane Chapel, (German, now Redwood Street,) and numbered about one-third of the denomination in and about Baltimore.

Thirteen of these members, in search of Liberty, were among the pioneer settlers of Liberia, Africa.

Between the years 1820 and 1835, seventy-two gained their freedom by escaping to Canada.

The records also show that fifty-one members were sold out of the State into Virginia, Mississippi, Georgia and Alabama.

In the hall of this church, many of the leaders of the race, both ministerial and lay, received their training under one Daniel Coker, under whom a number withdrew from Sharp Street and organized "Bethel" A. M. E. Church in 1811. Here also the Washington Annual Conference was organized in 1863.

The present Memorial Building was erected at the corner of Dolphin and Etting Streets in 1898. Value \$100,000.00 and out of debt.

He is widely known and enjoys the esteem and confidence of his great church and the public generally. He is alive to all public interests and can be depended upon as a safe and progressive representative of his race.



ALBERT PETERS OF HEATHBROOK, ROLAND PARK

A successful business man, and large taxpayer. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Peters of Baltimore City, Md. BALTIMORE'S OLDEST COLORED DOCTOR DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS



DOCTOR WHITFIELD WINSEY

Was Oldest Physician in The City

Doctor Whitfield Winsey, Baltimore's oldest colored physician died at his home 1220 East Fayette Street, July 7.

Dr. Winsey was born 71 years ago in this city during the time that the city was one of the biggest slave markets of the country. He received his early education in private schools and latter entered the medical school of Harvard University in Cambridge Mass.

Dr. Winsey finished Harvard in 1871, just 23 years old, and the wrinkled diploma, with the faded signatures, that has hung in his Fayette Street office for a number of years, bore beside the name of ex-President Eliot, that of Oliver Wendall Holmes, the physician-poet and admired teacher of Dr. Winsey.

Dr. Winsey was married to Anastatia Jacques, who died nearly thirty years ago leaving two children Herbert and Moss Bertha, who survive.

MR. SCOTT OF WASHINGTON, D. C., Prop. of Scott's Lunch Room.

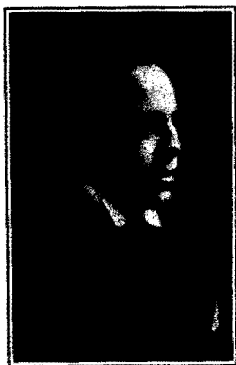

He has held positions as head in the Mt. Vernon Hotel, of this city; Ponce de Leon, Florida; the Jefferson, of Richmond, Va., and the Metropolitan, Washington, D. C. He is an officer and member of Madison Street Presbyterian Church. Mr. Thomas is Vice-President of the Maryland Association for Colored Blind.



REV. WILLIAM H. WEAVER, D. D.

Rev. William H. Weaver, D. D., was born in Baltimore. He was the son of William Weaver, and was educated in the Howard Normal School of Balti-

more and at Lincoln University from which institution he graduated with highest honors. His first charge was at the Madison Street Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, which he served for nearly twenty years with eminent distinction and ability. During his residence here, Dr. Weaver was foremost in every movement having to do with the civic, educational, moral and religious advancement of colored people. As an orator and a preacher, Dr. Weaver has a fame that is countrywide. It was these last two attributes that caused the Presbyterian Church to make him their unanimous choice for Field Agent of their Freedman's Society, a position which he filled with remarkable success. Dr. Weaver also pastored at Atlanta, Georgia, and at Indianapolis, Indiana, both of which congregations were blessed abundantly by the labors of this distinguished minister. For the past two years, Dr. Weaver has not been engaged in active ministerial work, but has been giving much attention to the lecture platform. In August, 1918, he was chosen the executive secretary of the War Camp Community Service which he has made, through his efficient management, a tremendous success.



REV. GEORGE F. BRAGG, D. D.

The Rev. Dr. Bragg, rector of St. James Episcopal Church, Baltimore, possibly possesses more strong friends

among the influential white people of this community, than any other colored clergyman. Dr. Bragg has been in charge of St. James' Church for 27 years, coming to this city from Virginia. When only 19 years of age he was appointed a page in the Virginia Legislature and afterwards made postmaster of the same. Leaving this position, and before coming of age, he founded in Petersburg, Va., the first colored paper in the black belt of Virginia, "The Lancet." In the same city, shortly after attaining his majority, he was selected for "Jury" duty on the Corporation Court of the city. Some time after his ordination, while at his first charge in the ministry, at Norfolk, when only about 24 years of age, His Excellency, the late Governor Fitzhugh Lee, of that State, commissioned him as a trustee of the State of Virginia, of the Hampton Agricultural and Industrial Institute, where he served until his removal to this city. All during his residence in this city, Dr. Bragg has been a conspicuous and an active factor in every good work for the uplift and improvement of the race. In 1902, Welberfore University conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor in Divinity.

MISS LILLIAN ROBINSON

Miss Lillian Robinson, daughter of Mrs. Mary Robinson of 106 S. Caroline Street, is a graduate of Morgan College with the class of 1917.

Miss Robinson is a very amiable and charming young teacher of Sparrows Point Colored Public School. Her friends are legion and she is liked by all of her pupils and is quite a competent teacher. Her life in general is a credit to her race. This school is fortunate in having such a noble specimen of Maryland's womanhood as a member of it's faculty.

A. has been phenomenal—Five years ago he started with 96 members, now 1575, then a mortgaged house, valueed at \$3,500.00 now, a modern building valueed at \$135,000.00, then a one man's work, now a building that requires ten or more men, then a building with an average daily attendance of 25 people, now an average daily attendance of 1,800 people, then an annual budget of \$2,000.00, now an annual budget of \$18,000.00. Mr. Clay is a son of Rev. Louis A. Clay, D. D., of Columbia, S. C., who was a Presiding Elder of the South Carolina Conference.
