Autos in the Philippines.

To Baguio in an automobile! That Is the latest. The autos have been cabled for and travelelrs for the mountains can have a ride from Dagupan to the summer capital, bag and baggage, in one of the new machines in the near future.

Charles Jenkins, the hustling hotel proprietor at Dagupan and Baguio, who holds the contract for Government transportation between those points, expects to have the machines on the road as soon as possible. Swinging suspension wire bridges have been constructed across the rivers and in a few months more the trip to the hill country over the Renguet road will be a pleasure.

It is expected that within another year a railroad line will be completed between Dagupan and Campa, at the entrance to the canon, which will enable travelers from Manila to reach the hills in much less time than at present. With the completion of the railroad the automobiles will be placed on the road between Camp d Baguio, a distance of about twenty-seven miles.—Manila Times.
