The eggs were placed in hot water for a few minutes, and while yet warm a common tallow candle was used as a pencil to write names and dates or to draw designs on the shell. The warmth of the egg made this quite easy. The eggs were placed in a vessel of hot water in which cochineal or other dye had been dissolved. The shell then became colored everywhere except where the tallow had been applied. These marks remained white, leaving white tracing on a colored ground. 
