



COMMERCIAL REVIEW. General Trade Conditions.

Bradstreets says: Reports of a recordbreaking holiday trade, of seasonable quiet in leading wholesale lines, of exceptional activity at top prices in iron and steel, of sustained activity in other industries, continued complaint of car and motive power shortages, and a general hardening of speculative makets for food products, are the features of trade advices this week. The year closes with a cheerfulness of feeling never excceded even of late years, and with expectations of the new year as bright as any that have gone before.

Wheat, including flour, exports for the week aggregate 4.291,543 bushels, I as against 4.332,832 last week, and 3,-868,165 in this week last year. Wheat exports, July 1 to date (twenty-six) weeks), aggregate 1.44.928.990 bushels, i as against 92.952,244 last season. Corn exports aggregate 424.336 bushels, as against 330,941 last week, and 4,011,-105 last year. July 1 to date, corn exports are 20,550,515 bushels, against 93,178.344 last season.
