





Prevent Mosquitoes

ECAUSE of the serious and often fatal inquiry it inflicts on man, the most dangerous animal known is the mosquito. on last Monday morning for Man Compared with the evil done by the insect pest, the cobra's phis, Tenn., to attend the Nation death-toll is small. This venomous serpent is found only in hot countries, particularly in India, while mosquitoes know no favorite land or clime. Arctic explorers complain of them.
